> of India, conducted the National Debate on Co-operation in 1977, in two parts, for the students in Universities and colleges. The Debate in English was organised at Rajendranagar, Hyderabad, on 8th and 9th February 1977, in collaboration with A.P. Agricultural University and in Hindi language at Udaipur on 19th February 1977 in collaboration with Udaipur University. The National Level Debate followed the Inter-Collegiate Debates conducted earlier by the Universities. The National Debate, for the first time during the year, was conducted separately in English and Hindi languages with a view to encourage participation particularly from the Hindi speaking States. The common topic chosen for Lnglish as well as Hindi language National Debate was "Cooperative Movement is the best instrument to involve youth in Programmes Economic Development". Twenty-nine Universities from all over the country, represented by a team of two debators speaking for and against the proposition, participated in English language National Debate, spread over two days, at A.P. Agricultural University. The Hindi language National Debate was participated by 20 Universities, which also included a team sent by Kerala University, Trivandrum. On the eve of these debates, symposia were also organised, both at Hyderabad & Udaipur primarily to educate the students on co-operative thinking. The topic for these Symposia, which attracted eminent cooperators, thinkers and academicians, was "Co-operatives can play a pivotal role in the implementation of 20-Point Economic Programme."

In the interests of the ruling classes, the state, therefore, attempts to control infltion by cutting back its investment and retarding the pace of economic expansion. Such retardation. of course, throws workers out of employment, especially in the capital goods industries; what is more important again from the ruling class point of view, however, is that it hits at the crucial segment of the urban petty bourgeoisie in another way - educated unemployment swells as jobs do not expand rapidly enough to absorb those, usually, from a petty bourgeois background themselves, who are seeking professional, technical or bereaucratic careers. Besides, such retardation spells ruin for the petty producers and small capitalists and even has the effect of
