

BADEA is a financial institution set up and funded by Arab Governments. Its objective is to contribute to the economic development of non-Arab African countries and to strengthen the ties of friendship and solidarity between the Arab and African communities. To this end, it: (a) provides loans on concessional terms for specified projects in non-Arab African countries which are members of the Organization of African Unity; (b) supplies technical assistance in the form of grants and acts as a catalyst for Arab aid and investment in the region, and (c) plays a coordinating role in respect of Arab aid destined to non-Arab Africa. BADEA's share of project financing cannot exceed 50% of the total cost of any project. For small projects not exceeding USD 10 million, financing may be increased to 80% of the total cost. The terms of lending vary according to the nature of the project and the economic situation of the recipient country.

The Phare Programme is currently the main channel for the European Union's financial and technical cooperation with the countries of central and eastern Europe (CEECs). Set up in 1989 to support economic and political transition. Phare had by 1996 been extended to include 13 partner countries from the region: Albania, Bosnia and Herzegovina, Bulgaria, the Czech Republic, Estonia, the former Yugoslav Republic of Macedonia, Hungary, Latvia, Lithuania, Poland, Romania, Slovakia and Slovenia. The Phare budget was increased to Euro 6.693 billion for the 1995-1999 period.

Only those firms which have been incorporated in a Member State or in one of the Phare countries, are established and do business there, regardless of who owns or controls them, may participate in a Phare-Subsidiaries of third-country firms are therefore eligible provided they meet these funded contract. conditions. Phare can provide only a tiny proportion of the funding needed, but it can play a key role in catalyzing co-financing with the partner countries and the International Financial Institutions (IFIs).

In addition to Phare (Euro 1.5 billion per year), pre-accession support for all candidate countries will comprise two further elements as from the year 2000: structural aid will total Euro 1 billion per year, while aid for agricultural development (SAPARD) will amount to Euro 520 million per year. SAPARD finances major agricultural and rural development projects and comes under the responsibility of former DGVI, now DG Agriculture. It is budgeted until the end of 2006. However, candidate countries may only benefit through SAPARD between the year 2000 and the time they join the Union.

FAO has been promoting the establishment and the strengthening of agricultural cooperatives for more than 30 years. FAO's approach to rural cooperatives emphasizes the development of cooperatives which are controlled and financed by the members, whose leaders are elected, and whose primary objective is to meet members' needs. Training in cooperative principles and business management is provided to cooperative members, managerial staff and relevant government officials. FAO's cooperative programme also includes policy advice to governments. Special attention is given to strengthening the financial self-reliance capacities and autonomy of cooperative structures of local, district and national levels and to the potential role of cooperatives in countries undergoing structural adjustment, and more recently, to Eastern and Central European countries undergoing transition to market-oriented economies. The main objective of ILO activity in the field of cooperatives is the development of cooperatives and cooperative-type organizations as broad-based participative institutions capable of contributing effectively to economic and social progress, with particular focus on the needs and problems of rural and urban underprivileged groups. Aspects to which attention is given include legislation and regulations, administrative practices, programmes, schemes and projects of direct assistance to cooperatives at national and local levels. The technical cooperation work is carried out with extra-budgetary resources and its level is about USD 23 million. The programme aims at achieving better standards of living for rural people, particularly the poor, through cooperatives or similar self-help institutions which respond to their economic and social needs and provide them with an organizational base for meaningful participation in the development process. Special attention is given to the less formally organized cooperative-type associations, especially when these could respond to the needs of the rural poor at the local level. Resources are provided within this sub-programme for technical advisory services to rural cooperatives, and for the service and support of technical cooperation projects. Particular attention is given to technical cooperation projects as part of integral rural development programmes.

A second objective of the programme is the improvement of living standards in urban areas through efficient and effective cooperative and similar self-help institutions operating within a framework of policies, legislation and programmes favourable to their growth and development. Special attention is given to the promotion of cooperative-type self-help institutions to meet the essential needs of urban groups, including basic consumer goods, housing, water, basic services and utilities and provident services. Attention is also given to the promotion and development of producer/ handicraft cooperatives and industrial cooperatives, operating in such industries and sectors as textiles, clothing and footwear manufacture, food processing and distribution and transport.

Human resources, cooperative education and training services: the special objective is the development of the human resources skills and capacities required for the effective operation of self-reliant cooperatives and cooperative-type institutions. This sub-programme is also concerned with the development of capability at the institutional and national levels for designing and implementing programmes of education and training for cooperative members and managers.

Cooperative research, legislation and information services: the main objective is to collect and diffuse updated information on the latest trends and developments in all areas of cooperative and cooperative-type activities. In order to achieve this objective, the data bank initiated in 1977 on cooperatives and similar institutions is maintained, operated and further extended within the framework of International Labour Information System (ILIS). This data bank covers information on cooperatives in different countries, on legislative provisions such as laws, decrees, by-laws, on responsible governmental authorities, on higher-level research and on cooperative organizations such as unions and federations. Another activity is to coordinate the studies and research items undertaken within the whole cooperative programme, and to provide necessary support especially in such areas as legislation through advisory services and expertise.

However, all current programming is targeted in 15 "Concentration Countries": Bangladesh, Benin, Bhutan, Burkina Faso, Cambodia, Ethiopia, Guinea, Haiti, Malawi, Mali, Mozambique, Nepal, Senegal, Tanzania, and Uganda.

UNCDF has consolidated the best features of each of its programmes into a new instrument called Local Development Programmes (LDPs). After an extensive participatory project design process that involves all stakeholders in the project, LDFs are used for investments in small-scale rural infrastructure such as village-level rural access roads, schools and small irrigation projects, and in support of improved natural resource management. All micro-projects supported by UNCDF local funds must be determined through a participatory planning process involving all sectors of the local community. The community is required to contribute a percentage of the overall cost of the project (financial and/or labour).

Through its micro-finance programme, UNCDF, supports institutions that provide financial services to the poor. The Fund's initiatives in this sector are coordinated through its Special Unit for Micro-finance (SUM). SUM supports the growth of effective micro-finance institutions that have transparent track records and solid institutional and financial performance in reaching poor clients, particularly women, on a sustainable basis.

Assistance is provided mainly in the area of rural and urban housing cooperatives. Inputs from UNCHS consist of expert advice, but seed capital loans and grants may be considered. UNCHS is an executing agency for UNDP-financed projects in this field. UNCHS also organizes training courses, seminars and expert meetings on housing cooperatives.

Early in 1990 UNCHS (Habitat) published an updated bibliography, Co-operative Housing: A Bibliography, which contains entries in the categories of general, regional and country. It complements a technical publication, Co-operative Housing: Experiences of Mutual Self-help, which offers an analytical overview of the topic plus four case studies taken from Ethiopia, Nicaragua, the Philippines and Zimbabwe. This was followed up with a technical publication on the contributions of the cooperative movement to improving the shelter conditions of the poor.

In 1997, UNCHS signed a memorandum of understanding (MOU) with the International Co-operative Alliance ICA to collaborate in the promotion of housing cooperatives in developing countries with specific attention to Africa. A study has been undertaken to identify areas of potential assistance. A subsequent memorandum of understanding is under negotiation for 2001-2002.

The World Bank is owned by 151 member governments. It lends to developing country governments for a broad range of projects that promote economic growth, poverty reduction, and environmental protection. It also plays important roles in advising governments on development policy issues and in coordination among banks and aid agencies. The Bank does not directly fund cooperatives or cooperative development organizations. Cooperatives are, however, often involved in the government-sponsored projects which the Bank finances. During the last few years, the Bank has been making a significant effort to increase and deepen the involvement of non-governmental organizations, including cooperatives, in Bank-supported development activities. Over a fifth of the Bank's lending is in the agriculture sector, and one study indicated that about half of all Bank-financed agricultural projects involved cooperatives or other farmers' organizations.
