The entrepreneurship training approach is expected to lead to new solutions and recommendations, help the participants learn from best practices and foster new ideas and innovation in the field of youth and cooperative entrepreneurship.

World Cooperative Monitor 2019



The International Cooperative Alliance (ICA) and the European Research Institute on Cooperative and Social Enterprises (Euricse) recently released the 2019 issue of the World Cooperative Monitor (WCM), now in its eighth year. The report explores the economic and social impact of the largest cooperatives and mutuals enterprises (CMEs) worldwide; ranks the Top 300 and provides an analysis of CMEs contributions to meeting the UN Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs). The top 300 CMEs report a total turnover of over two trillion USD (2,034.98 billion USD) based on 2017 financial data. This year's results show an increased presence of the insurance sector in the Top 300; insurance accounts for 39%, agriculture 31.7%, wholesale and retail trade 17.7%, banking and financial services 7%, industry and utilities 1%, and health, education and social care 1%. There is also new data on employment and cooperative types. In the Top 300, based on the ratio of turnover over gross domestic product (GDP) per capita ranking, two Indian producer cooperatives are in the second and third positions, the Gujarat Cooperative Milk Marketing Federation Limited, and the Indian Farmers Fertilizer Cooperative Limited. The report contains a special analysis of the top 300 and SDG8 (inclusive and sustainable economic growth, full and productive employment and decent work for all - SDG 8) and includes three case studies from Up Groupe (France), KRIBHCO (India), and SOK (Finland).

ICA-AP ACTIVITIES

ICA-AP Partnership with IRMA

In 2018, ICA-AP and the Institute of Rural Management, Anand (IRMA), one of India's premier rural management institutes, signed an MoU to collaborate on areas of mutual interest. These included research on legal framework for cooperatives and exploring work and ownership in Indian cooperatives, workshops to assert the impact of cooperatives in empowering young people and supporting youth entrepreneurship, and trainings for cooperators, among other areas.

A significant milestone has also been the engagement of students of the Executive Post Graduate Diploma in Management (Rural) PGDMX (R) course in internships at ICA-AP as well as with some of our members. The PGDMX (R) course prepares young managers to assume challenge-filled responsibilities in rural cooperatives and development organisations. Since 2018, ICA-AP has had one intern join each Summer for a three-month internship where the candidates have worked on research, policy and communication related assignments.

This year, two students from the PGDMX (R) course, are undertaking their Project Work Module Internship with ICA-AP members. Mr. Manvir Singh is interning with ANGKASA (the Malaysian National Cooperative Movement) to 'Examine Factors of Production in Scaling up Dairy Production', and Mr. Yogesh Kumar Joshi with the Nepal Agriculture Cooperative Central Federation Ltd on the 'Design and Development of Business Plan for The Tulasibhanjyang Small Farmers Agriculture Cooperative Limited'. ICA-AP is proud to facilitate this exchange and act as a bridge between academic institutions focusing on cooperatives and international cooperative movements.

NEWS FROM MEMBERS

Second ICA-AP & KFCC Capacity Building Workshop on Sustainable Development Partnership among Credit and Banking Cooperatives

The Second ICA-AP and KFCC (Korean Federation of Community Credit Cooperatives) Capacity Building Workshop on Sustainable Development Partnership among Credit and Banking Cooperatives was held in Korea from December 23 to 28, 2019. The objective of this workshop was to reunite and strengthen the credit and banking cooperatives in the region by establishing a vibrant

platform. Nine delegates representing China, Kyrgyzstan, Malaysia, Myanmar, and Vietnam participated in the workshop and discussed ways to further develop and activate financial cooperatives in the Asia Pacific region.

The participants paid a visit to one of the local community credit cooperatives, Seongnamjeil Saemaul Geumgo in Gyeonggi province. At the welcome ceremony, President & Chairperson of KFCC, Mr. Park Cha Hoon extended his warm wishes and said that this workshop will improve communication and cooperation to provide new impetus for financial cooperatives in the region.KFCC will continue to promote the transfer of Korean financial cooperative model (Saemaul Geumgo) and share achievements and progress of the workshop with member organizations of ICA-AP committee on Credit and Banking.

CREATHON 2020 organised by SNCF

The first Creathon 2020 was organised by the Singapore National Co-operative Federation (SNCF) on January 18 and 19 at 'A Good Space' at Clarke Quay (https://www.facebook.com/AGoodSpaceSG/). 200 young individuals participated in two categories: School category for secondary school students and Open category for youth in the age group of 17-35. The objectives of Creathon were to:

- Raise awareness about cooperatives
- Create new cooperatives that address social issues
- Foster strong social enterprise community
- Instill entrepreneurship and cooperative mindset when young

The event was kickstarted by an opening address from Mr. Kwek Kok Kwong, Chairman, SNCF. This was followed by a session on the basics of cooperatives which included introduction to cooperative principles, the global cooperative scenario, comparison of cooperatives with other enterprises, and steps to set up a cooperative in Singapore. The first session in the open category was by Mr. Justin Lee from the Institute of Policy studies, Singapore. His presentation on, 'From Designing Cooperatives to Designing Cooperation' touched on the application of 'design thinking' in the development of cooperatives. Mr. Mathew Poh, from The Caffeine Experience motivated the audience through his personal experience from being an offender to an entrepreneur. Mr. Aaron Soon, co-founder of Bev.Eat Pte Lt shared his insights on how the first two cooperative principles ensure cooperatives are structured to scale and sustain social impact. After the knowledge sessions, the participants gathered in groups to fine tune their ideas.

The second day began with Mr. Roy Chong, a founding partner of FRESHER, an online meal delivery service, explaining that while starting any enterprise, one must tackle different elements like strategy, competitors, sales, human resource and to address the right elements in their order of importance. Mr. Daniel The, who defined himself as the offender turned social entrepreneur,

highlighted the social element of his venture, Popejai Pte. Ltd. He shared that 90% of Popejai's workforce is derived from marginalised sections of the community. The final session was by Ms. Tan Bao Yi of NVPC Knowledge and Insights on, 'Sector insights of 2019', with special emphasis on environment, low income and mental health .

The final session was the pitch by participants on their cooperative business plans to a five-member panel of judges. The evaluation criteria included: idea/ concept (40%), social impact (30%), application of idea (20%), and quality of pitch (10%).

The first prize in the open category was bagged by the team for their pitch to set up a tourism cooperative.

VAMNICOM celebrates its Foundation Day

The Vaikunth Bhai Mehta National Institute of Cooperative Management (VAMNICOM) celebrated its 54th Foundation Day on January 15, 2020! The dignitaries invited were Shri. Sanjeev Kumar Balyan, Minister of State for Animal Husbandry, Dairy and Fisheries; Dr. T.N. Prakash Kammardi, Professor (retired), University of Agriculture Sciences, Bengaluru; and Mr. Balsubramanian lyer, Regional Director ICA-AP.

Dr. K.K. Tripathy, Director VAMNICOM and Center for International Cooperation and Training in Agricultural Banking (CICTAB), in his opening address touched upon the achievements of the Institute in developing new curriculum (cyber security, gender budgeting), bringing out research papers, ensuring successful campus placement and developing infrastructure to lay the foundation for growth. Shri. Sanjeev Kumar Balyan, in his video message, highlighted the importance of cooperative education and the vital role played by VAMNICOM. Prof. Kammardi in his keynote address on, "Doubling Farmers Income through Cooperatives to help India Attain \$5 Trillion Economy," touched on price pressure faced by farmers and their inability to be price makers. He cooperation is an ideal solution as it enhances collective bargaining power, provides economy of scale, and creation of utilities in time, space and form. Some of the measures he suggested were:

farm equipment aggregation and distribution, precise forecasting and supply projection, precision farming, and online cooperative platform to market agriculture and horticultural commodities.

Mr. Iyer in his address said that commitment to education has been one of the cooperative movement's core Principles since they were first formulated. Early cooperators lived in societies where education was reserved for the privileged. They recognized then that education was fundamental to transforming lives. This philosophy can be seen in the thinking of Shri Vaikunth bhai Mehta who realized the importance of cooperative education and training for the successful functioning of the cooperative movement in the right direction. As Minister, he got the Cooperative Societies Act amended to make it statutory obligation for all cooperatives making profit to contribute to the education fund of the institute to manage the cooperative training colleges and schools established in the districts. When cooperatives fail, it is mainly as a consequence of members not knowing their responsibility, directors not fulfilling their fiduciary duties, and staff not being trained adequately. This inability of members of societies to manage the affairs of their own societies is owing to lack of education in cooperation and training in business. The remedy lies not in tightening the reins of control but in providing more and more of education for the general body of members and for office-bearers, and in fostering habits of self-government and mutual control. He called on VAMNICOM, with its proud privilege of association of Vainkuthbhai's name to continue to translate into action Vikuthbhai's vision and aspirations regarding cooperative education and training. This required education which is forward looking; culture which is entrepreneurial; and developing students with a sense of **empathy** for the people.

NEW MEMBER

Cooperative Work Agency, Palestine

The Cooperative Work Agency (CWA) was launched towards the end of 2017, following the approval of the Law on Cooperative. It was established to fulfil two major roles:

- a) Legal role/function covering the registration, financial and administrative audit of cooperatives, and other regulatory procedures such as liquidation of cooperatives and investigation into cooperative financial/administrative issues. This role is currently active.
- b) Promoting and supporting the development of cooperatives through education/awareness raising (to be institutionalized through the Cooperative Development Institute) as well as facilitating cooperative access to funding and capacity building in the area of business planning (to be institutionalised through the Cooperative Development Fund). These will take some time to fully operationalize.

The strategic objectives of CWA as spelled out in the 2017-22 Strategy are as follows: build an institutional environment that enables the cooperative movement to grow and develop, improve the financial and organizational performance of cooperatives, and expand cooperative sectors/areas to include new tapes/modalities of cooperation. Research watch

The following research activities were undertaken by ICA-AP as part of the ICA-EU partnership to improve knowledge on cooperatives, share information and promote capacity of cooperatives.

The research on Mapping of Cooperatives launched at a full scale in the Asia and Pacific region

The ICA-AP launched the research on Mapping of Cooperatives in December. The mapping research supported by an online questionnaire seeks to collect exhaustive, consistent and reliable data on the cooperative situation in every region and across sectors, in order to provide an accurate picture of the movement to both cooperators and external stakeholders. In the Asia and Pacific region, Iran and Philippines were covered in the pilot phase. The reports for the two pilot countries have been finalised and will soon be available for public view through the #coops4dev website. We aim to cover as many countries as possible and hope that our members will support us in carrying out the research on mapping of cooperative statistics in their respective countries.

<u>Progress on country snapshots:</u> The status of cooperatives in four countries - Papua New Guinea (PNG), Fiji, New Zealand, and the Philippines were mapped through secondary research. The key parameters included, contribution of cooperatives to the national economy, sectoral distribution of cooperatives, genesis and evolution of cooperatives, historical and current laws on cooperatives, and association of national cooperatives with the international cooperative movement and ICA, amongst others. The country snapshots for nine countries are available on the ICA AP website for public view.

A tête-à-tête with Ms. Devika Singh who has recently joined the AP unit of the #coops4dev team.



Ms. Devika Singh

Q1. Hi Devika! Welcome! Before we start, can you tell us about your background?

Thank you! I have studied English Literature and Public Policy, both at the Masters' level. My past experience has been as a Policy Analyst at a global climate change resilience advisory firm. I've worked on projects in climate change adaptation, climate change and water risk assessments, climate finance, and communications and knowledge outreach at the local, national and international levels. I have also worked in agriculture, trying to set up a small organic farming enterprise.

Q2. That's interesting, Devika. So what inspired you to work intensively on agriculture and climate action?

I initially got into agriculture as my father does organic farming in Uttar Pradesh, India. That experience introduced me to the strong influence of multiple environmental and government policy factors on farming at the local level, which became the push for me to study public policy and work in climate change. I am strongly interested in the policy framework and climate-related factors that form the larger enabling or disabling environment for sustainable food production and livelihoods.

Q3. Great! What is your role going to be at ICA and how does working with cooperatives align with what you have done and want to do?

I will be working with ICA-AP as the Communications and Member Development Officer for the ICA-EU Partnership: Cooperatives in Development: People-centered Businesses in Action. In this role, I will be responsible for implementing the joint visibility strategy and in stewardship of members. From my experience, I feel the cooperative business model can be a very suitable model to address a number of current environmental, social and economic problems: from climate action and sustainable food production to sustainable livelihood generation and economic growth. I'm very excited about working with ICA-AP as it gives me the opportunity to work closely with cooperatives from different sectors, across the region. ICA-AP is also a great platform to disseminate the sustainable cooperative agenda and enable knowledge sharing across sectors and regions.
