



The National Agricultural Cooperative Federation of South Korea (NACF) launched a new initiative that will give one student from a developing country the chance to study cooperative management at the Agricultural Cooperative College (UCA) in Goyang City.

The selected candidate will receive a scholarship that includes tuition fees for the three-year course, as well as travel and living expenses. The scholarship programme is the result of a collaboration between the Federation and the College, both aiming to further co-operation among co-operatives.

NACF has invited UCA to submit their recommendations for candidate students. The two have worked on common projects before, having shared agricultural technology for rural development. Earlier this year, NACF gave to UCA two sets of tractors, to be managed by one of UCA's members.

Throughout 2012 African governments continued to support ICA Africa Endowment Fund, while co-operators from the region took part in various events focused on growing the movement in Africa. In September 2012, the Swedish Co-operative Centre and the International Fund for Agricultural Development co-hosted the 6th Joint Rural Finance Thematic Workshop in Mozambique.

The event enabled African co-operators to assess effective rural finance delivery methodologies for increased productivity.

The following month delegates from 32 countries attended the 10th Africa Regional Assembly and Ministerial Conference met in Rwanda. ICA's regional office for Africa has also been involved in guiding the Government of South Africa in reviewing the country's Cooperative Policy.

The ICA has teamed up with to undertake a scan of current sustainability practices in co-operatives around the world. The scan is designed to act as the foundation for the implementation of the strategic area of sustainability in the

Sustainability Solutions, a worker co-op at the forefront of sustainability in Canada, is seeking to determine how co-operatives are sustainable by analysing a sample of the movement.

The Blueprint aims to position the co-operative model as the acknowledged leader in economic, social and environmental sustainability. To help achieve this vision, Sustainability Solutions will analyse samples of co-operatives from around the world in terms of what they communicate about their activities and whether that represents the principles of sustainability or not.

It will also assess the information available online through various co-operative websites. The second part of this process involves asking co-operatives to describe the sustainability projects they are working on, by contributing to

The scan will help to identify co-operatives, sectors and supportive bodies that have established sustainability targets or certification programmes. It is intended to reflect the diversity across various regions and sectors, creating a living database illustrating the global contribution of co-operatives to sustainability.

This dual approach was designed to enable all co-operatives, no matter their size, to contribute to the sustainability scan. The results of the scan will be presented at International Co-operative Alliance's General Assembly and will be used to educate and inform on the practical

# UN's post-2015 development agenda



Co-operatives have an opportunity to influence the United Nations post-2015 development agenda.

The International Labour Organization's Co-operatives Unit, in collaboration with the International Co-operative Alliance, the United Nations Research Institute for Social Development and other partners, has launched an initiative to allow co-operatives to contribute on issues of sustainable development.

The UN launched its current development agenda, centred on the Millennium Development Goals in 2000. By 2015, it had aimed to achieve eight goals in the areas of poverty alleviation, education, gender equality and empowerment of women, child and maternal health, environmental sustainability, reducing HIV/AIDS and communicable diseases, and building a global partnership for development.

At the UN conference on Sustainable Development in 2012, "Rio +20", the process was started for designing a sustainable development goals which will build upon the MDGs.

As part of the ILO initiative a background study is being drafted to be presented in policy roundtables, conferences and seminars in 2013-14. The study will be informed by a survey and in-depth interviews with representatives of the co-operative movement from around the world to gather information on how co-operatives have contributed to Sustainable Development and their potential to contribute to the achievement of the proposed Universal Goals.

Rio 20+ recognised the actual and potential role of co-operatives to achieving sustainable development, reducing poverty and creating employment. But in May, a High Level Panel appointed by UN Secretary-General Ban Ki-moon published its report on its vision and recommendations for post-2015, which did not have any real emphasis on co-operatives, according to the ILO.

ne ILO said that co-operatives are instrumental in providing opportunities for productive inployment as well as offering services such as health care, education, credit, improved frastructure and sustainable energy. It added that co-operative enterprises are guided by ilues of social dialogue and democracy, and they are often rooted in local communities, aking them a sustainable option for achieving development.

Ines Mendoza, ICA Americas Gender Equity Committee, outlines the challenges facing cooperatives on the path to reach equality...

With the co-operative movement flourishing and the challenges for a Co-operative Decade ahead of us, it is an ideal time to talk about the demand for better governance and democracy that is growing among co-operatives in order to elevate participation within membership and governance to a new level.

There are strong reasons for promoting social integration and inclusion, and even more when participation and good governance are on the table.

Deep disparities, a product of unequal distribution of wealth and/or differences in a person's background, reduces social mobility and ultimately exerts a negative impact on growth, productivity and the well-being of society as a whole.

Nevertheless, in almost all countries, the near-exclusion of women from centres of power, whether at national, regional, or household level, has ensured wide disparities between men and women in economic, social, and political spheres. Currently women make up less than 10 per cent of our parliamentarians, and hold an even smaller share of top positions.

A recent study of the Inter-American Development Bank shows female workers earned 26 per cent less than male workers, but what is the inequality in the co-operative sector? Do we have facts to demonstrate to the world that co-ops have gender equality strategies and good practices, which create better conditions for sustainable economic growth and development?

There are no cookie-cutter solutions to answer each governance problem that exists today, and because political science is not really a "science" but an "art", technical solutions — no matter how cutting-edge they are — will fail if unaccompanied by a new and higher practice of the art of good governance.

The first challenge is in nurturing democratic values. Although member participation is a difficult process requiring vigilance and constant nurturing, it is essential to good governance. To approach this challenge it is necessary strengthen the pool of prospective female and male eadership; enhance member education on co-operatives values; and establish indicators of

progress toward improving the building blocks of inclusion and democracy: for example, gender policies, transparent systems, young inclusion policies and enhance government structures.

The second challenge involves the role of the membership. The task is for all men and women to move forward from where they are. The actions for a Co-operative Decade should assure the representation of all the diverse composition of the co-operative and promote intensely the female participation.

The third challenge is to mainstream women in politics and public administration, starting with their representation on the co-operative's board. As we come to understand the links between responsive and effective governance and development more fully, we learn that governance not representing both sexes is neither participatory, nor inclusive, and thus cannot move a society forward. The absence of women's voices and perspectives has contributed to an impoverished debate, and, often, distorted policies.

The fourth challenge is to improve the capacity of a co-operative's organisation and people for better governance and participation. A co-operative-oriented education must prepare people to be voters, to participate in public discussions, and to work together across traditional boundaries.

At the International Co-operative Alliance in the Americas, gender is a cross-cutting theme in all of our programs. This is the time to reflect on the enormous contributions of women to the development of their countries. Now is the time to get the politics right for advancing women.

Men in leadership must join empowered women to speak out for genuine gender partnerships. Nothing will be a more powerful hallmark of the transformation of our societies than enduring gender partnerships achieved across the co-operative movement.

### Organisation calls for action from governments

26 SEP 2013



The International Co-operative Fisheries Organisation (ICFO) is urging governments to establish fisheries co-operatives and safeguard the rights of fishers.

International Co-operative Alliance's sectoral organisation adopted a declaration that calls upon national governments to establish clear policies regarding the role and positioning of fisheries co-operatives within their national development programmes.

The declaration, which came out of the 3<sup>rd</sup> World Fisheries Co-operative Day held in Indonesia in June, highlights the main issues governments should take into account when drafting such development programmes.

According to ICFO, fisheries co-operatives can help to address the global challenges of poverty, social disparity, unemployment and the destruction of marine and fish resources. They also play an important role in in guaranteeing safe fishing activities, mitigating maritime disputes, maintaining fish stocks and reducing accidents at sea.

The document recommends protecting the rights and increasing the incomes of fisheries throughout the world by revitalising the activities of fisheries co-operatives.

To help grow the sector, co-operatives need to benefit from a dynamic legal framework, making sure they are deemed equal with private and public enterprises. The declaration emphasises that co-operatives should not be adversely affected by private enterprises that aim to maximise their profit by pushing aside economically weaker fisheries co-operatives.

It also underlined that governments should ensure that the rights of fisheries that join cooperatives are protected, while making sure capital-weak fisheries co-operatives can run their business democratically and independently.

While reaffirming the importance of the Blueprint for a Co-operative Decade, the declaration is asking national governments to take the necessary steps to provide a special and independent Fisheries Co-operative Law.

### Organisation calls for action from governments

# energy co-operatives in Europe

25 SEP 2013



Cooperatives Europe is helping to promote a co-operative option for the renewable energy sector in Europe.

Across the EU member states, more than 2,000 energy co-ops have been established, with 700 of them based in Germany.

In 2011, the International Co-operative Alliance's regional body for Europe set up a working group on energy and environment with the aim of developing an overall strategy and implementing concrete actions to raise the profile of renewable energy co-operatives.

The group includes a combination of organisations and individual co-operatives involved in the energy sector, including Eurocoop, Cecodhas Housing Europe, the Co-operative Group, Co-operatives UK, the Co-operative Energy, Legacoop, Kooperationen and SOK Corporation.

As part of its efforts to promote renewable energy co-operatives, Cooperatives Europe participated in the EU Sustainable Energy Week in Brussels in 2012 and 2013, helping to organise high-level conferences on renewable energy topics. Through this, the regional body established direct contacts with the relevant EU Commission services and EU Parliament committees.

If countries such as Germany and Denmark have already reached the 20 per cent renewable energy goal, other EU member states have still to meet the 2020 target. According to Klaus Niederlander, Director of Cooperatives Europe, 'old economy' energy utilities are trying to defend their threatened economic interests by embarking on a lobbying battle in Brussels.

To address this growing wave of initiatives aimed at getting rid of feed-in tariffs within the EU and defend citizen-led renewable energy initiatives, Cooperatives Europe appointed an energy advocacy officer this year.

It has also teamed up with REScoop.EU, a three-year project funded by the EU, which brings together renewable energy co-operatives from across Europe. REScoop includes 12

organisations from 17 countries, all aiming to contribute towards reaching the share of the EU's energy consumption produced from renewables to 20 per cent by 2020.

Out of REScoop, the European Federation for Renewable Energy Cooperatives (http://rescoop.eu/) has formed and in September it became an associate member of Cooperatives Europe.

Through the project, European renewable energy co-operatives can share ideas and experiences, while contributing to REScoop's database. REScoop is working on developing an inventory on existing renewable energy co-operatives while testing methodologies based on best practices.

# operatives for rural development

The President of Guatemala, Otto Perez Molina, has praised agricultural co-operatives for the sector's contribution to the economic development of the country, especially in rural areas.

During a television programme broadcast from the agricultural co-operative Chicoj, Mr Perez Molina explained how the co-operative movement is responsible for 7.3% of Guatemala's GDP.

According to the President, co-operatives generate 27 billion quetzals, the equivalent of USD 3.4 billion, each year.

He described co-operatives as "a movement that develops more and more every day, that is growing and generating jobs, improving the lives of people in Guatemala, especially in rural areas".

Mr Perez Molina also highlighted that co-operatives help to improve the lives of women across Guatemala. There are currently 900 co-operatives in Guatemala with 1.3m members and around 43 per cent of these are women. "We have to support co-operatives and ensure they will continue to grow", he added.

The President, who was joined by the executive director of the Confederation of Co-operatives of Guatemala, Rodolfo Orozco, and Leonardo Delgado, director of Fedecovera, said his government would continue to back co-operatives.

Coffee co-operatives faced a challenging year in Guatemal this year due to an outbreak of coffee leaf rust. In order to combat this, the government pledged 40m quetzals (USD 5 million) to help farmers fight the rust.

Although the most developed co-operative sector is the credit union one, agricultural co-operatives have a great potential to grow, said Mr Delgado.

Fedecovera, a confederation of 38 co-operatives, has become the main producer of forest products of Guatemala. To boost rural development, the confederation has developed a series of energy generation projects.

"Co-operatives are working with different government ministries. We have just signed an agreement with the Ministry for Agriculture to develop a programme that will help many small producers that grow cardamom," said Mr Delgado.

Rodolfo Orozco also highlighted the sector's great potential for growth. He said he wanted to see co-operatives taking part in discussions on food production and retail, as well as education and health. Mr Orozco added that Guatemalan co-operatives are working with the National Rural Electric Cooperative Association in the USA to assess how co-operatives could enter the energy sector.







### A co-operative trifecta

We've begun to see the world's eyes drawn toward co-operatives. This past month, co-operatives have received world-class attention on three continents, a trifecta of sorts, garnering, in the immortal words of Aretha Franklin, that R-E-S-P-E-C-T that co-operatives deserve.

First, in the Americas, at Rio+20, the United Nations Conference on Sustainability, member-states acknowledged co-operatives as a solution to the world's most intractable problems. Not once, but three times, they saw fit to include co-operatives in their agreed outcome document—for poverty reduction, for jobs, and for sustainable agriculture—a trifecta of its own. And a core building block in ICA's long-term public policy strategy, a goal we set a year ago, and systematically worked to achieve since then.

Then, last week, in Asia, the Mumbai bureau of the influential Financial Times 'discovered' that behind the most famous advertising mascot in India—the cartoon character the Amul girl—is a co-operative, in fact 16,000 village co-operatives and over 3 million farmers. Amul is India's largest dairy products company and it has featured the Amul girl for 50 years to comment on contemporary social and political issues. In so doing, it has become one of India's most trusted brands.

Between the lines of the article, you can see the correspondent coming to grips with the puzzling fact that this economic powerhouse and trusted oracle of contemporary Indian society is not a multi-national corporation or a government enterprise, but in fact a co-operative. ICA's President, Dame Pauline Green, who was interviewed for and is quoted in the article, makes the case that only a co-operative could actually fulfil this role. And now, in Europe, the Financial Times again, on their home turf, where they are the indisputable powerhouse of British financial reporting, and often the apologist for the multi-national corporate view of the world, has written these satisfying words: 'The sophisticated bankers from the City have been comprehensively outmanoeuvred by the innocent non-bankers at the Cooperative Group.' In an assessment of the Co-operative Group's acquisition of over 600 banking branches from Lloyds Banking, one of the major banking coups of our time, they tip their hat not only to the skills of the 'Coop kids', as they say, but to the merits of the co-operative model. Their conclusion: 'It's hard to see the Co-op being invented today, but we'd be worse off without it. It's now big enough to be a credible competitor to the four big, ugly and (sometimes) corrosive banks which dominate the industry.' In preparing for the International Year of Co-operatives, the ICA identified raising public awareness as our highest priority. We have engaged Fenton and Sommerson Communications, both of whom were integral to the Amul article, to guide our media relations strategy and implementation this Year. Our greatest advantage is that we don't have to create the story; it's happening every day in communities around the world, as Amul and the Co-operative Group demonstrate. We just have to tell the story. If we do that well, the co-operative will be seen as the world's premier example of



The Director General of the Food and Agricultural Organization of the United Nations (FAO), José Graziano da Silva, will join thousands of co-operators at Co-operatives United.

Delegates from around the world will travel to Manchester for the ICA's culmination event of the International Year during a week of activities from October 28-November 2, which includes the

Mr Graziano da Silva will be a keynote speaker at the ICA's opening ceremony on October 31 at Manchester Central, UK. Throughout the International Year he has been a strong advocate of co-operatives; and he recently outlined his vision for food and agricultural co-operatives: "Co-operatives and producer organisations have a key role to play in bringing about a future without hunger. Standing alone, a smallholder has fewer opportunities.

"When farmers get together, they have better condition to negotiate of price and better access to assets and services such as information, communication, input and output markets, natural resources, from local to international levels."

The FAO has continued to show its support for co-operatives. In June the Director General appointed two Special Ambassadors for co-operatives that www.thenews.cooperatives competed to promote the role of co-operatives in the fight against hunger; and last month he opened a liaison office for co-operatives and producer organisations (http://www.fao.org/news/story/en/tem/151201/code/ at the organisation's Rome headquarters, which also included the offer of meeting space for the ICA.

This year's <u>World Food Day (http://www.fac.org/defin/oled/workifooddin/ien)</u> on October 16 has also adopted the theme "Agricultural co-operatives — key to feeding the world", which will highlight the role of co-operatives contributing to the eradication of hunger and in improving food security.

Mr Graziano da Silva has made strong strides in food security world. As Brazil's Minister for Food Security and Fight Against Hunger he implemented the "Zero Hunger" ("Fome Zero") programme, which helped lift 24 million people out of poverty.

And this year with the FAO, he is working with the International Fund for Agricultural Development (IFAD) and the World Food Programme (WFP) to identify new ways to support co-operatives. At the launch of the International Year of Co-operatives, Mr Graziano da Silva said: "FAO needs strong co-operatives and producer organizations as key partners in the effort to eliminate hunger for some 925 million people."

ICA is working with co-hosts the Co-operative Group and Co-operatives UK, to attract 10,000 visitors to Manchester for the event, which will also be broadcast through the <u>Global News Hub</u> <a href="http://www.w.thenews.coop/virtualeventi">http://www.w.thenews.coop/virtualeventi</a> to allow co-operators worldwide to take part.

### **International Day**



As part of celebrations for International Co-operative Day, co-operatives helped to raise the public awareness of the sector around the world.

In the days leading up to and following the Day, co-operators successfully communicated that Co-operative Enterprises Build a Better World in their activities.

In South America, Costa Rican co-operatives launched a co-op-themed stamp that promotes equality and solidarity. The 30,000 stamps have been supported by the country's national organisations including CONACOOP and INFOCOOP.

Around 5,000 co-operatives descended on Las Tablas, Panama, in a traditional annual celebration. During the day, the government handed USD 4 million to agricultural co-operatives in the country and USD 1.9m towards housing projects.

In Vietnam thousands of people travelled to Hanoi including the Prime Minister Nguyen Tan Dung. He said that the Vietnam Co-operative Alliance will play an important role in fulfilling Vietnam's targets to develop into a modern industrialized country by 2020.

Canada, which has over 9,000 co-operatives representing 8.8 million members, showed that the survival rate of co-operatives is two times better compared to private companies over a period of ten years. The country's Parliament also moved ahead with its commitment to create a special committee on co-operatives, and held a consultation meeting in Ottawa on July 10.

In the United States, the National Cooperative Business Association revealed that almost a third (29 per cent) of the population belonged to a co-operative and 72 percent of Americans think co-operatives such as credit unions and rural electric co-ops, are "helpful to consumers".

While the UK reported strong economic growth for co-operatives, which outperformed the British economy for four consecutive years. Co-operatives UK reported the movement has grown 1.5% in 2011, which is twice the rate of 0.7% in the national economy.

In Europe, the ICA's sectoral organisation CICOPA issued research that identifies the mechanisms which reinforce the resilience of co-operatives. It noted that the resilience is down to worker-members being co-owners and sharing the responsibility of short and long-term strategies.

Over the past eight years in Morocco, the movement has doubled from 4,619 co-ops to 9,722. In 2011 a new co-operative bill was approved by the Council of Ministers allowing them to make it easier to create co-ops and allow for better transparency.

Malta, a country with only 55 co-operatives, submitted a bill to Parliament on 6 July to help the creation of more co-ops and to encourage existing ones to help in social aspects.

The event, which attracted 121 members from 35 co-operatives and friendly societies, aimed to raise awareness of the importance of co-operatives in the local regional, and national development of Jamaica.

She stressed the importance of co-operatives in Jamaica's economic development, with "over 1.4 million people are members of these co-operative and friendly societies" compared to a population of 2.7m.

Following the symposium Mr Gould said: "As one of the most recent countries to join the ICA, the co-operatives in Jamaica demonstrated their commitment to the global movement with this conference in celebration of the International Year of Co-operatives. Their intent is to use this conference to launch an annual training and networking event. They have a clear vision of their role in the Jamaican economy and of the opportunities they see ahead."



United Nations Secretary General Ban Ki-moon hosted a high-level breakfast meeting on cooperatives at the Economic and Social Council (ECOSOC) on the last month in New York with senior dignitaries.

The Ministerial Breakfast on "Promoting productive capacity for sustainable livelihoods: the role of co-operatives", held on July 5, focused on what drives change and on how the movement can help future global development.

One of the main speakers at the event, José Manuel Salazar-Xirinachs, Executive Director for the Employment Sector at the International Labour Organisation (ILO), praised co-operatives for the contribution to creating jobs for young people as well as the ability to ensure the sustainable development of local communities.

"Co-operative ideals address young people's concerns for democracy, autonomy, independence, social and environmental responsibility, and ethical business practices. Co-operatives are also major instruments for those working in the informal economy. Through co-operatives they can access productive inputs, output markets, build self-confidence, and achieve self-organisation and collective voice.

n aloba

markets, and receive a larger share of the value added than would be possible for them individually. At the other end of the chain, consumer cooperatives sell these goods at affordable prices to the general public," he said.

Mr Salazar-Xirinachs added that co-operatives contribute to the green economy, create green jobs and play an important role in food security. He gave examples of how co-operatives help build a better world. In Argentina, co-operatives provide 58% of rural electricity, while in India the needs of 67% of rural households are covered by co-operatives. In Switzerland, the largest retailer and private employer is a co-operative and in Japan, nine million family farmers are members of co-operatives. Furthermore, the top 300 cooperatives in the world in terms of turnover exceed USD 1.6 trillion.

The ILO official also said that co-operatives have also been playing a role in confronting the challenges of the HIV/AIDS pandemic. He added that important changes have occurred in recent years in the co-operative legislation of various developing countries.

During the meeting, Australian Minister for Foreign Affairs. Bob Carr, also emphasised the

importance on co-operation in dealing with humanitarian disasters such as the Haiti earthquakes, the Indian Ocean tsunami and the humanitarian crisis in the Sahel.

"The world is changing and development cooperation needs to respond in an innovative way. This year's United Nations International Year of Co-operatives reminds us that we need to put people at the centre of this change — to empower them to make development happen," the Foreign Minister said.

"Support for co-operatives is important because it creates new markets and new business opportunities where they have been destroyed by famine or conflict. Australia is also a keen supporter of partnerships that combine different sources of expertise, including south-south cooperation."

The biennel event is hosted by the United Nations Development Cooperation Forum (DCF), which was created in 1966 to bring together national leaders to review trends in international development. The DCF is a universal body which brings together decision makers from both developing and developed countries, parliamentarians, civil society organisations, local governments and the private sector. Its core aim is to promote economic development in the least developed countries.

The International Labour Conference has launched a call for action to tackle the youth employment crisis; and said that co-operatives can provide solutions.

A draft report was released recently following the meeting in May, which was based on the International Labour Organization's previous document, "The Youth employment crisis - A time for action" (http://www.iio.org/wcmsp5/groups/public/---ed\_norm/--relconf/documents/meetingdocument/wcms 175421.pdf).

### The report from the Committee on Youth Employment

thttp://www.wi.jo.org/ilc/ILCSessions/101stSession/reports/committee-reports/WCMS\_182840/lang--en/index.html\_included guiding principles on how to respond to the crisis and co-operatives were described as key actors in the process of recovery. The report concluded that promoting youth entrepreneurship could encourage growth within sustainable enterprises such as co-operatives.

It also stressed that co-operatives can encourage initiatives and provide opportunities for young people to create their own enterprise and become self-employed. And encouraged governments to enable a favourable environment for social economy, small and medium enterprises and co-operatives. The document also called on governments to introduce students to co-operative concepts and include information about co-operatives within national curricula.

The Committee underlined that employers, including co-operatives, should place a strong emphasis on providing appropriate training for young people, engaging with governments in developing youth entrepreneurial programmes, and promoting young entrepreneurs' networks within their organisation. The ILO's role within the process would be to continue to provide technical assistance to co-operatives.

The important role of co-operatives in providing employment for young people was discussed at the Youth Employment Forum held at the ILO between the 23 and 25 of May in Geneva.

One of the speakers was Mi Ling Chng of the Singapore National Co-operative Federation, a 27-year-old Senior Marketing Executive also provided examples of how co-operatives in Singapore provide jobs for young people whilst financing the creation of more co-operatives and offering training to spread co-operative awareness.

Israel is witnessing the emergence of a new co-operative movement. As part of the social-economic protests currently taking place across the country, more people are recognising co-operatives as an alternative way to regenerate the Israeli economy.

Protests started in Israel about a year ago due to a rise in house prices, which subsequently led to an increase in food prices. Even though the economy is experiencing growth, the buying power of the middle class has decreased. Yifat Solel, one of the supporters of the new cooperative movement in Israel, explained how co-operatives came to be regarded as part of a solution to the socio-economic crisis: "After several decades of a capitalist way of thinking, cooperatives were considered something no longer relevant. Protests created a huge change in the way in which people look at things due to the establishment of a huge public university on the streets.

"A year ago I started giving lectures and was invited to different places in order to talk about co-operatives in general and to give specific ideas of how to start new initiatives. Creating a co-operative is now considered the thing to do. We recently opened a co-operative pub, which is now the coolest place to be in Tel Aviv. Even two MPs came at the opening of the Kaima pub, which translates as 'sustainable'."

A civil rights lawyer by profession, Mrs Solel is looking to draft a new law on co-operatives, which would include co-operative principles: "Israeli law has not been updated since 1933. It has not changed much over the years and has no co-operative values within the law, which means co-operatives in Israel are co-ops by name only. They do not have to operate according to the co-op values and principles."

Yifat Solel believes the new co-ops created within the last year are very different, because they are based upon social justice and co-operation. "Most of the old co-op movement is gone," she said. "Old co-operatives have de-mutualised. And many people within the few remaining co-ops are sceptic about the new wave of co-operatives. We just have to prove them wrong."

Mrs Solel also said co-operatives could be a solution in addressing social-economic issues, not ust in Israel, but also across the world: "It is the only thing that we can actually do without naving to wait for anyone else to do it. It is very difficult to win on social-economic issues in the

elections. The public thinks social issues are the important, but most of the political arena is either not interested, or not aware of them."

The new co-operative movement emerged as an initiative conducted by people of different backgrounds, from social workers to IT technicians to students, who are trying to "transform the protests into something concrete-through co-operative initiatives".

"They are mostly young people, but not only. They are very dedicated to the cause, and they are creating an addition to the economy and society. All the new public initiatives are very rooted in the co-operative principles and the bylaws of the new co-operatives. People just go and start doing things, taking control on their issues, their interests, creating a civic-economic power," Mrs Solel added.

The movement has many other new initiatives and aims to open several more consumers' coops, from restaurants and pubs to student co-operatives.

Italian co-operators came together to celebrate the International Year of Co-operatives and the International Day of Co-operatives last month.

Officials from co-operatives including the Alliance of Italian Co-operatives, Legacoop and Confcooperative gathered in Rome on July 5th to raise the profile of the sector.

The keynote speech was delivered by ICA President Dame Pauline Green, who praised the work of the Italian co-operative movement and spoke about the challenges the sector continues to face. She praised the Italian movement, and described some of the co-ops she had visited including a ham and salami co-operative (CLAI and SACMI), which she said was "the largest workers' manufacturing co-op that I have ever seen, with tremendous global reach."

However she outlined that there are still challenges ahead: "While we are a European and global movement, we do not have a European or global 'brand', in the traditional sense of 'brand', and that make us difficult to see and hear in a global economy.

"Our co-operative identity or 'brand' is not about selling a monolithic corporation, a product or service, but for us something bigger. Our model of business is sustained because it developed according to local needs, local culture and member demands, and which have a proven track record of sustainability."

Along with Dame Pauline, the event saw speakers such as Luigi Marino, President of Confcooperative and the Alliance of Italian Cooperatives, and Giuliano Poletti, President and Co-Chairman of Legacoop Alliance of Italian Cooperatives.

Mr Marino explained: "The crisis has led, in the world and in Europe, to the rediscovery of the co-operative, many of which have resisted and reacted to the difficulties better than other companies. 2012, proclaimed as the IYC, is a recognition that enhances our responsibility and we are committed to new targets in Italy, the European Union and worldwide."

Mr Poletti, added: "It is necessary to create a new development model, based on the support of the people and communities, a new social model, the need to work for a future where there is more balance between individual and community, economic activities and the economy, between public and private initiative."

The event was held in the Parco della Musica Sinopoli Hall, in Rome. The Alliance of Italian Cooperatives represent over 90% of the co-op sector: it employs 1.3 million people, has a turnover of 140 billion euros and over 12 million members.

The International Co-operative Alliance has received the 2012 Pepe Miquel Award, which is organised by Confederación de Cooperativas (Valencia), and recognises the ICA's work to promote and sustain the co-operative model globally.

Dame Pauline Green, President of the ICA, collected the prize on 10 July in Valencia, which is the first time an organisation has received the annual award. She said it is a privilege for the ICA to receive the recognition, especially in the context of the International Year of Cooperatives: "I am conscious that this award is given to the ICA for the work that it has done over its 117 year history as steward of the values and principles of our global movement and for its work to drive the development of co-operatives across the world.

"But in reality, it also represents the intrinsic recognition of the work of the billions of individual co-operators who are the real heroes and heroines," she said. "As co-operators, we know that the world would be a different place if just a fraction of the public money that went to bail out the big commercial banks across the world, had been put into co-operative development."

The ICA President also praised the contribution of the ICA's 296 members and the billion cooperative members from all over the world. She told the 200-strong audience that cooperatives have been promoting sustainable development by boosting economic growth and putting the global economy "at the service of people" rather than "leaving people at its mercy".

At the event, Dame Pauline added that co-operatives could also help regenerate the Spanish economy, which has been severely affected by the financial crisis. She also congratulated the government of Mariano Rajoy for increasing finance for the social economy to more than 940 million euros, which includes the development of worker co-operatives.

Dame Pauline said: "The ICA's key strategy for the coming decade is to grow the co-operative model of business across the world — this is a real prize for all of us!

"The ICA Board sees this International Year as the beginning of a modern, confident, outward

looking and creative co-operative movement. This award is a great moral support and motivation for us to continue that work with the worldwide co-operative movement and I thank you on behalf of this great movement from the bottom of my heart."

On the jury, which handed out the eighth Pepe Miquel award, were representatives from the cooperative, university and political worlds. The prize is normally awarded every year under two categories — the lifetime achievement co-operative award and the prize for the best journalistic work. This year's journalistic prize went to newspaper Levante-EMV (Editorial Prensa Iberica).

Emili Villaescusa, President of Confederación de Cooperativas, also said that since the beginning of the financial crisis in in Spain the number of job losses within the co-operative sector had been ten per cent below the country's average, proving that co-operatives can be part of the solution to the economic crisis.

"This award granted to the ICA is very special. This is the first time the Pepe Miquel prize for co-operation goes to an institution, and we are proud that the person who came to collect it is a major representative of the co-operative movement in the world, Dame Pauline Green, who was also the first woman to come to the stage and collect the prize," he added.

uring a visit

to Consum Cooperativa's warehouse, which is the largest consumer co-operative in the Mediterranean with 600 supermarkets. Talking with Consum's President Francesc Llobell, Dame Pauline said that "in an environment where unemployment figures are becoming less encouraging, co-operatives continue to increase their profits and their staff, creating stable and quality employment". She added that "in a year when most of the business faltered, Consum has managed to grow profits in a sustainable manner".

During her tour around Valencia, Dame Pauline also visited Anecoop, which is Spain's leader in marketing fruit, vegetables and salads, as well as being a world leader in citrus fruit exporting. She said that both of the co-operatives "have put in strong financial performances in difficult economic circumstances".

# Rocky road in sunny Spain

Posted on 9 July 2012

I'm travelling to Valencia in Spain's sunny south tomorrow. While the sun may shine on its inhabitants much of the year, news that the Spanish Government may hike taxes on basics like milk, bread and sanitary items as part of continuing austerity measures has hit a population already reeling from one quarter of its population being without a job, with the figures for young unemployed being particularly cruel at around 50 per cent.

But, amid all of the difficulties the Spanish people are facing, co-operatives in Valencia added jobs in the past year. Anecoop and Consum, two co-operatives I am very much looking forward to visiting, have put in strong financial performances in difficult economic circumstances. Consum has even found the impetus and funds to dramatically improve its environmental performance. That's the co-operative difference!

And the government of Mariano Rajoy is doing its bit to help fund entrepreneurial activity and self-employment in the social economy by boosting its spending in this area. With this in mind, just consider if some of the funds that have been used to bail out failing banks in the past months, or allocated to the now *nonetheless desired* high court probe into Bankia – Spain's fourth largest bank – had been put into co-operative development? That would have done much to help the Spanish people get through the pain, and helped Spain jump the very real hurdles in front of it on the bumpy path to economic recovery.





For the first time, young French speakers will have the opportunity to learn about co-operation in a special summer school.

Students between the ages of 18–35 will take part in the school, organised by the Regional Union of Scop of Poitou Charentes (http://www.scop-poiloucharentes.coop), in Poitiers, France, from July 2–14 to learn more about co-operatives.

The campus follows the model of Sherbrook's summer school, in Quebec, where over the previous three years, French students studied the co-operative model.

Johan Baufreton, one of the coaches at the Campus and regional delegate of the Scop (Société Coopérative et Participative), said the school is based around the scenario of organising their own 'Scop', which is a form of co-operative where employees are the majority shareholders.

"The main role of the Regional Union", commented Mr Bauferton, "is, from one hand, to show that Scops exist. From the other hand, they constantly promote and make young people interested in co-operative entrepreneurship. The aim of the school is to promote the creation of co-op enterprises in people as young as possible."

Divided into groups of four or five people, students will have 15 days to create a Scop. During the time, they will be supported by expert coaches who will support them in the organization of their own project. Participants will be also involved in conferences and workshops about cooperation and co-operative enterprises.

According to Mr Bauferton, the campus will be a period of training and action; young people will increase their competences, and, at the same time, they will learn to work together, cooperatively.

Green parties from around the world have shown their support for the co-operative model.

At the <u>Global Greens Congress in Dakar (http://www.globalgreens.org/dakar20121</u>, hundreds of delegates from 76 countries backed a call for national Green parties to lobby governments to nurture the creation, growth and sustainability of co-operatives.

Proposed by the Australian Greens, the resolution, which was unanimously supported by attendees, acknowledged the close alignment between the ICA's Co-operative Principles and those of the Global Greens, which is a partnership of Green parties and political movements.

The Congress also agreed that co-operatives have a significant impact on reducing poverty and in "securing a sustainable and renewable future for the planet".

Sam Byrne, a member of the Australian Greens and Chair of Alfalfa House food co-operative, Sydney, presented the motion to the group of Green parties. Mr Byrne says: "To me, and now the Greens worldwide, there is a lot of alignment between Greens principles and co-op principles.

"The motion gives co-operatives and their national and international organisations an opening to engage Greens parties and MPs on issues relating to co-operatives. It also should encourage them to promote co-ops. In quite a few countries and regions now Greens are in key partiementary positions."

Green parties have also pledged to promote co-operatives throughout the International Year of Co-operatives; and on the International Day of Co-operatives (July 7).

In a letter addressed to the Congress, ICA President Dame Pauline Green said: "In this International Year of Co-operatives, each day that we spread the word of the importance of this values-based enterprise model and it takes stronger root, is a day in which more citizens will find jobs, there will be greater gender equality, youth employment, greater focus on climate change and peace initiatives and more effective sustainable development. Co-operatives are a critical part of all of that and more."

The panel of speakers appearing at the October 8–11 event includes Won-Byong Choi, National Agricultural Cooperative Federation, NACF (South Korea); Leonardo Delgado, FEDECOVERA (Guatemala); Patrice Gollier, InVivo (France); Claude Lafleur, La Coop fédérée (Canada); José Hugo Lares Sierra, Triunfo Verde (Mexico); Yves Le Morvan, Coop de France (France); David Moroney, Co-operative Bulk Handling, CBH Group (Australia); Denis Richard, La Coop fédérée (Canada); Serge Riendeau, Agropur (Canada); and Svend Erik Sørensen, Danish Crown (Denmark).

One of the speakers, Leonardo Delgado, told eDigest that he is looking forward to the opportunity to talk about the Federation of Cooperatives of the Verapaces (http://www.fedecovera.com) (Fedecovera) in Guaternala. Fedecovera is the overseeing organisation of 36 co-operatives across the northern region of the country, which is made up of 60,000 people.

Mr Delgado, Fedecovera general manager, said: "When I knew the subject of the conference, I thought that I could introduce Fedecovera as an agricultural co-operative with a high social value."

Since 1976, Fedecovera's entire membership has been built-up from the indigenous Maya population, which also supports 80,000 farmers separated into 33 groups. The organisation's primary economic activity is a sustainable forestry development and the cultivation of the

In the Dominican Republic, CONACADO co-operative provides cocoa products to Green & Black's, Lush Cosmetics and Ben & Jerry's ice cream. The 10,000 farmers make up 25 per cent

The Manduvira Co-operative in Paraguay is a leading sugar producer, which can now afford to build its own mill rather than paying rental and transportation costs to another factory over 100km away.

Nicola Kelly, ICA Director of Communications, said: "These stories, and many more, show that co-operatives are the successful structure behind Fairtrade; and there is no better time than the International Year of Co-operatives to shout about this.

"Three out of four Fairtrade products sold come from co-operatives of small producers, while some products such as coffee and cocoa are entirely sourced from co-operatives. These are amazing facts that show co-operative enterprises do build a better world."

Co-operatives contribute to the development of their communities and sectors, according to a 'final declaration' from a group of academics.

Following on from the "Promoting the understanding of cooperatives for a better world" conference in Venice, organised by research institute Euricse, an overview document of the event found that co-operation is emerging in the public service sectors and that better regulation to stimulate co-operative growth is needed.

The conference brought together scholars from various countries and disciplines to discuss the economic and social importance of cooperatives.

Academics discovered the emergence of co-operatives in public service sectors such as education, health and social services was an answer to local and national services run by other organisations that were deemed as inadequate.

To help support the growth of co-operatives, the conference held the belief that better regulatory framework was of paramount importance in traditional and new sectors. Delegates backed calls for governments to recognise co-operatives as a business model that should enjoy the same freedoms, access and support as other enterprises.

They also believed organisational and governance rules would allow co-operatives to develop, especially in sectors that have been traditionally dominated by public-run entities. Equally, market regulation and anti-trust laws should take into account the unique goals of co-operatives, which are to be run in line with the interests of their workers, producers or consumers.

The report declared: "The genetics of co-operation reveal an ability to adapt and transform that enables cooperatives both to react positively to difficult situations and to actively contribute to social and economic development, though their usefulness is clearly not limited to times of crisis.

"The contributions of the scholars who participated in this conference highlight that the interest

Dairy co-operatives in developing countries have been given access to a learning network to strengthen competition.

Launched in Nairobi, Kenya, the International Dairy Enterprise Alliance (IDEA), which has been established to deliver the initiative, started the first 'Co-operative-to-Co-operative Learning Series' last month.

The Cooperative Development Program (CDP) is funded by the U.S. Agency for International Development (USAID) and managed by Land O'Lakes International Development to provide information, resources and technology to help dairy co-operatives thrive in national and regional markets.

The learning series brings together industry thought leaders, co-operative managers and board members to share experiences. Over 40 participants attended the first session from a variety of co-operatives afar afield as Nicaragua, India and the United States; and despite the differing sizes they found similar problems existed around the world.

Rebecca Savoie, Practice Manager for the CDP, said: "The informal nature of the event created a space for connection. The stories that these high-level executives were telling about their business problems resonated profoundly with all participants.

"The event was magical. Participants walked away with actionable items and took back ideas to their cooperatives to help transform their businesses."

Taking part in the event were co-operatives, development organisations, research organisations, input suppliers, government bodies and nongovernmental organisations and other private sector partners.

Mr Rodgers, also Chair of the ICA Housing Board (http://www.lea.coopiel-housing). started his career in 1971 as a founder member of Sanford Housing Co-operative, London, which today maintains a successful sustainable community and recently made a contribution to the International Year of Co-operatives fund.

Eight years later, Mr Rodgers was appointed as Chief Executive of CDS Co-operatives, London, where he has grown the organisation over the past 30 years to the largest co-operative housing service agency in England.

At the end of July, Mr Rodgers will depart from CDS, but remains with the ICA until 2013. He said: "I have thoroughly enjoyed the years I have spent as CDS's Chief Executive. Every day, it has been inspirational to work with tenants and residents and to support and enable them to use their often neglected talents to control their own homes and neighbourhoods. I retain my passionate commitment to housing co-operatives."

Retiring in the International Year of Co-operatives, Mr Rodgers said it is the right time to step down: "I retain my passion for and commitment to housing co-operatives in particular, and to the wider Co-operative Movement in general. I intend to continue promoting and developing nousing and other co-operatives which, with over 900 million members worldwide, are ncreasingly important as enterprises that are good for people, good for societies and good for the planet, but I think it is the right time for me to step down and for CDS to appoint a new CEO."

## **National Conference on Revival** of Rural Co-operative Credit Structure: India

he National Conference on Revival of Rural Co-operative Credit Structure was held in the state of Punjab from 8-12 February 2009. It was organized by the cooperative movement of Punjab. Mr. Ivano Barberini, the late President of ICA was invited as Chief Guest. The conference was also attended by co-operative Minister of Punjab and other senior ministers along with the co-operators.

Mr. Barberini focused his speech on the role of financial institutions especially co-operative banks in recovering from the

Mr Barberini also said that the cooperatives had understood that they must be

competitive with the best companies. He referred to following set of guidelines for an assured success of co-operative enterprises:

- Long term vision should be combined with a business strategy containing day-to-day common sense and competitiveness with a strong identity;
- The organizational structure be such that it improves efficiency and effectiveness of the co-operative
- All the resources like human, financial, and social be used optimally and managed professionally, and that too in

More than 70 participants from Government's co-operative Department and various co-operatives in Myanmar attended the Conference.

The basis of deliberations was thematic presentations made by experts from ICA-AP and top ranking officials of successful co-operatives like NACF, IFFCO & FSCT that have an established track record in transforming the core co-operative values

The participants after having listened to and seen the presentations made by the experts discussed in smaller groups, the scope of co-operatives in the context of Myanmar and the kind of policy environment required for the development of co-operatives.

Following is the gist of recommendations made by the groups:

- There is a great need of an enabling policy environment on co-operatives in Myanmar. The Government should come out with a clear long term policy on co-operatives. The policy should focus on the relevance of co-operative ventures in the inclusive growth of economy for a sustainable economic development.
- The co-operative law of Myanmar should be made simpler and more clear wherever required and be reviewed in the context of global economic recession. The regulatory features of the law may be made more pronounced and facilitative. The law on co-operatives must clearly mention the roles and responsibilities of various tiers of co-operatives together with effective governance mechanism in the spirit of ICA's co-operative identity statement.
- A National co-operative Development Board should be constituted with representatives drawn from various relevant Ministries of the Government and other agencies like successful co-operatives, successful enterprises from relevant field, experienced co-operative leaders, senior academicians and distinguished faculty members of co-operative training institutes.

- Government must leverage international perspective on co-operative preferably through ICA, the global apex of co-operatives, as special adviser to the Board so as to bring in international experience, knowledge, information and collaboration with successful overseas co-operative enterprises in the region. It will broad base the scope of co-operatives in various innovative and emerging sectors of the economy.
- Periodical training and education of co-operative facilitators, members, leaders and managers must be made mandatory in the co-operative law and government must commit it self with financial and technical support for setting up co-operative education and training centers in various parts of the country.
- The government needs to introduce creative and friendly means to generate awareness about good things co-operative actions can do and accordingly come out with a comprehensive co-operative development strategy involving various ministries and departments through the aforesaid National Board.
- Considering the challenging nature of the job of co-operative facilitators and promoters, the government must provide extra allowances and benefits to the government staff working for the development of co-operatives. It will help government to retain loyalty and dedication of the workers entrusted with the job of developing co-operatives in the country.
- co-operatives must be considered as the vehicles for financial inclusion through micro credit and micro finance interventions. There is a need to formulate clear and simple law on MFIs. The government must announce special tax and fiscal benefits to make co-operatives popular and useful.
- The co-operatives being community based organizations must be preferred and considered for spreading awareness on issues of global concerns like MDGs of the UN, global warming, HIV/AIDS etc. in collaboration with other actors in this

- 2. It would be a big move forward to evince interests of governments and accordingly meso and macro level measures should be based on a strong partnership with governments at all administrative levels supplemented with greater visibility and hard edged information campaign on cooperatives being proud of their modesty and emanating from humble
- Enabling policy environment of the governments on co-operatives must be maintained and accordingly the legislative features of the law on cooperatives are reviewed and
- improved. ICA system together with ICA members, multilateral international organizations and UN system should be used to coordinate world level lobbying and networking.
- The co-operatives being community based must be preferred and considered for spear heading demonstrative and replicable awareness campaigns both at local and global levels on issues of global concerns like MDGs of the UN, global warming etc. in collaboration with other actors in this field.

## Co-op Reconstruction Programm for Cyclone Affected Co-operatives Myanmar

The disaster that struck Myanmar on 2nd and 3rd May 2008 in the form of cyclonic winds and rainfall killed 150,000 persons and displaced over 2 million people.

395 co-operatives in southern and southeastern Myanmar faced the wrath of the disaster. In all 259 members of these Cooperatives died and 8544 were rendered

It is no more an urban disease as it has extended its reach to the rural areas as well. co-operatives are suitable for serving as conduits for delivering information, training and services to rural communities and families as they have a unique presence and reach

within the communities.
ICA, along with NCUI and NCCT implementing a project on HIV/AIDS holistically address and sustain the bure of HIV/AIDS. In 2004, ICA collaboration with NCUI conducted National workshop in India, sensitization of the co-operative leader policy makers, directors and trainers arious aspects related to the spread HIV/AIDS. In 2006-07, ICAAP with support of DFID working for the sa cause implemented a project in four sta

This initiative of ICA, thus, attempts to provide a platform to the co-operative leaders and policy makers to discuss openly on the facts about the disease and make policy decisions to implement all effective means of prevention. Training of co-operative Trainers (ToT) is one of the essential components under the project 'Mainstreaming of HIV/AIDS in training and Education system of the cooperatives"

The project is being implemented in 11 states of India with the objective to reduce the spread of HIV and other sexually transmitted infections among the members of agriculture, weavers, fisheries and dairy co-operative members and their communities. There are trainers at various levels of co-operative education and training system. These staff members/trainers conduct regular training programmes throughout the year on various aspects of co-operative management for the co-operative leaders, managers, staff, general members and prospective

HIV/AIDS project attempts to train these trainers in a 5 day ToT programme comprising, 4 days of classroom sessions and one day study visit to treatment/care centre. The objective of the ToT is to create

the co-operative members through their regular co-operative training programmes. A five-day residential ToT programmes on HIV/AIDS were organized in states of Rajasthan and Manipur in India in May 2009. Total 75 co-operative trainers, 28 female and 46 male co-operative trainers actively participated in both the programmes. Institutes of the co-operative Management, Jaipur and Imphal organized the event respectively with the support of ICA-AP. Resource persons in Rajasthan were identified with the support of Rajasthan State AIDS Control Society and in Manipur; Manipur Aids Control Society cooperated to decide on the resource persons for the training programme

## GENDER MAINSTREAMING

## **Empowering** Women

Women development and gender mainstreaming in co-operatives is one of the priority areas of ICA. We are concerned about low and negligible participation of women at all levels of co-operatives in the region i.e. 30% at membership and 8% at leadership and decision-making. This is not a comfortable situation given the fact that 60-70% of farming and food production work is done by women.

Therefore, ICA-AP is implementing a number of capacity building programme for the member co-operatives for gender main-streaming and enhancing number and quality of women participation. Towards this endeavour, a skill development programme "Management Capacity Building of Women for Co-operative Development" is being conducted

regularly.
This year the programme was organized for the co-operative movement of Malaysia in Kuala Lumpur from 28 June to 3 July, 2009. This programme aimed at assisting the cooperative movement of Malaysia to review the status of gender integration and women's participation, constraints and possible solution to enhance the quantitative and qualitative participation of women. The methodology involved presentation of status paper by ANGKASA and discussion on various aspects facilitated by resource persons. The discussion led to creating a road map

## Pilot Project on **Empowerment of Youth and** Women: Sri Lanka

The project on Empowerment of Youth and Women through co-operatives in Sri Lanka has been funded by IFFCO for a period until October 2009. The following activities have been carried out by NCC:

- Designing of the questionnaire: The questionnaire has been finalized in time with the facilitation of ICAAP and accordingly data was collected in 6 namely, Kegallle (Ke), Kandy (Ka), Badulla (Ba), Kurunegala (Ku), Trincomalee (Tr), Matara (Ma)
- The Feasibility study was carried out in five districts through base line survey of the target groups to assess their needs and constraints.

The following data on needs and constraints were gathered through the following categories in the targeted

- a) Personal details; b) co-operative involvements and benefits; c) Leadership; d) Governance and democratic control; and e) Empowerment through business opportunities and innovation institutional arrangements and facilitation
- Induction training for volunteers on questionnaire management and processing.

A two day induction training program was organized in the premises of NCC, Colombo and the volunteers cum community facilitators attended the program. Their survey, communication and articulation skills were strengthened and necessary education on co-operative philosophy was imparted by Mr. Rajiv Mehta who was invited as technical resource person.

Base line survey: The survey was conducted successfully and critical information regarding the youth co-operative leadership was collected.

The surveyors managed to collect data from the small groups as well as CBOs already engaged in MFI activities. The social mobilization participatory development approach, institutional strengthening strategies, capacity building of community youth leadership and managerial skills development of executives were identified through the discussions.

causes of the vulnerable issues facing co-operative leadership were layer of the societies are, mainly, lack of governance practices, leadership skills, women backwardness and lack of facilities to develop education programs. Further, added to the woes of second line leadership.

Mental development, spiritual counselling, sports, recreation, nature, knowledge building, yoga, time management, conflict management, stress management, ethnic harmony, peace building, human rights, business planning, strategic development, project planning and project budgeting and institutional capacity development were a few of the subjects taken up in the camps. 

## of Consumer Development Co-operatives: Vietnam

A joint workshop with ICA-AP and Vietnam co-operative Alliance (VCA) was held on 8-9 April 2009 at Hue City, Vietnam. Forty-five leaders from 15 cooperatives of Thua Thien Hue Province attended the workshop.

At the workshop, lecturers from Singapore and Japan gave suggestive presentations on "Basic Principles in Operating Small-Sized Stores", "Basic Methodology of Store Comparison" and "Home Delivery Business by Consumer Co-ops in Japan' while Ms. Le Thi Huong, Chairlady of Thuan Thanh Consumer co-operative. analyzed major challenges surrounding consumer co-ops in Vietnam.

According to her analysis, average turnover of consumer co-ops in Ho Chi Min city accounts for only 10.9% of average consumption per capita, while other economic sectors serve 89.1%. She drew on the advantages of private sector and disadvantages of co-operative sector in Vietnam as follows:

#### Private Sector

- Organizational structure: Very simple
- Sources of capital/funds: Sufficient own resources save time for making

- not to share or contribute
- much attention
- Organizational structure: Not simple
- Sources of capital/funds: Taking time in making decision, so lose opportunities
- distributed to a variety of funds, which causes lack of capital and affects the competitiveness of co-operatives
- Social responsibility: Always being cared, even in case of price hike in the market, co-operatives are expected to keep the price for stabilizing the market

Based on her analysis, all participants discussed major challenges they are currently facing and arrived at their own long-term and short-term solutions to cope with the difficult situation. They also participants visited the 1st store of Thuan Thanh Mart near Hue Imperial Palace, Ms. Juliana Tan from NTUC FairPrice, Singapore, gave useful advice on display, store layout and merchandise assortment to the participants.

The workshop was highly appreciated by all participants and the ICA-AP was expected to continuously hold these workshops in some provinces, cities of Vietnam over the coming years.

## Management of Consumer Co-operatives: Asia-Pacific

The 9th ICA Regional Workshop for Managers on "Management of Consumer Co-operatives in Asia-Pacific" was held on 24-26 August 2009 at Costa Sands Resort (Downtown East) in Singapore. Hosted by Singapore National Co-operative Federation (SNCF) and supported by NTUC FairPrice, 17 managers of consumer co-operatives from four countries (Myanmar, Singapore, Thailand and Vietnam) actively participated in the threeday workshop.

The workshop commenced with the welcome address by Mr. Zulkifli Mohammed, Chief Executive Officer of the SNCF, followed by the presentation on NTUC Fair Price by Ms. Juliana Tan, Manager of the NTUC FairPrice Training

Mr. Kao Beng Lee, Ms. Juliana Tan and Mr. Simon Tan from NTUC FairPrice covered four important areas of retail business, "Visual Merchandizing", "Store Management", "Staff Training and Development", "Basic Methodology for Store

Ms. Eriko Sakurai (Trainer, Cash Register Group, Store Operation Department of Co-op Net Business Federation, Japan) was invited as a resource person this year. She made a presentation on "Customer Service Strategy in Store Operation of Co-op Net" and conducted a practical training on customer service. All participants actively participated in the practical training and learnt the importance of finding "unconscious expectations" of customers.

The participants visited a hypermarket, a

convenience store and two supermarkets of NTUC FairPrice, and its competitors' stores on the second day. They learnt about practical techniques for store operation such as merchandise assortment, display and pricing.

On the last day of the workshop, the participants were divided into 4 groups and made a group discussion on the "solutions" to the scenarios given on the first day. After the discussions, the participants made presentations on the "solutions" based on their own SWOT analysis.

## Training Program **Managers of Consumer Co-ops**

Review for the year 2009

he ICA Training program for Managers of Consumer Co-ops has been implemented since 2001. This year, sixteen managers who work for consumer co-operatives applied for the program in Japan. The two training courses have already been carried out successfully with attendance of ten selected trainees from five countries.

#### Miyagi Course 2009

Managers of consumer co-ops from India and Philippines learnt about history & basic values of Miyagi Co-op, present situation of Miyagi Co-op business and direction, planning & opening of co-op stores, sales promotion, merchandising strategy, purchasing policy and buyer education, home delivery business, member's involvement in business

They also visited co-op stores and rival stores, Miyagi Co-op daily food center, Miyagi Co-op re-cycle center, senior citizen's day service home. On the last day of the training course, allthe trainees made presentations on their action plans to be implemented after the training course. They drew up plans to change store layout, to improve display, to increase

membership/sales/product assortment, to train staff, to collect members' opinions, to prevent shoplifting, and so on.

#### Tokyo Course 2009

Managers of consumer co-ops from India, Singapore and Vietnam learnt about Outline of Co-op Tokyo, basic policy on store operation, daily duty of a store manager, countermeasure against rival stores, merchandizing policy, home delivery business, members' activity, member's involvement in business, environmental conservation activities. They also underwent a practical training at a co-op store and visited Co-op Net distribution center, laboratory and co-op members' houses. On the last day of the training course, all the trainees made presentations on their action plans to be implemented after the training course. They drew up plans to change store layout, to improve display, to monitor suppliers for controlling product quality, to improve standards of opening new stores, to control costs (especially labor costs), to collect members' opinions, to encourage members to take part in environmental conservation activities, to develop "bento" to the busy lifestyle customers, to organize the Japan Food Fair, and so on.

## Management of Consumer Co-operatives-2010

The ICA Regional Workshop for Managers for "Management of Consumer Cooperatives in Asia- Pacific" was held on 28-29 April 2010 at NTUC FairPrice Training Institute (FPTI) in Singapore.

Hosted by Singapore National Cooperative Federation (SNCF) and supported by NTUC FairPrice, 23 managers of consumer co-operatives from seven countries (Indonesia, Malaysia, Philippines, Singapore, Sri Lanka, Thailand and Vietnam) actively participated in the two-day workshop.

The workshop commenced with the welcome address by Mrs. Dolly Goh, Chief Executive Officer of the SNCF, followed by opening address by Dr. Chan Ho Choi, Regional Director of the ICA-AP, and a detailed briefing on NTUC Fair Price by

During the two-day workshop, Mr. Beng Lee Kao, Ms. Juliana Tan and Mr. Nger Chiang Tok from NTUC FairPrice covered four important areas of retail business, (i Store Management, (ii) Merchandizing (iii) Store Comparison and (iv) Staf Training. Co-operative Strengthening programme in Nepal supported by the Food and Agriculture Organization of the United Nations (UNFAO) and the International Labour Organization (ILO) have a joint project Job for Peace with the target of creation of job for youth.

The project has various components/programmes. One of its components/programmes in the strengthening of agricultural Co-operatives and the creation of jobs for their youth members in Rautahat and Parsa districts of Nepal.

In order to implement the programmes, an agreement has been made between FAO Nepal and the National Co-operative Federation of Nepal (NCF) which is the apex body of Co-operative movement of Nepal.

The Co-operative strengthening programme has several activities mostly in the areas of training i.e Co-operative Trainers of Training, Leadership Development Training, Capacity Building Training for Co-operative Managers, Member Awarness Campaigning, Agriculture Marketing Training, Product Diversification on Agro Products, Success Case Ruplication etc.

Likewise, the project has other activities development of model Co-operatives, support to women co-operatives and distribution of seed money for the expansion of agriculture business related to

production and marketing through Co-

operatives.

The project includes some major objectives of enhancing the capacity of existing Cooperative through training activities, helping replicate co-operative activities by making study visits and observation and the case studies, developing co-operatives as small and micro-enterprises, supporting for capacity building of community-based organization through training activities, monitoring and evaluating programme and activities of co-operatives regularly.

In Rautahat 14 Co-operatives and in Prasa 16 co-operatives have been selected for the implemention of the Co-operative proramme.

The project activites have been launched since the date of 17th March 2010 in two districts Parsa and Rautahat. In Rautahat 205 male and 201 female altoghether 406 Co-operative members and employees have been trained. Similarly in Parsa, 289 male and 328 female altogher 617 Co-operative members and employees have received different types of trainings.

494 male and 529 female altogether 1023 Co-operative members and staff have been trained during the activites completed. So far as on going programme is concerned almost 40 percent activities have been already completed.

At this function, Shri Ghanshyambhai Amin was felicitated with shawl and Sanman Patra by the Hon'ble Governor for his dynamic and innovative leadership provided for the development of Coperative movements at National and International level as the President of National Co-operative Union of India and Vice-Chairman, International Co-operative Alliance, Asia Pacific Region.

During last 50 years, the sectors like dairy, sugar, banking etc. have flourished in Gujarat State. Amul was the first milk Cooperative to be established in Gujarat which started its business with the initial collection of 250 liters per day. Today there are 16 district Co-operative milk producers unions established on the Amul pattern in Gujarat State. For marketing milk and milk products, the Gujarat State Coop. Milk Marketing Federation was established in the year 1976 as marketing strategy for all these milk unions. This Federation is collecting 90 lakh liters of milk daily from the milk producer members and disburses Rs.20 crore daily to the milk farmers.

With a strong and dynamic Co-operative leadership and a supportive Government, the Co-operative sugar factories flourished in Gujarat, where there is not a single sugar factory established in private sector. The Khedut Sahakari Khand Udyog Factory at Bardoli in Surat District is the first of its kind in Asia.

Similarly, so far as banking sector is concerned there are one State Co-operative Bank, 18 District co-operative banks, 280 urban Co-operative banks and 8240 agricultural credit societies in Gujarat.

There were about 13,000 Co-operative societies around the time Gujarat State came into being in 1960 and nowthere are 63,000 Co-operatives in Gujarat with a membership of one crore and thirty five lakhs. The Gujarat State Co-operative Union specially produced a documentary film on the theme of development of various sectors of Co-operative movement of Gujarat which was repeatedly screened at the function and was applauded for its content.

The 53rd session of United Nations Commission on Status of Women was held in New York from 2-6 March, 2009.

Mrs. Savitri Singh, Adviser-Gender Programme of ICA-AP, on behalf of the ICA and the Gender Equality Committee, attended the opening of the 53rd session of UN Commission on the Status of Women-2009 and high-level round-table on the theme "Equal sharing of responsibilities between women and men, including care

giving in the context of HIV/AIDS".

She was also invited as a panelist from ICA to speak at a side event held on Tuesday, March 3, 2009 at UN Plaza, New York.

The topic of the discussion was "What does equal sharing of responsibilities mean for the rural women"? Mrs. Savitri Singh emphasized on the need of reduction of work over-load on rural women by creating infrastructure.

About 50-60% of the working time of average rural woman and girls is spent in fetching water, collecting fire wood for cooking and fodder for the cattle.

Cooperatives help creating infrastructures and facilities such as water hand pumps, wells and ponds in the village. These facilities will save a lot of time and reduce hardship of women and young girls and in turn they will get some spare time for rest and pursuing education or recreation.

# **International Women's Day 2009: Massage from ICA**

The International Women's Day, marked on March 8 each year, called on all ICA member organizations and co-operators to mobilize and use their socioeconomic strength to contribute to the global struggle against all forms of violence against women and girls.

sub-region of Asia.

The Ministry of Social Affairs , UAE organized two meetings of the Cooperative Forum in Dubai and Abu Dhabi in the years 2007 and 2008 respectively and contributed in the ushering of cooperative era in prosperous part of the world.

Inspired by the lead of UAE Ministry of Social Affairs, the Ministry of Social Affairs, Kingdom of Saudi Arabia organized Cooperative SocieitesForum in Riyadh that was attended by more than 150 delegates from Saudi Arabia and other countries of the GCC sub-region like UAE, Kuwait, Yemen, Baharain and Oman.

On behalf of The Custodian of The Two Holy Mosques, the forum was inaugurated by His Excellency the Minister of Social Affairs and addressed by key cooperators and scholars from Saudi Arabia and participating countries.

Technical presentations on global cooperative perspective were made by resource persons from ICA Asia Pacific namely Mr Shil Kwan Lee, Regional Director Mr Rajiv I.D. Mehta, Deputy Regional Director and Mr Zee Yoong Kang the CEO of Singapore National Trades Unions Congress's co-operative training company, NTUC Learning Hub.

UN Proclamation of International Year of Co-operatives 2012

Geneva, 18 December 2009, for Immediate release - The ICA's new president, Dame Pauline Green, expressed today, on behalf of the entire international co-operative community, support for the United Nations resolution on the role of co-operatives in social development, which proclaims 2012 as the International Year of Co-operatives. UN Member States approved the resolution (A/RES/64/136) on 18 December at the 64th session of the United Nations General Assembly.

The UN, resolution recognises that the cooperative business model is a major factor of economic and social development, promoting the fullest possible participation in the economic and social development of people in both the developed ar developing world, and that, in particula cooperatives contribute to the eradication of poverty. The resolution also encourag all governments to create a more supportienvironment for co-operative development, particularly when it comes securing finances for capacity-building.

"The International Year of the C operatives is a well timed event th represents the depth of understanding of t entire co-operative movement," sa Pauline Green, ICA's first-ever wom president. "The co-operative model is better choice and offers the basis for a mo sustainable way to do business wh compared to traditional capitalist mode now under scrutiny. What sets this mod apart from others is that all co-operative whether they are small farmers or lar consumer-owned entities, share the valu of democracy, solidarity, equality, self-he and self responsibility, creating business that serve the greater good as opposed maximising profit for the very few.

Iain Macdonald, Director-General of IC expressed his support for the resolution is statement at ICA's recent Board meetindicating that the International Year of Coperatives is "well timed to remind world that there is more than one way doing business and that in a glo economy we all have to work toget? Whether it is in tackling the econorisis, the threat of climate change, or for security issues co-operative enterproffers real hope of solutions to the problems, and I have no doubt that increased profile offered by International Year will achieve grathings."

Mr. Jakhar highlighted the role of ICA in the present global economic crisis and committed full support of IFFCO in the resurgence of co-operative movement across the globe.

Mr. Satoshi Takano, Deputy Director, Management Planning Department, Zenrosai, Japan made a presentation on the IAS and touched upon the peripheral issues relevant to co-operatives focusing on the basic aspect as to how should we tackle with the convergence on "Financial Instruments with characteristics of Equity" between FASB and IASB? He said that ICA IAS working group still had to work to ensure full recognition and understanding of the special nature of the co-operative enterprise by the international accounting standard setters. Mr. Shil-Kwan Lee desired that the IAS working group recommendations could be shared with the members of ICA-AP by the ICA HQ.



"Together with the Global 300, an exhibition and trade fair next year, should raise our profile even more and convince national and inter-

national opinion leaders of the importance of the cooperative movement in the world economy.

"The Fair will benefit our membership in a commercial as well as a political sense.

"We have seen the role of co-operative trade fairs increase throughout the world in recent years, and it is time that our movement maximised the opportunity to expand trade within the movement as well as with other organisations."

## Canadians harness hidden potential

recent visit to Canada gave ICA Director-General, Iain Macdonald, the opportunity to speak to many Canadian co-operators about current ICA initiatives like the restructuring process and *Global 300*. Iain reports back from his visit.

## University of Sherbrooke, Quebec

661 was delighted to be invited by Michel Lafleur, Director of the Institute of Research and Education for Co-operatives and Mutuals (IRECUS) based at the University of Sherbrooke, Quebec to attend their thirty year anniversary celebrations and the twenty-five year anniversary of their Masters Degree in Co-operative Management.

My after-dinner speech concerned the importance of co-operative teaching and research linked with practical implementation. I stressed the need to generate a good evidence base and used the *Global 300* as an example.

The IRECUS Anniversary coincided with a conference of the Association of Universities of the Americas in Studies on Co-operatives and Associations

(UNIRCOOP). UNIRCOOP is creating a network of distance learning and cooperative management in Latin America.

I discussed the work of the ICA with conference participants and I also met with ICA-Americas Regional Director, Manuel Mariño.

At a meeting with students studying the Masters Degree, I spoke again about ICA activities, in particular *Global* 300. I also joined Professor Jean-Pierre Girard, a member of our IHCO executive, at his lecture on development and management of cooperatives."

#### CCC

"The annual congress of the Conseil Canadien de la Cooperation (CCC) was held on 22-24 June in Quebec City. My presentation, as part of their theme, "La cooperation: des ponts ouverts sur l'avenir" ("Co-operation: bridges to the future") looked at how the ICA supports the French-speaking Canadian co-operative movement.

I discussed the latest initiatives of ICA, its strategy and restructuring process and how the Canadian movement has a very important role to play, not least, in development.

I found the CCC very welcoming and supportive in particular its new Director General, Brigitte Gagne and president, Michel Rouleau. It was a very inclusive conference with a particular emphasis on youth."

#### CCA

"A few days later, the Canadian Co-operative Association (CCA) held their congress, titled "Harness the hidden potential", from 26-29 June in St Johns, Newfoundland.

Before the conference I met with the CCA board to discuss the current ICA restructuring process in response to concerns about the role of an apex organisation within ICA and proposals for a new subscription formula.

This well organised conference attracted excellent representation from all over Canada. Conference delegates expressed great support for ICA activities and there was particular interest in the Global 300 project.

At the conference I spoke on: "Global perspectives on cooperation and partnerships," with Jonathan Rothschild, a senior economist at the Canadian International Development Agency and Rizal Malik from Transparency International.

My overall impression is that the Canadian co-operative movement is in excellent shape and keen to be part of an effective global organisation. Our emphasis on profile-raising both within and without the co-operative movement that stresses the essential differences between co-operative and investor owned business, received especially broad support."

The United Nations and the International Labour Organisation issued media releases in addition to messages which were distributed through their networks and posted on their websites. The Food and Agriculture Organisation (FAO) also issued a message as did the International Federation of Agricultural Producers (IFAP).

The governments of Myanamr, the Republic of Trinidad & Tobago and South Africa also organised events to bring stakeholders on cooperatives together.

Even non-ICA members from co-operatives in the Canary Islands to food co-operatives in California (USA) carried links to the ICA message as well as the message of ICA's partners.

As the IDC message notes co-operatives have in many ways been pioneers of CSR. However, the co-operative movement has not done as much as it could have in measuring this co-operative difference. It has allowed others to claim credit for the concept. It is time we developed a consistent and rigorous framework to better measure the way we operate - to demonstrate the combined economic and social benefits, the co-operative difference.

## General Assembly Preview

Up to 1,000 delegates are expected to attend this year's General Assembly.

These biannual meetings are the largest regular co-operative event in the world.



The theme for this year's General Assembly is Innovation in Co-operative Business.

This subject will be picked up and reflected from a variety of different perspectives in the events which are planned for the week 14-19 October.

The General Assembly itself, will be formally opened on the morning of Thursday 18 October. Speakers in the opening session include Sean Kian Peng, Chair of host, SNCF, Dr Vivan Balakrishan, Singaporean Minister for Community Development and Ivano Barberini, ICA President.

The opening ceremony will be followed by three keynote speakers, see below.

Two concurrent business sessions will commence immediately after lunch and offer participants the opportunity to hear from a wide of co-operative speakers outlining best practice examples of innovation. This will also be the occasion for the launch of this year's **Global 300** list.

The second day of the General Assembly will hear reports on the conclusions of the previous day's business sessions.

This will be followed, by what promises to be a very interesting panel session on the International Accounting Standards and how they are affecting co-operatives.

The afternoon of the second day will deal with ICA statutory business, including elections for the board and the Audit and Control Committee. One of the most interesting discussions is expected to be on proposals for possible governance and restructuring changes for the ICA. The General Assembly will also learn who is this year's Rochdale Pioneers Award winner. The host city for the next GA is also expected to be announced.

#### Gun-Britt Mårtensson: "A cradle for democratic behaviour"

Suzanne Henderson, ICA Digest, Associate Editor interviewed Swedish co-operative leader Gun-Britt Martensson on the eve of her retirement as chair of the largest Swedish apex body for co-operative housing, HSB: Riksförbund (Union of Housing Co-operatives) There are over half a million members of HSB housing co-ops in Sweden and Gun-Britt has been a co-op housing resident since her early teens. A former mayor and current member of the ICA Board, she is a tireless campaigner for promoting "the co-operative difference". Gun-Britt spoke to the Digest about her vision for building a better world through 'cooperativism'.

Digest: How did you become involved in the cooperative movement? GM: "My first exposure to

co-operatives came as a teenager when my family moved into co-op housing in Sweden in the 60s. Becoming a member in a housing co-operative was really something to be proud of as it meant that you could save money (to buy into the coop) and that you were considered a good family -'good citizens' if you like. I can still remember the look of immense pride on my father's face when he announced that the family had been accepted into the co-

As an alternative to private ownership or rental situations, housing co-operatives have an excellent reputation in Sweden. They are 'tenant owner associations' which means that you own the right to the use of your flat for an unlimited time, but as a co-owner of the co-operative you have duties as well as rights.


Members are involved in the governance of the cooperative, although most housing co-ops buy in important services such as building maintenance and financial management from the 33 regional organisations that make up our apex body.

I am totally committed to the concept of co-operative housing and still live in one today. It is a mid-size cooperative with 400 members. We come together every fortnight to cook and socialise. There is a yoga club, a choir and many activities for older people. The retired members have just bought a wine cellar and they have a travel club as well.

In Sweden you can see the difference between rental housing and co-operative housing very clearly. Members get all the benefits of community-orientated living. This idea that your home your most valuable asset - is looked after by your neighbours helps to shape the co-operative spirit in individuals.

Co-operatives in whatever form, the world over, are so important because they are the cradle for learning democratic behaviour."

#### Canadian housing co-ops have 2020 vision

#### Housing

he Co-operative Housing Federation of Canada (CHF Canada), the peak body for housing co-ops in the region, has launched a new initiative to help housing co-ops face the challenges of an uncertain future.

The 2020 Vision project recognises that the co-op housing movement in Canada is at a crossroads.

"The co-ops we live in are getting older. The needs of co-op members are changing. With very few exceptions, we are not adding new co-ops to our sector," says CHF Canada.

In Canada almost all housing co-ops operate under government housing programs that provide financial assistance, limit their purposes to non-profit affordable rental housing and provide a safety net if co-ops fall into financial difficulty. Over the next decade these programs will end for many co-ops, leaving them to operate without government support.

CHF Canada wants to ensure that Canada's investment in co-op housing is safeguarded and that the principles of member control and non-profit ownership are preserved. The 2020 Vision project will help housing co-ops build a strong foundation for the future, based on shared cooperative values.

The Project's name comes in part from a question CHF Canada is asking its members: "What kind of a co-op do you want to be in the year 2020?"



To help housing co-ops prepare for the future, 2020 Vision has developed a series of educational and training resources and a certification programme.

The International Health Co-operative Organisation (IHCO) Board meeting in Mörsil, Sweden on 23 May, unanimously agreed to incorporate the Asia-Pacific Health Co-operative Organisation (APHCO) led by Dr Yasuyuki Takahashi, President of the Japanese Health Co-operative Association (JHCA).

IHCO President Dr José Carlos Guisado also reported on ICA strategic planning and restructuring, and development of the American Cooperative and Mutual Network (ACYM) of which IHCO is a permanent member.

IHCO members adopted a protocol to facilitate development of an ambitious information gathering project on health co-operatives throughout the world, with the 1997 UN Report as the founding basis.

#### Public-private co-operation on health systems

o-operation between public administrations and private agents, especially co-operatives, was the main topic of debate at a conference held in Östersund, Stockholm on May 22. The meeting organised by Swedish health co-operative, Medicoop and sponsored by IHCO brought more than forty medical professionals together to discuss, "Co-

operation, subcontracting and public procurement within healthcare and welfare".

A conference manifesto was produced that expressed the desire of health cooperatives to take an active part in improving the quality of healthcare available in their regions, and committed co-operatives to advancing public-private collaboration in order to develop more

just healthcare systems.

The Östersund document also warned: "At the same time, we wish to express our concern that [the] misinterpretation of procurement rules, historical differences and political rigidity risk[s] an impoverishment of public healthcare, and might eventually even lead to an outright oligopoly in this important social sector".

#### Way forward in Colombia



National meeting of health co-ops in Colombia ore than 3 0 0 people met to discuss current issues of concern in Colombian healthcare at a national meeting of health

co-ops in Bogota, Colombia on June 7-8. The meeting titled: "Towards the consolidation of a co-operative health model for Colombians", was organised by the Confederation of Cooperatives of Colombia (CONFECOOP), with support from Saludcoop and Coomeva, leading Colombian healthcare co-ops.

Dr Guisado spoke about the "Current situation of healthcare co-operatives in the world. Convergence and collaboration of co-operatives with governments in the field of healthcare", and described innovative models of collaboration between

healthcare co-ops and public administrations. The event sparked widespread interest in the healthcare sector and Columbian media.

Dr Josep Gras and Estanislau Simón from the Espriu Foundation, described the cooperative healthcare model operating in Spain. Almir Gentil, President Unimed Foundation, spoke about health and social reform in Brazil through medical co-operatives.

#### Social dialogue in Prague

The 3rd Co-operative Convention on European Social Dialogue, was held in Prague, on 18-19 June. The Convention received the support of EU Commissioner Vladimir Spidla and the Czech Government for the objective of creating social and economic change through cooperatives.



A conference on "Poverty reduction and advantage of co-operatives in protecting small farmers and rural entrepreneurs" was held on 13 July.

On 14 July there was a symposium on trade networking, to encourage and motivate co-operatives in the region to establish business contacts with overseas co-ops to take advantage of market-driven economies.

2007 International Coperative Day celebrations were followed by a Student Co-operatives Forum at the Lesotho Coperative College in Maseru, capital of the mountain kingdom of Lesotho. Developing co-operation in the curriculum and establishing youth and student co-operatives was the clear message.

Two hundred students, teachers and government ministers attended as well as representatives from ICA Regional Office in Nairobi, Professor Suleman Chambo, Principal of Moshi University College of Co-operation and Business Studies, Tanzania and Mervyn Wilson, Chief Executive of the Co-operative College UK.

In his opening address, Khotso Matla, assistant minister Lesotho Department of Trade, Industry, Co-ops and Marketing said, "Student cooperatives offer a model for youth groups that want to combine enterprise with ethics. It is an enterprise with added benefits, requiring young people to trade ethically and work democratically."

Youth co-ops were flourishing in Lesotho said Mr Matla. "All of us here are going to witness the turning of a new chapter in the structure of the Cooperative Movement in


Lesotho, where for the first time we have fourteen co-operatives owned and governed by young people between the age of 15 and 25," he said.

Matla contrasted this with the problem of aging membership in many established co-ops and spoke about the government's concern to maintain succession in cooperatives through the involvement of young people.

A highlight of the Forum was the presentation of over twenty case studies by school and youth cooperatives including a co-op whose local language name translates as "youth is the flower". This co-op provides services to their school and community such as catering, equipment hire, banking and raising poultry a common income generator among poorer communities in Lesotho.

Another co-op based at a school in Maseru is the Poverty Fighters Multi-Purpose Cooperative. It registered in 2004 and is now addressing the challenge of how to sustain the co-op when student-members go on to further education or return to remote mountain villages during the holidays. Malealea makes a range of products from stone industry. When they discovered the skills they needed to work the stone were found among prisoners, they negotiated with the department for correction to train within the prison service.

The Young Farmers Development Society began back in 2002 with six members to create jobs and alleviate poverty through income generation. It has grown to fifteen members and like many other co-ops it has a wider social objective - a focus on HIV/AIDS education, vital because Lesotho has one of the highest HIV infection rates in sub-Saharan Africa.

The Elephant and Eagle Society chose their name because the eagle flies higher and can see further while the might of the elephant can make things happen. They have already applied for funding to support a fishery project because they want their co-operative to create jobs and generate income.

Mervyn Wilson, Chief Executive of the UK's Co-operative College, led discussion about what actions were needed by government, schools, established co-ops and young people to create an environment in which co-operatives can flourish.

A school co-op in He congratulated the Lesotho government for taking the initiative to register to sell into the tourist student co-operatives and drew on examples from the UK to demonstrate how to get 'co-operation' across a wide range of curriculum areas.

## Obituary—Respected Australian co-operator dies



he founding executive officer of the Co-operative Federation of New South Wales (CFNSW), Don Kinnersley, has died. Don retired from his position as CEO of the Dairyfarmers Co-operative in 1993 and was approached by the then Minster for Cooperatives, Gerry Peacock. The Government saw the continuing need for an organisation to represent co-operatives to replace the Australian Association of Co-operatives, which had just gone into liquidation.

"He was executive officer until 2001 and then became Federation Chair for more than two years to assist me to settle into the position and to avoid the sudden loss of all that sectoral knowledge that he had accumulated over a lifetime, " said Helen McCall, current executive officer CFNSW. "Even after his retirement from the Board, Don was always available to offer advice and a different perspective - although his attention became healthily diverted by his involvement in Probus and, lately, especially, his fundraising for cochlear implants," said Helen.

skimmed milk powder and massive losses suffered by farmers, due to floods during the last monsoon season," said Parthibhai Bhatol, chairman of GCMMF.

#### Italian co-ops go global

n a major development for the Italian co-operative movement, the Ministry of Foreign Trade and Confcooperative and Legacoop, the two main Italian member organisations of ICA, signed an Agreement on the 3 July.

Legacoop and Confcooperative successfully lobbied the Ministry to recognise that the co-operative model is one of the most suitable tools to allow small to medium enterprises (SMEs) to face international markets.

Italian co-operatives can take advantage, for the first time, of a specific Agreement in the field of internationalisation. To improve international trade activities, areas Legacoop identified for development Confcooperative include networking skills, have submitted industrial collaboration, commercial alliances, technology transfer, access to credit, technical assistance for projects aimed at creating productive chains and collaborations using the Italian model of SMEs and industrial clusters.

#### Farmer-owned co-operatives in a globalised food system

Professor Fabio Chaddad, Assistant Professor, IBMEC Business School, Sao Paulo, Brazil, was keynote speaker at the annual Agribusiness Co-operative Leadership and Governance Forum in Sydney, Australia, in November last year.

Fabio Chaddad is an internationally recognised authority on structural change in cooperatives that have adapted to competitive challenges. A graduate of the University of Sao Paulo in Brazil and the University of Missouri- Columbia, USA, he completed his PhD on agricultural co-operatives with Professor Michael Cook at the University of Missouri and was awarded the Edward G. Nourse Award for Outstanding Doctoral Dissertation from the National Council of Farmer Co-operatives in the USA. He has researched and consulted to co-operatives throughout the world particularly in relation to governance structures, investment behaviour and supply chain management. Here, he sets out the challenges and obstacles for co-operatives in a globalised food system. In this article he draws on Australian examples.

t is argued by both academics and nonacademics that the importance of farmer-owned cooperatives will decline as the agrifood sector becomes increasingly industrialised and global.

Moreover, co-operatives have financial and governance constraints that their for-profit, proprietary counterparts do not have.

Alternatively, co-operatives might increase their participation in the agrifood sector to ameliorate market failures, reduce transaction costs and add value to farmers' incomes. Thus,

co-operatives could increasingly become farmers' 'integrating agencies.'

Agriculture is now integrated with upstream and downstream agrifood chain participants due to rising incomes and urbanisation in the developing world, affluent and demanding food consumers in the developed world and rapid technological change and globalisation.

Generally, these private sector tightly-coordinated supply chains (particularly large multinational food processors, fastfood restaurant chains and global retail chains) have increasingly differentiated markets.

Agrifood markets have high food quality and safety demands, are more concentrated and integrated and are more open to international competition. These changes offer new opportunities to highly competitive farmers' organisations but are a serious threat to less competitive farmers' organisations.

More importantly, the capitalintensive nature of agroindustrialisation can be explained by the increased scale of farms, agribusiness firms and food processors; the growing importance of intangible and knowledge assets; employment of professional managers; and the increased domestic and international competition fostered by trade liberalisation and reduced government involvement in agriculture.

Traditional co-operative ownership, capitalisation, management, and governance might limit adjustment for agricultural co-operatives during transition periods.

At the same time, globalisation, consolidation and vertical integration are associated with market failures and suggest the need for defensiveoriented collective action in agriculture such as Australia's Murray Goulburn Co-operative Co. Ltd.

In addition, changes in food demand (such as high quality food products with information about guaranteed origin, environmental sustain-

ability and fair trade) in both the developed and developing worlds suggest opportunities for value-added strategies for farmer-owned co-operatives such as the Dairy Farmers Group in Australia.

Are co-operatives well-positioned to survive and prosper in an increasingly dynamic, complex, vertically integrated and capital-intensive industry? They might be if able to leverage proximity and trust with their own farmer-members, and find innovative solutions to their structural weak-nesses.

The property rights structure of traditional cooperatives often leads to conflicts over residual claims and decision control. In particular, financial management issues (such as acquiring and redeeming members' equity capital) are major constraints to cooperative growth and sustainability.

Traditional co-operatives in advanced agricultural countries are adapting to changes in their institutional and competitive environment by following three broad capi-

tal-seeking strategies:

I) the proportionality strategy of internally generated capital;

2) the amelioration of the vaguely defined property rights constraints featured by traditional cooperatives, including the emergence of 'new generation' cooperatives with tradable and/or appreciable shares; and

3) the acquisition of outside, nonmember equity and quasi-equity capital.

Yet, some co-operatives have been forced or have opted to restructure as proprietary firms, have liquidated their businesses, merged with other co-operatives or become targets of a corporate acquisition.

Many co-operative and mutual organisations have converted because they were unable to resolve internal problems such as a disruptive business environment, weak governance systems, a lack of member control, and providing limited horizon members with access to unallocated equity and reserves.

In the future, the success of agricultural co-operatives responding to agricultural industrialisation will depend on competitive strategy, modern organisational structure and the strategy-structure align-

ment.

Yet, it is important for cooperative leaders contemplating organisational change to realise that the choice of organisational form depends on the fundamental orientation of the producermembers especially their communication model.

Co-operative housing members socialising Digest: What has your work in the cooperative sector encom-

passed?
GM: "I was mayor for many years in Östersund a town in Northern Sweden known for its cooperatives. This region has an above average level of co-operative housing as well as co-ops in other sectors like childcare and aged care.

As part of my mayoral work, I was active in the cooperative movement, and as a housing policies politician in the national arena. I was asked to become chair and president of Sweden's biggest apex organisation for co-operative housing, HSB.

I thought this was a great idea and I took up the position in 1997. Like the ICA, which has the mission to give voice to all co-operatives, to market the co-operative difference, and to foster networking between co-operatives, HSB also seeks to unite and represent and, together with members, to establish better ways of working together.

I was also appointed vicechair of the Swedish Cooperative Centre (SCC), a role I will continue when Kent-Olof Stigh, my successor at HSB, takes over. SCC is an organisation that provides co-perativism as a tool to third world countries. SCC aims at giving people different ways to cooperate out of poverty. This idea of self-help (not charity) through empowerment is similar to what happened in Sweden in the early 1900s with the setting up of the welfare state.

A hundred years ago, Sweden and Norway were the poorest countries in Europe. What really changed this was the peoples' democratic movements. The welfare state was founded on the idea that welfare is just as much about how the wealth of a society is distributed to all citizens, as it is about the economic state of the nation. It was a question of people coming together, learning how to work as a group and doing it better than as individuals.

I believe that you have to educate the individual through involvement. You can have a lot of 'wealth' in a society without having 'welfare', and cooperativism is a great tool to teach people how to spread the wealth to each

Digest: Describe your involvement in the ICA over the years.

GM: In Sweden there are over 535 000 members of HSB housing co-ops so we need a unified vision. But, without the international experience gained through working for the ICA, I could not have brought my organisation as far.



My first ICA General Assembly was in Quebec in 1999. I heard about "marketing the cooperative difference" and I learnt about the importance of a code of governance. I took the chairs of my 33 regional organisations to Manchester to learn about it too. For me, being part of the international movement is like going to a co-operative university.

I became a member of the ICA Housing committee in 1999 and later the chair of the Auditing and Control Committee. In 2003, I was elected to the ICA Board. The opportunity to take part in global meetings made me realise the importance of a focussed and unified ICA if we truly want the global body to be a custodian of the idea of democratic control.

It is more important than ever to have a strong cooperative movement. People need to be involved in something bigger than the individual.

Digest: What are your thoughts about the current ICA restructuring process?

GM: "It is important to do what we are doing now, working with the governance and restructuring issues, to cope with a rapidly changing world. We have the same goals as the past, but we need to find new means of reaching those objectives. We are working to find other ways of helping people understand the value of a world-wide cooperative movement and, importantly, to understand that this is worth paying for.

We need to find new ways to involve members and to give something back. Activities like the Digest, Global 300 and exchange of best practice are very important in this regard. Global 300, for example, is an excellent way to highlight the fiscal importance of cooperativism in global economies, but its real value is in making people 'alive' to the value of working collectively.

Former UN secretarygeneral, Kofi Annan, spoke often about the rising importance of CSR, or corporate citizenship - and the biggest capitalist enterprises are recognising this too. Young people today are looking for organisations that have values other than making money. While many of the world's largest companies are desperate to attach themselves to one or other of these 'human' values, cooperatives express these values already, but they have not been good at publicising them. There are a lot of cooperative "wanabees" out there - and if we are not able to make evident the difference between the original and the copy we are in trouble. We have both the hardware and software, but too little "soulware". We do not tell the story of cooperativism very well.

Digest: What are your thoughts on the current global co-operative movement?

GM: "If we want all people to have welfare, then I believe that there is only one way and that is through cooperativism. From South Africa to Honduras I have seen co-operativism as a tool for spreading welfare in many parts of the world.

When people come together and realise the strength of collectivism, they are able to do things you wouldn't have imagined possible - they can save money and build housing, leading to other forms of co-

operative activity such as childcare, aged care and the spread of gender equality. Cooperativism was founded on the idea of "one member one vote" at a time when the political ideal was "one man one vote", so it has always encompassed the idea of gender equality.

I think the challenge for the global movement is twofold. We need to spread cooperativism to the third world, to get it out there to everybody. Secondly, we need to get better at exchanging best practice.

To me, the most important cooperative principle, in addition to democratic control, is the sixth principle: co-operation among co-operatives. We need to learn from each other, and

the more we learn from each other, the better we get together at spreading the co-operative message.

Hence, rather than dispensing aid, which is a 'here and now' solution, we have a long-term learning situation for building a better world."
