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#### STATISTICS AND INFORMATION ON EUROPEAN CO-OPERATIVES

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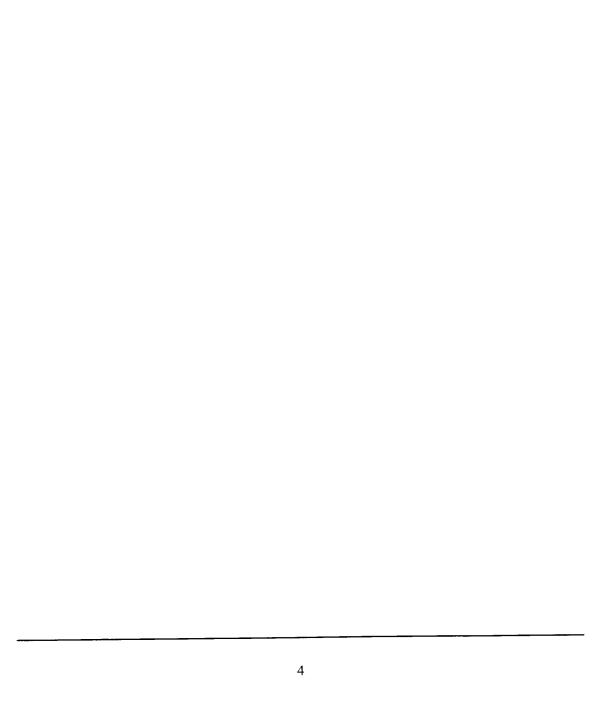
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#### PART I

#### I. INTRODUCTION

his document is the first comprehensive statistical overview of co-operatives in Europe, i.e. in the 41 member (or invited member) countries of the Council of Europe(1). It is the result of work carried out by the International Co-operative Alliance (ICA) within the framework of Project 96/014 "Statistics and Information on European Co-operatives", co-financed by the European Commission, Directorate-General XXIII, following its decision of 30 December 1996 and the "Call for Proposals" in the sector of co-operatives, mutual, associations and foundations, published in the Official Journal C 212 of 17 August 1995.

Motivated by the inadequacy of co-operative statistics at the national and pan-European level, this project was instigated to collect and analyse the essential, homogeneous, comparable and updateable data, which should be considered as "the lowest common denominator" of all the co-operative organisations within Europe.

This study analyses co-operative data and information in **two main parts**.

#### Part I includes:

- a description of the activities carried out, and of the methods adopted for the collection, analysis and elaboration of the data and information;
- the results obtained, and particularly the Co-operative Statistical Profiles of 41 European countries and the Co-operative Statistical Profiles by Sector, with the related analysis and comments;
- the conclusions and recommendations.

#### Part II includes:

- the Institutional Profiles of the co-operative organisations which participated in the project or supplied information and statistics;
- the "Co-operative Data Base Questionnaires" used for collecting information, with the enclosed Explanations and Definitions

The ICA hopes that this study will lead to an increased knowledge about, and improved image of, European co-operatives.

Note: The views and recommendations included in this report are those of the author.

#### II. METHODS

#### 2.1 Characteristics of the Study

The following methods were adopted for the implementation of the project:

1. The survey, and the definition of **guidelines and procedures** for the collection, analysis and elaboration of the co-operative information and data, included the determination of the countries, the definition of the economic sectors and variables to be considered by the study, and the level of the analysis and possible breakdown of the data.

The study broadened to **41 European countries** where organised co-operative movements were present, whether they were ICA members or not.

The co-operative data included the following variables: number of enterprises; number of individual members; number of workers; and turnover or market share by sub-sector or product (in agriculture), where these last data are available and relevant (2).

Subsidiary enterprises owned by co-operatives are often included within the statistics, as well as some quasi-co-operative enterprises (e.g. Employee Ownership models in the UK, and some mutuals which are members of the ICA insurance sector).

The following economic sub-sectors have been selected for this study: the primary sector of food production: agriculture, forestry and fishing; the secondary sector of industry: the sub-sector of small and medium-sized co-operative industries and artisans; the tertiary or services sector: banking, credit unions and insurance (the financial sub-sector); consumers and independent retailers (wholesale and retail trade sub-sector); housing, health and social care services; transport and utilities, and finally a differential sub-sector of "others" which may include multipurpose co-operatives or those co-operatives belonging to other, unspecified sectors (e.g. education and training; tourism, etc).

Information and data was collected with the collaboration of the co-operative organisations within the 41 European countries: those national organisations (National Umbrella Organisations – NUOs) which are members of ICA in Europe (96 organisations) and other co-operative organisations which have ICA indirect membership, or which are members of the European Co-operative Associations.

The **sources of information** from which the statistics were drawn are the administrative or management data made available to, or specifically collected by, the NUO for 1996. Whenever possible, additional data from the public registers of enterprises or of co-operatives was also included.

The 41 (European countries) x 3 sectors of economy and 16 sub-sectors (only 9 were identified in the initial project) x 4 variables (number of enterprises, members, employees, and turnover and market share) form the design finally adopted. This grid constitutes the basis for the collection and analysis of the statistics, common to all the countries and sectors, so as to facilitate regular updating.

All the information relates to the year ended 31 December 1996. This differs from the original project presented to DG XXIII, which indicated 1995 as the base year.

2. The information and data were collected through **questionnaires** posted to those co-operative organisations which were direct or indirect (members of a member) members of the ICA,

or members of its Specialised Organisations, and to the European Co-operative Associations headquartered in Brussels. A total of 160 organisations replied. **Part II** of this document includes a full list of respondents, with a summary of the information submitted, as well as a contact name. This is the co-operative institutional profile (see **6.1**: **Co-operative Institutional Profiles**). A regular updating of the profiles is planned within the functioning of the ICA databank.

In order to ensure the uniformity of information and data, guidelines and definitions were distributed with the questionnaires (see 6.2: Co-operative Database Questionnaire included in <u>part II</u> of this report).

In case of late or incomplete response, reminders by letter, fax, e-mail or telephone were necessary.

In the framework of the project, a sample of co-operative organisations from 13 European countries, particularly in Eastern, Central and Southern Europe, were visited. The aims of the visits were: initially testing the questionnaire, classifications and definitions; later, during the phase of project implementation, support for the integration of information and data, ensuring the reliability of data by direct contacts with the co-operative organisations and the public National Statistical Offices. The direct contacts were helpful for a better understanding of the real situation, constraints and perspectives of the various co-operative movements and sectors in Europe.

- 3. In order to evaluate the provisional results of the EU-ICA Project "Statistics and Information on European Co-operatives" and to support the final stage of its implementation, an ICA European workshop for the national co-ordinators of the European co-operative organisations was held on 7-9 May 1998 in Geneva. 34 participants from 16 countries and two European Associations, ILO observers, an EU-DG XXIII representative, and ICA staff member and consultants participated. Analysis, lectures and discussion focused on:
  - the provisional results of the European co-operative statistics;
  - technical characteristics of the ICA Databank;
  - co-operative statistics and information by country;
  - guidelines for future data updating and distribution;
  - testing the Databank at ICA Head Office.

The workshop provided an opportunity for all the participating national co-ordinators to present, and comment on, their National Co-operative Statistical Profile, to validate it and/or ask that it be corrected or amended. After one and a half days of very open and intense debate, the participants agreed on the following conclusions and recommendations:

- to finalise the actual ICA-EU project with the collaboration of the country co-ordinators and to validate the statistics by 15 June 1998;
- to progressively improve co-operative statistics within Europe and make the traditional classification by economic sectors more coherent;
- to analyse the feasibility of adding co-operative classifications based on the relations existing between co-operatives and their members and the characteristics of the cooperative membership (users/consumers, entrepreneurs, workers);
- to ensure that the ICA, in collaboration with national co-ordinators, permanently engaged or appointed by ICA members within each country, annually update co-operative statistics and information;
- to undertake the next updating through revised and simplified questionnaires, as well as proposals for sector classification and co-operative definitions (e.g. subsidiary enterprises);
- to present these validated statistics at the Regional Assembly for Europe, to be held in Paris in October 1998.

#### 2.2. The ICA Co-operative Databank

- 1. A **Co-operative Databank** was constructed by the ICA thanks to co-financing from the European Commission and to the co-operative organisations which collected the statistical data and commented on them. The ICA Databank, with uniform guidelines and software, will provide an opportunity to collect, process and distribute statistical data and information on co-operatives and will facilitate regular updating in the future.
- 2. The minimum **hardware** required by the ICA databank is a PC 486-66, or higher, with a minimum of 8 Mb RAM (16 Mb recommended), running Windows 95.
- 3. The software platform used for the databank is ACCESS, which assures all the functions of the databank and manages the controlling lists. This was chosen to facilitate updating and technical maintenance by the ICA databank administrator. It is possible to copy the application on diskette, so that it can be sent to the national co-operative movements in Europe and be installed on single workstations (ACCESS, on free version RUN-TIME).

#### III. DATA

#### 3. 1. Co-operative Statistical Profile of Europe

**Table 1: Co-operative Statistical Profile by Region - Europe** represents the project's most important overall result. This table brings together the data on co-operatives, their members and employees by sector and sub-sector in each of the 41 European countries. It also indicates the different "weight" of each sector and sub-sector according to the three variables considered (enterprises, members and employees).

For the first time, and with an acceptable degree of reliability, we know that in Europe there are:

- **288,500 co-operative societies,** associating more than
- 140 million members and with a labour force of about
- 5 million employees.

These data illustrate the global importance of co-operatives in the economic and social life of the Old Continent (a fact in itself hitherto unproven, and not widely known) and strengthen the need for appropriate consideration of their actual and potential influence for any process of co-operation, integration and development within Europe.

Despite the fact that the total number of the co-operative enterprises represents only a small percentage of the millions of small and medium-sized enterprises of Europe, it is important to state that:

- 288,500 co-operatives often have joint undertakings with about 20 million family or individual enterprises;
- 140 million members represent about 17.5% of the population (800 million individuals) of the 41 European countries considered in the project; and that
- 5 million employees is equivalent to the number of jobs created by the 25 biggest European employers, which are often multi-national corporations.(3) In reality, the number of persons working in the co-operatives (either as a member-entrepreneur or as an employee) is much bigger, as will be explained in the following analysis.

#### 3. 2. Analysis by variable

Table 1 allows, and demands, supplementary comments and explications for each of the variables considered so as to avoid incorrect interpretations.

#### 3. 2. 1. Enterprises

The number of the enterprises indicated (co-operative societies in general, but also "subsidiary enterprises" belonging to co-operative institutions or traditionally classified as part of the co-operative movements) is undoubtedly under-estimated. In fact, the total number of co-operative societies, calculated by adding the data reported in the national statistics or listed in the national registers of co-operatives existing in several European countries, should be bigger than the various totals indicated in first column of Table 1(4).

This table shows that about 38% of the total number of co-operatives belong to the primary sector of food production, 16% to the secondary sector of small and medium-sized industries and 46% to the tertiary sector of services. The lack of comparable data means that it is only possible to estimate the trend regarding the number of enterprises by sector. This shows: a continuous slow decrease in the numbers of primary sector enterprises, particularly within Southern Europe, due to co-operatives merging; stability in the industrial sector, with a significant increase in the numbers of very small enterprises (3 to 10 members-workers); a more dynamic tertiary sector (health and social care, community services, professionals, etc); and mergers in progress within the financial and commercial sub-sectors.

The size of the co-operative enterprises by sector, estimated on the average workforce employed shows, in decreasing order of size, the forestry enterprises (concentrated in Finland, Sweden and Norway), insurance co-operatives (with an average workforce of 294), consumer co-operatives (average workforce of 101) and co-operative banks (37). The other co-operatives, in agriculture, industry or the service sectors, have an average of 5 to 30 employees.

#### 3. 2. 2. Membership

Additional analyses, by sub-region and sector of activity, need to be done for a better comprehension of the co-operative membership (the 140.3 million individual members registered in Table 1).

The data breakdown **by sub-region** shows that the co-operative membership in EU countries (83.3 million) represents 22.4 % of its total population (373 million in 1996), and that membership in the other European countries (57 million) represents 13.4% of their population (427 million). This total membership includes the double or triple memberships which very often exist in countries with high "co-operative intensity". In other words, an individual can be a member of more than one agricultural co-operative (by different function or product), and also of a co-operative bank, consumer or housing co-operative, etc.

The analysis **by sector** and **sub-sector** highlights two big categories of co-operatives, which depend on, and at the same time determine, the characteristics and roles of the members: those where the members are users of the co-operative services and those where the members are co-entrepreneurs in their role of producers of goods and/or services:

• 120 million members (about 87% of the total membership) belong to the first group: 62 million consumers, representing 45% of total membership; 45 million (32% of the total) members of co-operative banks, credit unions and insurance societies (5); 10 million (7% of the total) members of housing co-operatives and about 3 million (3% of membership) member-users of other types of co-operative services (health, tourism, education and training, etc).

• 20 million members include farmers and fishermen, artisans and associated workers, retailers, hauliers, doctors and professionals within the health or social care sectors: all these members play a role of co-entrepreneurs or a joint role of workers and co-entrepreneurs.

Only a minority of the millions of member-users of the first group of co-operatives, the members elected in governing bodies, are active participants in the running of their co-operatives.

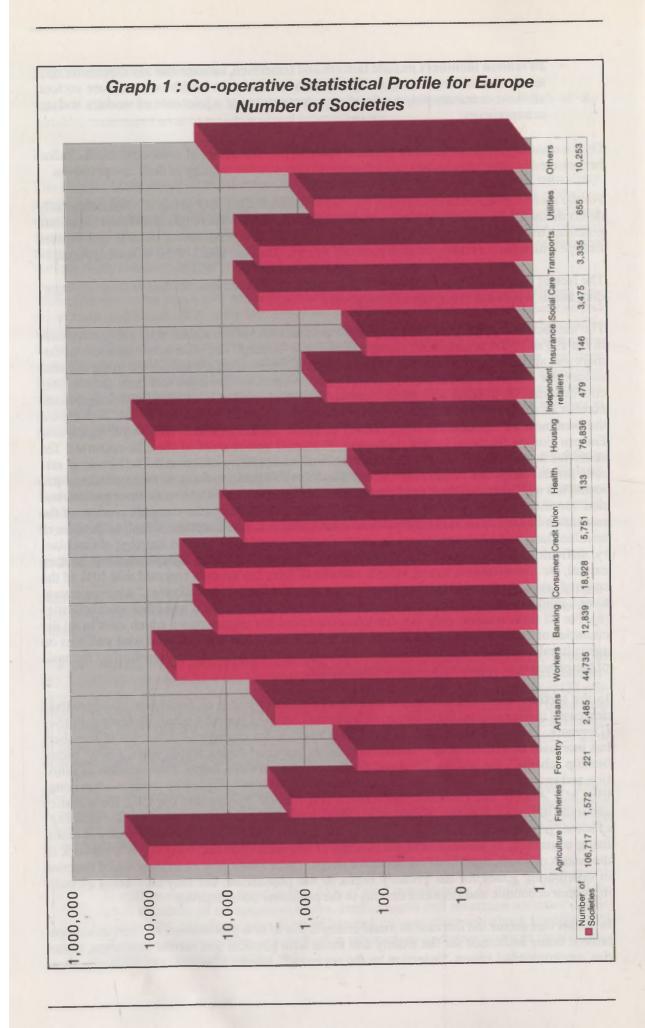
For the second group of co-operatives, the role of associated co-entrepreneur is constitutionally determinant for the success of the co-operative business, even where this is difficult to put into practice (traditional industrial jobs or in the workers' co-operatives of Central and Eastern Europe which have a history of state control). 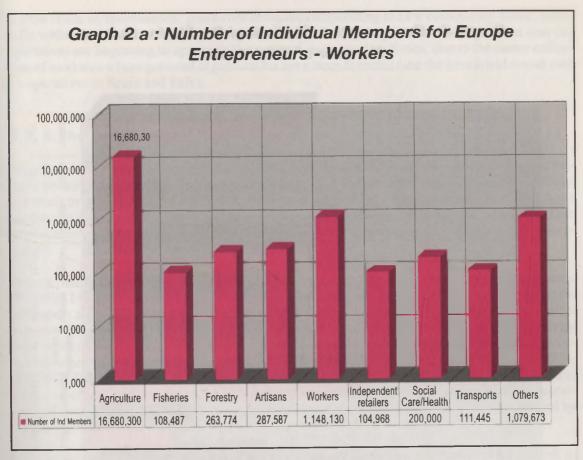
The lack of previous data at the global level permits only limited analysis and estimations regarding trends within the European co-operatives.

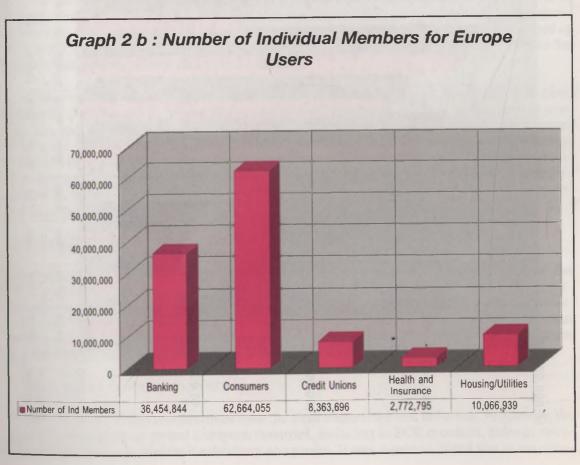
The numbers of co-operative members in the **primary sector** are stable, with a slight decrease in the EU or EFTA countries as a consequence of a "natural" decrease in the numbers of farmers and agricultural workers, and of the decreasing importance of agriculture in the national economies. The relation between the number of co-operative societies and their membership confirms that the average size varies considerably from country to country, with a significant number of small agricultural co-operatives in Southern Europe. It is also possible to point out the weakness of agricultural co-operation in some countries within the Baltic region and Eastern Europe (Estonia, Latvia, Lithuania, Romania) and in most of the CIS countries. Ten countries do not have a true, organised agricultural co-operative movement. The historical reasons for this delay are evident: on the one hand the co-operative form of management is still identified with past experiences of compulsory land expropriation and work force proletarization. On the other hand, the land reforms and farm restructuring (the complex process of the restitution of land to its former owners or their heirs, and the allocation of land to farmers or smallholders) will take many years, in view of existing problems, such as shortage of machinery, difficulties with transport, the deterioration of irrigation systems, lack of access to venture capital, etc. Nevertheless, recent sample surveys of farm households reported that 30% of the respondents co-operate with other farmers in a variety of activities: informal "water co-operatives", joint use of machinery and equipment, marketing of products and other joint activities (6). For all these reasons, only in a few cases the consumer organisations which exist in all the countries of Eastern and Central Europe and the CIS were able to collect and send statistics on agricultural co-operatives (or other associative organisations) recently re-organised on the basis of the principle of voluntary and open membership.

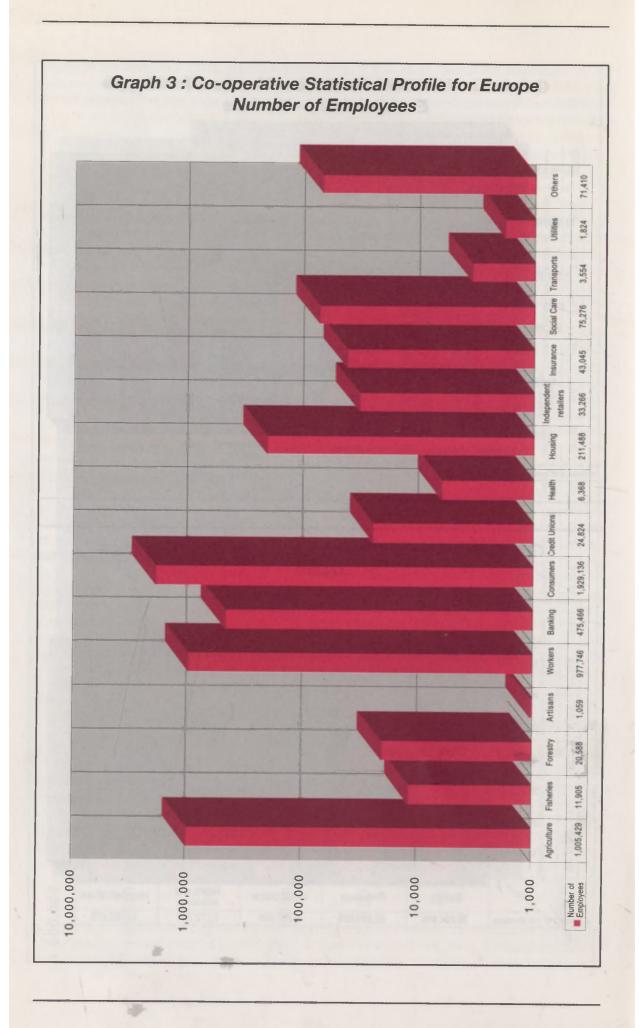
In the **tertiary sector**, it can be estimated that the membership of **consumer co-operatives** decreased in the nineties. This represents the overall result of opposite trends. In some countries (Denmark, Finland, France, Italy, Norway and Sweden, for example) the number of members has increased as a result of new consumer policies launched during recent years: a new "membership scheme", the reintroduction of dividends, new services, better consideration of nutrition and environmental needs, etc. These situations are counterbalanced by crises in other countries (e.g. Austria and Germany). In Eastern and Central Europe and the CIS, the statistics generally indicate a decrease in consumer membership. This can be explained by the "cleaning" of some "propagandist" statistics of the past years, as well as by the extreme difficulty in mobilising consumers to participate in the process of reorganisation and merging of a network of thousands of small, traditional co-operative shops. These shops play an evident social function in distributing goods for the primary needs of the population, but they also bring globally important economic and financial deficits to the consumer co-operatives.

In the **service sector** the increase in membership is due to new professional and service co-operatives: home assistance for the elderly and those with physical and mental handicaps, nurseries, environmental issues, "insertion by the economy", leisure activities, etc. Normally, these









are the result of spontaneous, grass-root initiatives responding to new community needs, generally without co-ordination by apex organisations. It is important to observe that these new co-operatives are beginning to appear in the national or sectoral statistics, due to the easier collection of evidence where national organisations have been founded (see the health and social care co-operatives in Spain and Italy).

#### 3. 2. 3. The Workers

Among the 4.9 million co-operative personnel, over 1 million (21% of the total) work in the primary sector, 978,000 work in the industrial sector (20% of the total), and 2.9 million (59% of the total) in the services. It is only in some sub-sectors of services that we expect to see a net increase in jobs, particularly within the new professions and services. A tentative analysis of the employment figures can be made by sub-sector where some dynamic trends exist or are foreseeable.

Among the approximately 2 million workers employed by **consumer co-operatives**, only 375,000 (19%) are employed in 13 EU or EFTA countries, where the co-operative turnover represents about 80% of the total for those European countries in which consumers' co-operatives are present. If this confirms that incomparable levels of consumption and productivity exist between the two groups of co-operatives, the situation makes us fear that the consumer co-operative sector in ECE and CIS countries may be expected to loose a great many jobs, particularly in Russia and in the Ukraine. Besides, the modernisation of consumer outlets (shops, stores, wholesale centres, and specialist units) is urgently required in order to assure the economic and social role of the co-operatives. Its implementation will only be feasible if supported by increasing levels of consumption and a new role for consumer-members.

It is significant that the **independent retailers**' network employs a relevant workforce, both as retailers and as sales personnel, in 10 European countries where such activity has been organised in a co-operative form. It is regrettable that this type of co-operative isn't yet developed in ECE and CIS countries, since retail co-operatives could make a significant contribution to the modernisation of the wholesale and retail sectors.

A similar analysis can be made of **industrial co-operatives** in the ECE and CIS countries, where the old, state-run planned system attributed only marginal sectors of the economy to workers' co-operatives. Moreover, these co-operatives lag behind in their technologies, their internal market is reduced and their traditional export market, Russia in particular, is declining. These are the reasons why the industrial co-operatives which, in ECE and CIS countries, provide employment for about 400,000 workers and play an important social role with the integration of thousands of individuals with handicaps, have lost about 30% of their jobs (and members) during the last eight years (7).

#### 3. 3. Analysis and Data by Sector

Information and economic data, when available and relevant have been provided by the National Umbrella Organisations of most of the countries: turnover and the market share; premiums and number of policies in the insurance sector; houses and apartments built or administered; etc (see the data and comments included in the following Co-operative Statistical Profile by Sector). The importance of the co-operative business and services throughout Europe is confirmed, particularly in the following sectors:

#### 1. Agriculture, Forestry and Fishing

This is the sector where co-operatives have the most importance and influence. Frequently, the largest market share in several European countries, including in ECE countries, belongs to co-operatives of farmers, and their subsidiary companies. It was, however, noted that in ten coun-

tries organised co-operative movements couldn't yet be structured in the agricultural sector for the reasons indicated above.

Co-operative forestry business is only present in a few European countries. Nevertheless, it has exceptional relevance in Finland, Norway and Sweden, with 31%, 70% and 60% of the sector market share respectively. Fishermen's co-operatives play a significant role only in France, Italy, Spain and Iceland.

#### 2. Industry, Arts and Crafts

Handicrafts co-operatives play a significant role only in a few countries of Southern Europe and in the ECE countries. Mechanical engineering industries are important in the Basque region of Spain; construction and public works in Italy, France and Poland; the textile industry (garments and clothing, sport and babywear for example) in Romania and Bulgaria; arts and crafts, and bread production in ECE and CIS countries.

#### 3. Financial Services

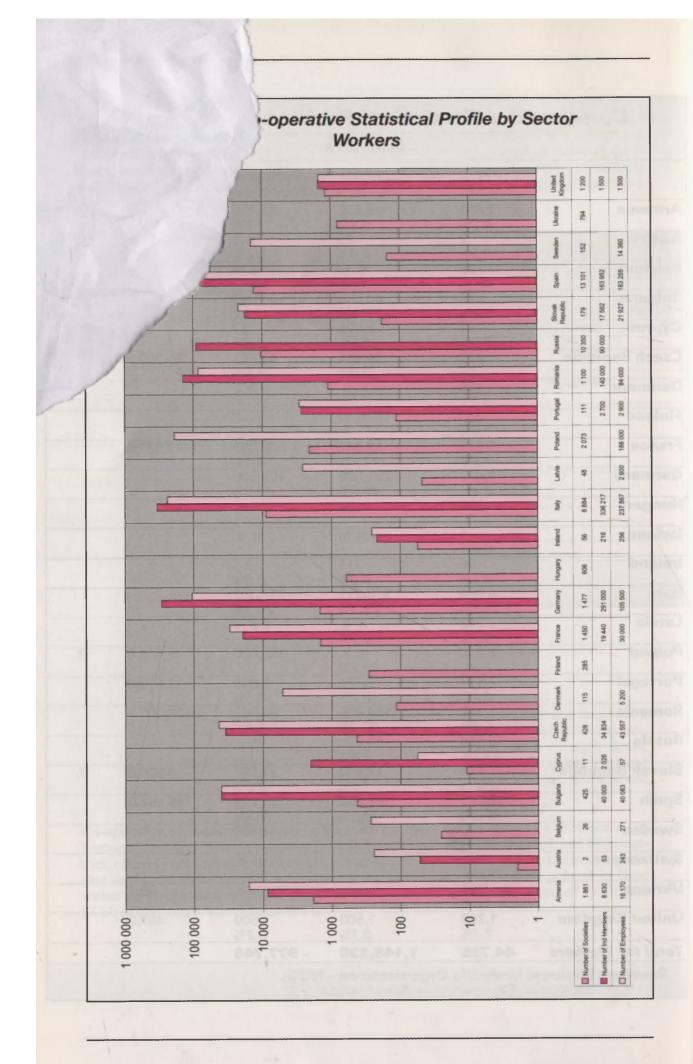
Co-operative banks and credit unions are present in 31 European countries and they have a very significant market share (between 37% and 20%) in France, Finland, Austria, Netherlands, Germany, Cyprus and between 2% and 10% in Belgium, Greece, Italy, Portugal, Spain, Sweden, Turkey and the United Kingdom. Credit unions are exceptionally important in Ireland and have been successfully re-established in Hungary, Poland, Romania, Russia, Slovenia and the Ukraine.

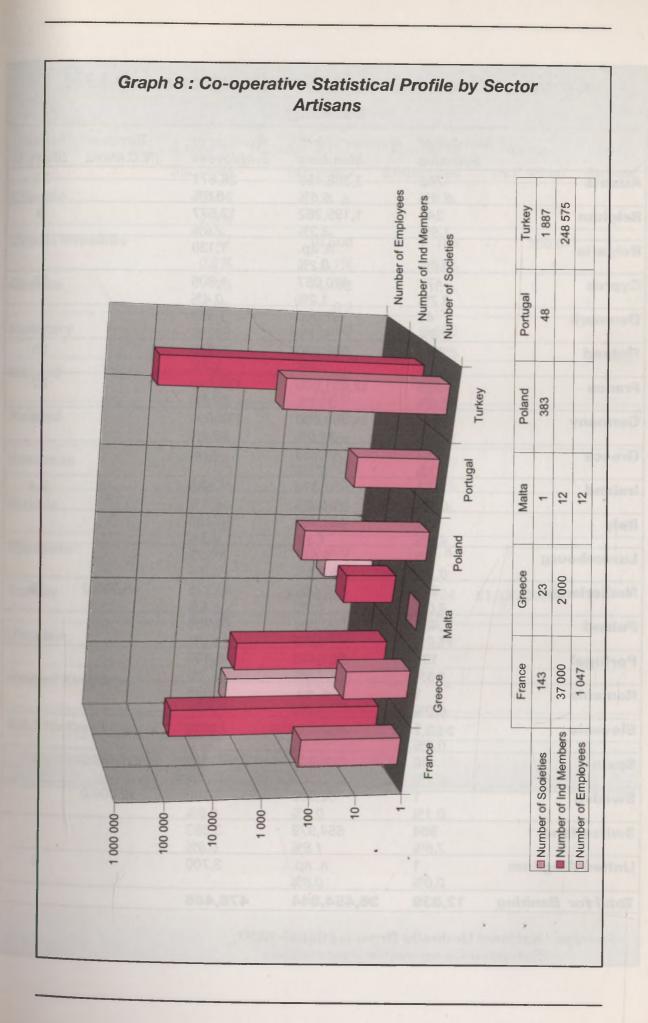
Co-operative or mutual insurance groups have a more-or-less-significant presence in 24 European countries. Several insurance organisations have been founded in ECE and CIS countries, often in joint venture with EU insurance co-operatives or private groups. The most significant social and economic indicators concern the approximately 80 million policies in force within the co-operative or mutual groups in 1996, and income from premiums of 590 billion ECUs in 1995 (a 15% increase on 1994).

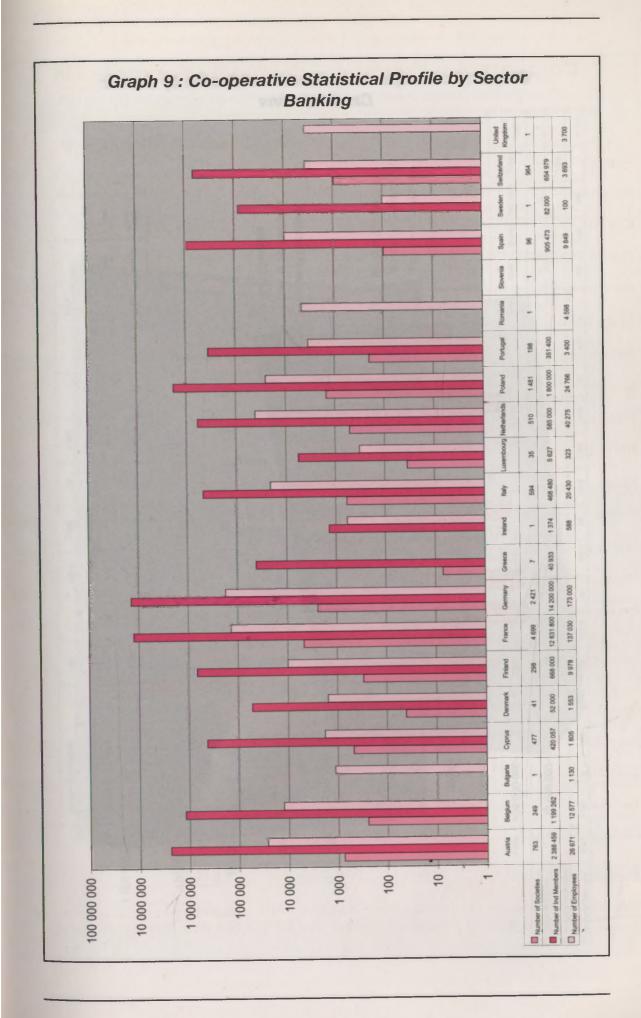

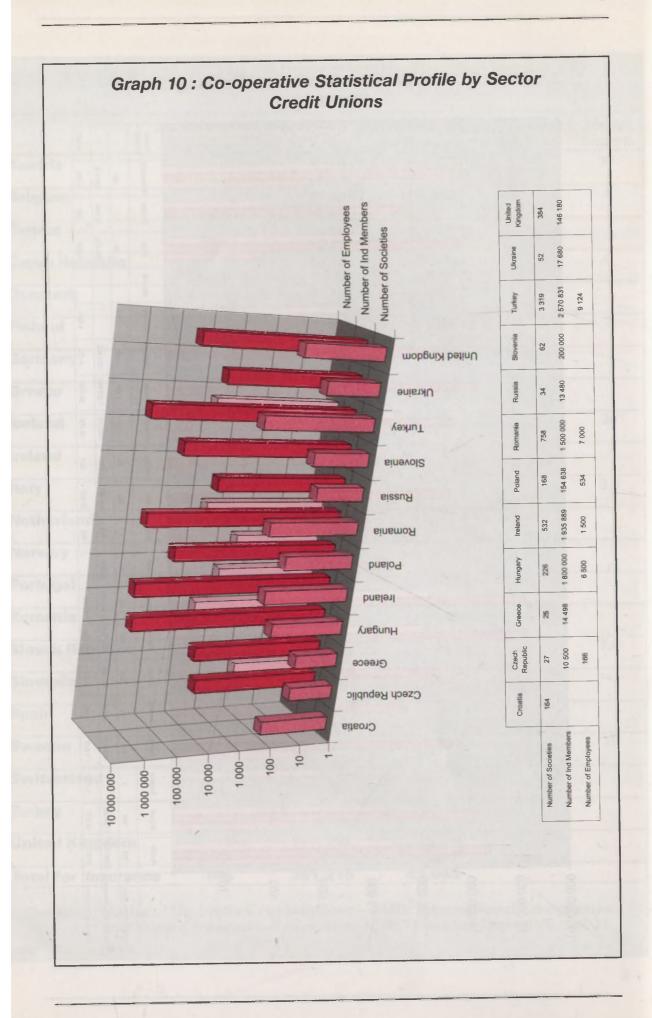

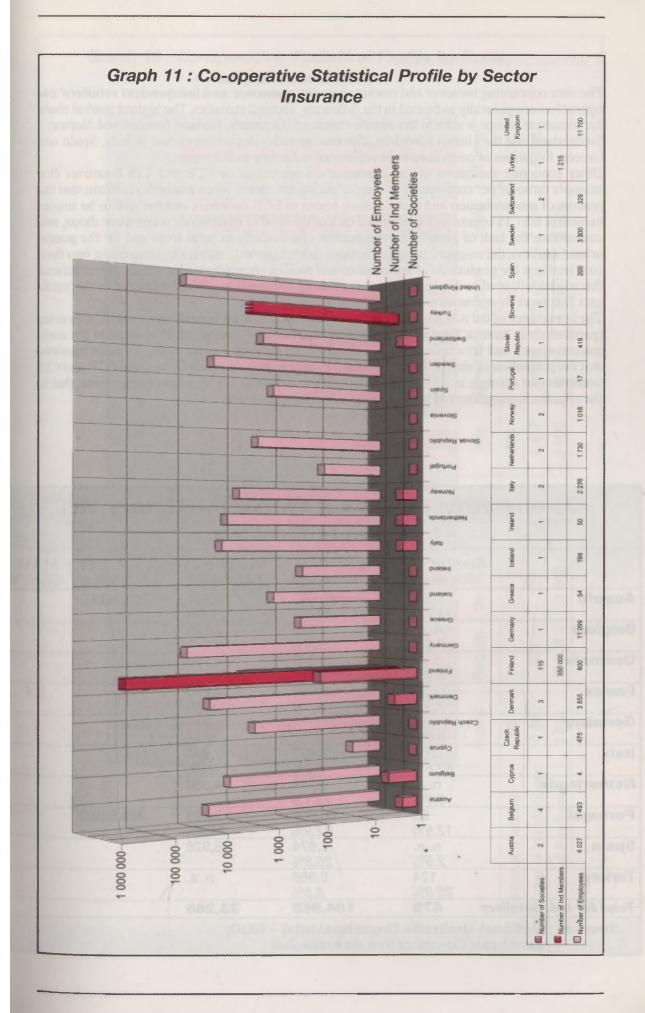

#### 4. Wholesale and Retail Sector

The data concerning turnover and market share for consumer and independent retailers' cooperatives are generally indicated in the following sectoral statistics. The highest market share for consumer co-ops is seen in the Nordic countries (Denmark, Finland, Sweden and Norway), Switzerland and the United Kingdom. The best growth rates are witnessed in Italy, Spain and Greece. Situations of crisis have to be registered in Austria and Germany.

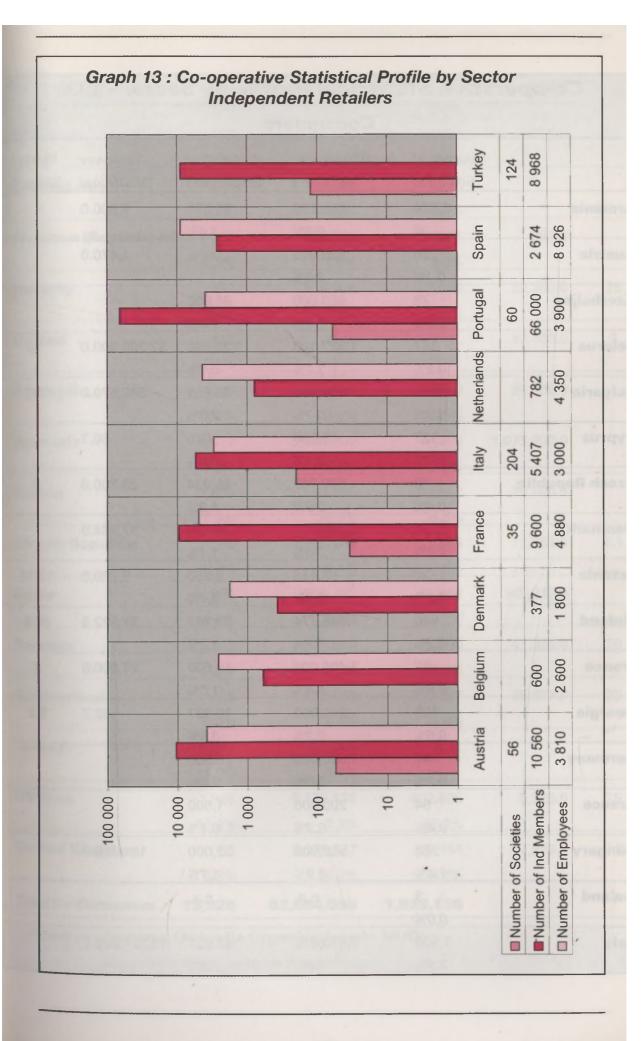
Other economic indicators of the consumer co-operatives in ECE and CIS countries (for example turnover per employee, per shop or per square metre, when available) confirm that the process of modernisation and restructuring begun in ECE countries and has still to be implemented in the CIS countries. Faced with a lack of the smaller traditional co-operative shops, and considering the lack of growth in consumption (particularly in rural areas and for the poorer urban families), the co-operative organisations can temporarily survive by integrating into their core business the production of agricultural and popular shopping-basket goods. Nevertheless, this model will tend to disappear due to increasing competition, as has happened in the strongest European co-operative movements.

The importance of the role played by independent retailers' co-operatives in ten EU countries (particularly in Austria, France, Germany, Italy and Portugal) for the modernisation of the commercial system and for employment has already been stressed. Furthermore, it should be noted that the promotion of similar forms of trade has been tested successfully in some ECE and CIS countries (for example in Armenia and Georgia) by the national consumer organisations, due to

the effective management of their numerous commercial outlets.

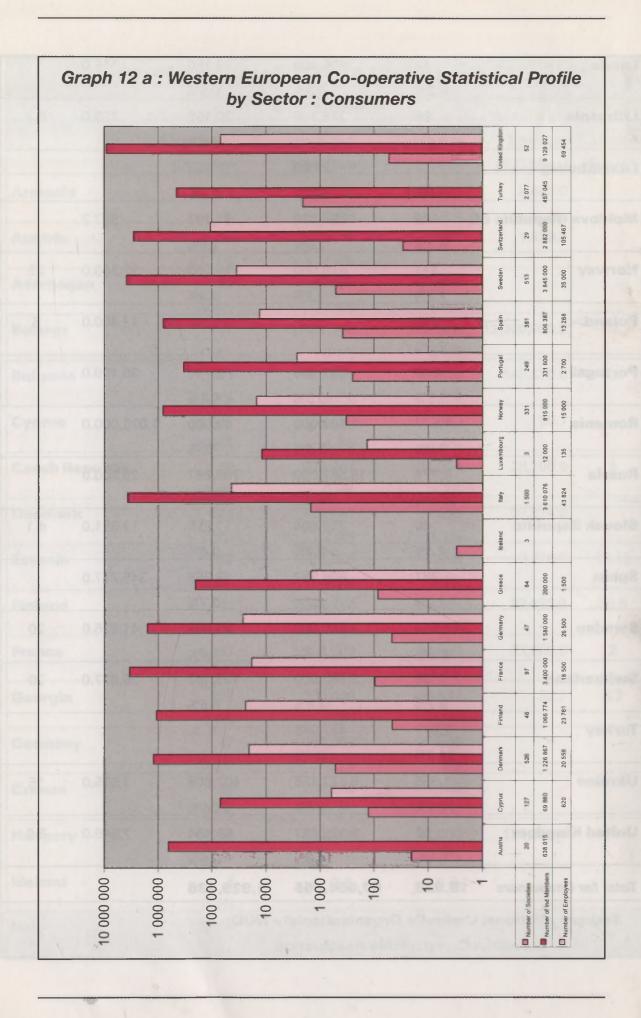

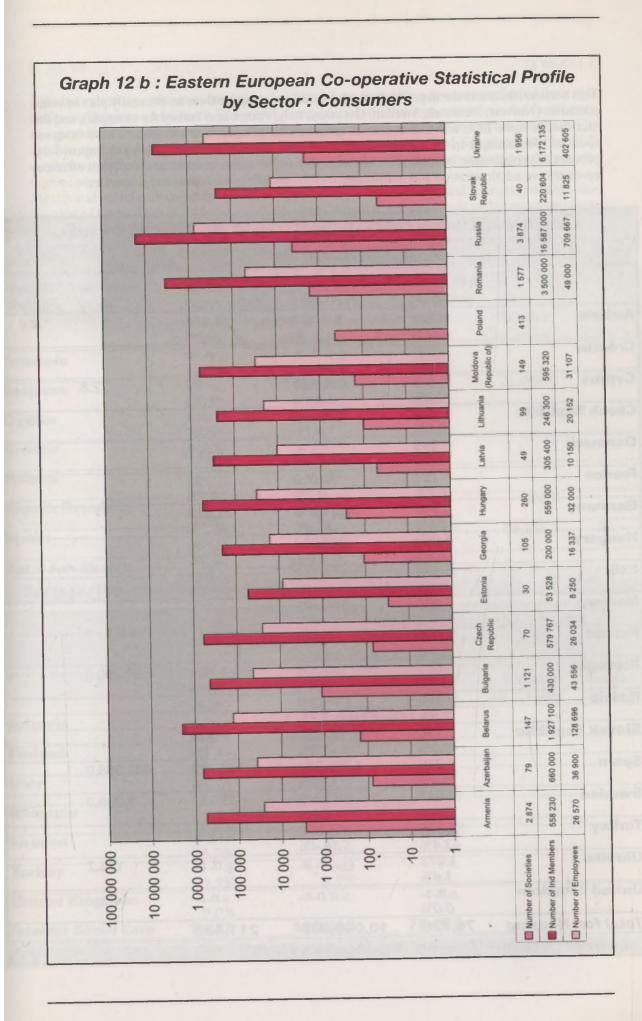

# 5. Housing

This section illustrates the important role that **housing co-operatives** traditionally play in some countries (Norway, Denmark, Sweden, Germany, Italy, France and Turkey for example), and the fact that in some ECE and CIS countries autonomous co-operative movements have been refounded (for example in the Czech Republic, Poland and the Slovak Republic) to improve the process of privatisation or attribution of ownership rights to the tenants, and to permit efficient co-operative administration and maintenance of the buildings and common properties.

# 6. Health and Social Care

This is a relatively new co-operative sector. **Health co-operatives** have strengthened their role in Spain, Belgium and Greece (the social pharmacies in the last two countries); the **social care co-operatives** constitute a new and important reality in Italy and Sweden and are being established in increasing numbers in the other Nordic countries, the United Kingdom, and in ECE countries, where the workers' co-operatives have a long tradition of integrating a large percentage of people with handicaps into their production process.

Health and social care co-operatives are expected to grow in numbers and strength, with the instigation of a new form of self-management, shared between professionals and users of services, in the framework of the reform of the public health services and insurance systems.

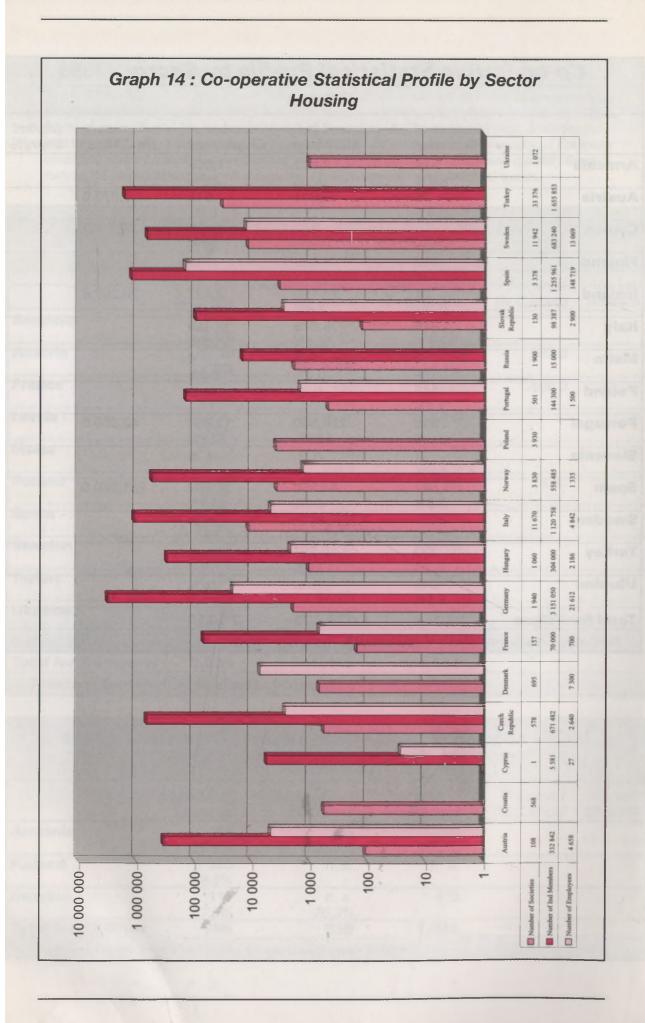
# 7. Utilities and Other Services

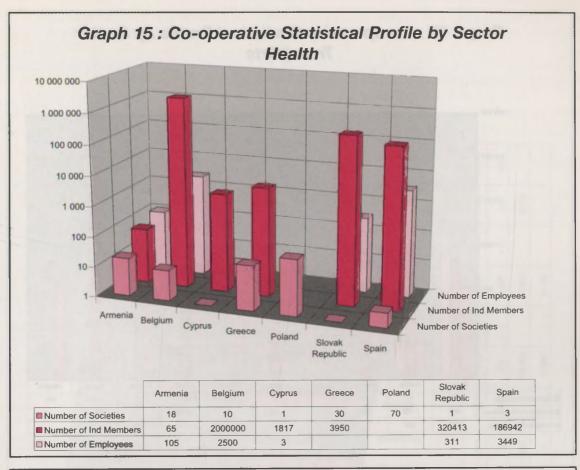
The (public) utilities co-operatives and others such as school, education and training co-operatives, tourism, and multi-purpose co-operatives form these two groups. Often, they combine innovative forms of self-managed business and services with a positive effect on employment. Statistics indicate their relevance in Italy, Portugal, Spain and the Nordic countries. In the majority of European countries, where no sectoral co-ordination exists, it is still difficult to detect and quantify the characteristics and economic and social impact of these co-operatives by statistical means.

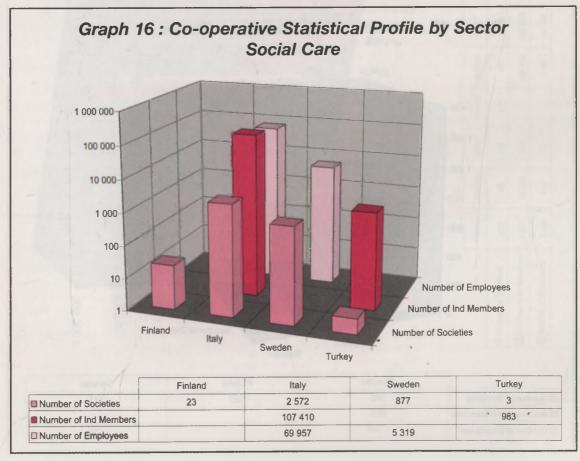

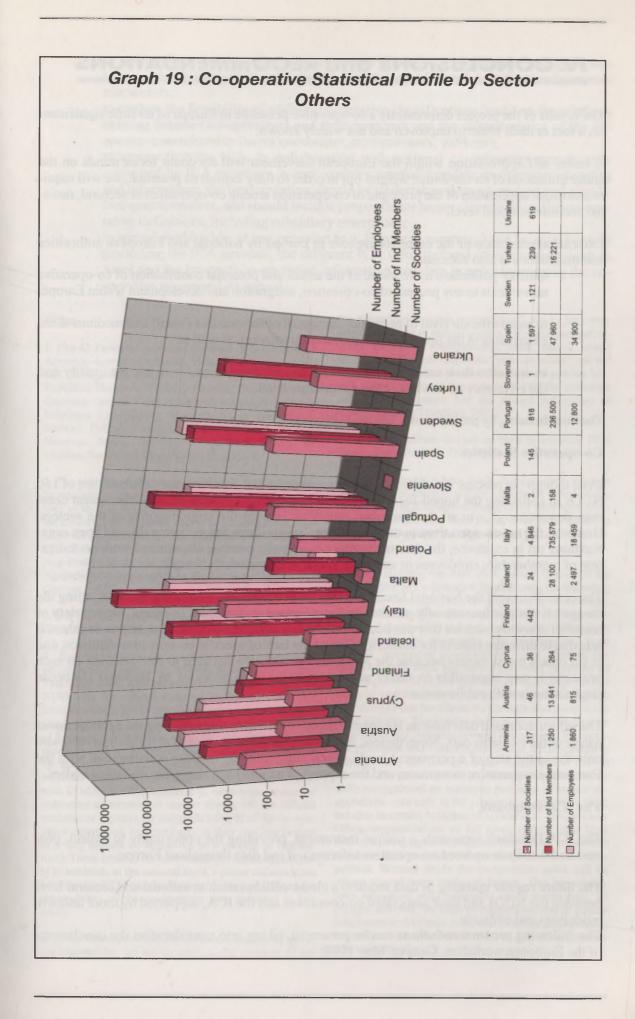












# IV. CONCLUSIONS and RECOMMENDATIONS

The results of the project demonstrate a co-operative presence in Europe of no little significance, a fact in itself hitherto unproven and not widely known.

A better self appreciation within the European movement will no doubt focus minds on the under utilisation of its combined weight: but in order to fully exploit its potential, we will require a stronger application of the principle of co-operation among co-operatives at sectoral, national and international level.

External appreciation of the co-operative role in Europe by national and European authorities and institutions is also necessary:

- to make politicians more aware of the actual and potential contribution of co-operative movements to any process of co-operation, integration and development within Europe;
- to ensure the survival of networks composed of thousands of small and medium-sized enterprises in the open and global European market, as well as
- to conserve their essential contribution to employment and increase the quality and the efficiency of services at the community level.

The conclusions, by project items, are the following:

# **Co-operative Statistics**

Even though the process was difficult, the project succeeded, thanks to the collaboration of 160 NUOs in collecting the hoped-for essential co-operative data — what we call "the lowest common denominator" - in all the European countries, and for the large majority of the sectors. However, for the co-operatives in the new sectors, where there are not generally any apex organisations yet in existence, the data often concern only the number of societies, with no indication of membership, employees or any other social or economic indicators.

The contribution of the National Statistical Offices in collecting, evaluating and integrating the co-operative statistics was only possible in some European countries. In others, for a variety of reasons (in some countries this was because of the late updating of official statistics, in others it was due to different criteria for classifications or the lack of specific co-operative statistics, and in yet others it was merely because the NSOs and NUOs were not used to collaborating on such projects) it was impossible to verify and integrate the data provided by National Umbrella Organisations with public statistics.

The information and data have an acceptable degree of reliability, considering the heterogeneous nature of the available data. Nevertheless, it must be stated that the results of the project represent only the initial step of a permanent work, which must continue in close collaboration with the European co-operative movements and the support of national and European statistical bodies.

### The ICA Databank

The ICA Databank represents a unique instrument, providing the opportunity to collect, process and distribute updated co-operative information and data throughout Europe.

The future regular updating of data requires a closer collaboration at national and sectoral level between the NUOs and their associated co-operatives and the ICA, supported by more uniform guidelines and software.

The following **recommendations** can be presented, taking into consideration the conclusions of the European workshop, Geneva, May 1998:

to make efforts to progressively improve the elaboration of essential, comparable statistics within Europe and render more coherent the traditional classification by economic sectors;

to analyse the feasibility of adding co-operative classifications based on the relations existing between co-operatives and their members and the characteristics of the co-

operative membership (users/consumers; entrepreneurs; workers);

 to ensure that the ICA, in collaboration with national co-ordinators permanently appointed by ICA members in each country, annually update co-operative statistics and information, the next updating should be undertaken through revised and simplified questionnaires, and should include proposals for sector classification and co-operative definitions, including subsidiary enterprises;

to spread world-wide, at any occasion (e.g. European meetings) and by any channels (including the ICA network, the different ICA web sites and other channels such as Aries and the Internet) co-operative information and data in order to improve the co-

operative image and its appeal.

In fact, data concerning the co-operative societies: (a) are available only in a reduced number of European countries; (b) when available data exist, they generally concern years prior to 1996, the year considered by this study; (c) the official data do not include the variables adopted for this study following the agreement with EU-DG XXIII (membership, employees, economic indicators as turnover or market share); (d) the official statistics or registers are comprehensive of all the co-operative enterprises, independently of their real functioning (e.g they include co-operatives in a process of liquidation). These remarks do not exclude the future opportunity to establish, at the national level, a closer collaboration between the NUO and the National Statistical Offices for the updating of the co-operative data included in this study.

- 7. Great efforts have been made during recent years to diversify the products of and the markets for industrial cooperatives in ECE countries. Partnerships have been developed and outlets have been found, more often thanks to initiatives from private companies than to those of the cooperative group.

When validating the data, Prof. Johann Brazda of the Wien Institut of Co-operative Studies made the following comment: "In recent years co-operatives have increasingly shed their traditional alliances and their self-appreciation as 'movements' that are specifically different to other commercial enterprises. The tendency has been towards 'managerial co-operatives' - and often the cooperative legal form has been abandoned in favour of other legal forms of enterprises. The legal basis has not changed very much during these recent decades, but the rare changes that have been put through also point in the same direction. The notable absence of public discussion concerning this universal farewell to traditional co-operative principles and values indicates that the co-operative heritage does not find too many supporters in today's Austria. The public debate concerning co-operatives has sadly concentrated on economic problems of certain cooperatives - not only in the consumer co-operative field, but also in certain branches of agricultural co-operation. Often, representatives of the co-operatives have been known to bring up these problems themselves in an effort to reform their sectors in order to adapt to increased competition. Without doubt the co-operative spirit will be reborn several times during its history. This has usually been associated with influential social movements. At present, however, the logic of competition and of capitalism seems to dominate more and more the field of institutionalised co-operation in Austria, as well as in many other countries".

# V. DATA BY COUNTRY

This part of the report includes data of and short comments on the following 41 Co-operative Statistical Profiles by Country.

These profiles are the result of work carried out by the National Umbrella Organisations at country level. As explained before, the data were obtained by means of the Co-operative Database Questionnaires. When necessary (and possible), the data were compared with, and integrated into, that of the European Sectoral Associations and the National Statistical Offices (NSOs). The national data include the economic and social indicators, particularly turnover and/or market share for the main sub-sectors.

#### **ARMENIA**

The information for Armenia was provided by its single NUO: the Union of Consumer Societies, HAY-COOP. The data correspond to co-operative statistics produced by the National Statistical Office as at 31 December 1996. The consumer sector is the most important, due to its number of societies (2,874), membership (558,230), employees (28,314) and turnover (9,600 million AMD in 1996). The consumer sector includes 2,380 traditional shops, 35 trade centres (which also provide an outlet for individual retailers) and 172 subsidiaries (bakeries, catering, restaurants, factories, multipurpose market services). The second sector is composed of 1,821 new small and medium-sized co-operatives in the industrial and artisanal sub-sectors, which have 8,630 members and employ 16,170. The third sector concerns agriculture, as result of land reform and farm restructuring, and fisheries, where its 391 societies have 1,725 members and employ 3,815 personnel. The services sector is composed of 599 co-operatives in the health, transport, utilities and "others" sub-sectors, with 2,440 members and 4,010 employees.

#### **AUSTRIA**

The information for Austria was obtained by the European sectoral associations, and validated by the Institut für Betriebswirtschaftslehre der Universität Wien – Fachbereich Für Genossenschaftswesen. The data correspond to co-operative statistics from two NUOs. The most important sectors are those of agriculture and banking, with the largest number of enterprises (1,067 and 763 respectively), membership (444,139 and 2,388,459), employment (25,997 and 26,671 employees) and turnover or market share (70,200 million ATS, corresponding to 30% of market share for agriculture and 31% of market share for banking). The housing (4% of market share) and wholesale and retail sector represent the third and fourth relevant sectors of co-operative business. Particularly important in the commercial sector is the contribution of the independent retailers' co-operatives (10,560 entrepreneurs, with a turnover of 20,600 million ATS) following the crisis which saw the consumer co-operative sector, Konsum Austria, go into liquidation (its turnover decreased from 4,670 million ATS in 1995 to 1,470 million in 1996). New co-operatives are starting to appear in the workers' and services sectors. Finally, the insurance sector is covered by 2 important mutual holdings with 17% of the insurance market share.

### **AZERBAIJAN**

The information for Azerbaijan was provided by its single NUO: the Central Union of Co-operatives of Azerbaijan, AZERITTIFAG. The co-operative presence is concentrated in the wholesale and retail sector, where 79 consumer co-operatives have 660,000 members (28% less than the 920,000 of 1995) and employ 36,900. As in other CIS counties, the consumer co-operatives model also includes other manufacturing businesses and services, such as bakeries, transport, restaurants and bars, etc. No data are available for the turnover in 1996 (but the figure was 33.3 million AZM in 1995).

#### **BELARUS**

The information for Belarus was provided by its single NUO: the **Belarussian Republican Union of Consumer Societies**, **BELKOOPSOYUZ**. The co-operative presence is concentrated in the wholesale and retail sectors, with a turnover of 12,300 million BYB (1020.9 million USD) in 1996, corresponding to 18.7% of market share. The number of co-operatives is stable (147 societies) and the personnel decreased by 8%, from 139,979 in 1995 to 128,696 in 1995. As in other CIS countries, the consumer movement includes other manufacturing businesses and services within independent units and subsidiaries, which do not appear in the statistical profile, as well as its original agricultural, industrial and services (housing) co-operatives.

## BELGIUM

The information for Belgium was provided by four NUOs and by the European Sectoral Associations. The data is only partial, due to the lack of specific statistical data on co-operatives in Belgium, except for the 700-or-so co-operatives which report to the National Council of Co-operation. In any case, the co-operative presence is important in the following sectors: agriculture, with an estimated number of 1,264 co-operatives and a membership of 398,000; the health-pharmacies sector, with 10 societies, 2 million consumer members, a personnel of 2,500 and a turnover of 22,000 million BEF, representing 18% of the pharmacies' market share; the insurance sector, composed of one large co-operative, one mutual and two joint-stock companies, with a total of 1,659 full time employees; the banking sector, composed of two banking groups, with 239 local banks associating 500,000 members, a personnel of 5,577 and a market share of 6%; and the independent retailers' sector, composed of one co-operative group with 600 retailers and 2,600 employees. It is important to note the recent foundation of 26 workers' and professional services co-operatives, which employ a total of 271.

# **BOSNIA-HERZEGOVINA**

The information for Bosnia and Herzegovina was provided by its single NUO: the **Co-operative Association of Bosnia and Herzegovina**. The co-operative presence is limited to the agricultural sector (70 co-operatives with 1,350 employees). It was not possible to obtain any reliable information regarding either the whole of the Serbian region or Bosnia-Herzegovina after the war. The main problems facing the Co-operative Association, and its external assistance, are rehabilitation of the co-operative movement and rectifying the damage done by the war, particularly the demining of agricultural land, and the establishment of organisational and business links between the two Federations. A new Co-operative Law was approved in 1997.

# **BULGARIA**

The information for Bulgaria was provided by three NUOs, and co-ordinated by the consumer NUO: the **Central Co-operative Union (CCU)**. The data correspond to the overall statistics published by the National Statistical Office of Bulgaria. The co-operative presence is important in four sectors: wholesale and retail, industry, agriculture, and banking (a subsidiary activity of consumer co-operatives). The 1,121 consumer co-operatives, with 10,000 traditional consumer shops and a retail market share of 20%, also manage agricultural production and industrial units

and subsidiaries (1,300 bakeries, producing 34% of all bread; biscuit factories; mineral water and soft drink production, packaging and export, wine and alcohol production and export; agricultural processing factories; foreign-trade and tourism organisations, etc) which assure the profitability of the consumer sector. The industrial sector consists of 400 co-operatives, which employ about 40,000 workers (with a remarkable average of 100 workers per enterprise), including 10,000 workers with handicaps, who are fully integrated in the manufacturing activities. The agricultural sector, where 3,267 new co-operatives (743,000 members) were founded in recent years as a result of land reforms and farm restructuring, appear officially in the national statistics from 1996.

#### **CROATIA**

The information for Croatia was provided by its single agricultural NUO: the Croatian Cooperative Alliance, HRVATSKI ZADRUZNI SAVEZ. The data are in line with the 1997 statistics published by the National Register of Economic Subjects in Croatia. The most relevant co-operative presence is in agricultural (479 societies, with 80,000 members and 4,000 workers); credit (with 164 credit unions) and housing co-operatives (with 568 societies, most of which have gone into liquidation due to taxation problems). The consumers' co-operatives disappeared with the old regime. Insurance, banking and fisheries co-operatives are currently being promoted. A new Co-operative Law was approved in 1995, and a sectoral law covering the credit and housing sectors is currently in the process of preparation.

## **CYPRUS**

The information for Cyprus was provided by its NUO: the **Pancyprian Co-operative Confederation Ltd**, in collaboration with the other three-apex organisations, namely the Co-operative Central Bank Ltd, the National Department of Statistics and Research and the Registrar for Co-operative Development. The data correspond to the official co-operative statistics for Cyprus (including the 217 societies that have suspended their activities since 1974, due to the Turkish occupation of the northern part of Cyprus). Banking is the predominant co-operative sector, and has made remarkable progress in recent years. A co-operative central bank and 476 local credit societies, with 420,057 members and 1,825 employees, represent the

second largest banking group, with 35% of the total deposits. Co-operative credit and saving banks may need to be restructured in order to comply with EU directives. The second relevant sector is that of agriculture and agro-industry: 35 co-operative societies, with 15,712 members, 340 full-time employees and a turnover of 28 million CYP, which control 30% and 60% respectively of wine production and export. The wholesale and retail sector (127 co-operatives, 69,880 members, 620 employees and a turnover of 50.8 million CYP) represents the third co-operative sector, where many traditional co-operative stores are facing serious problems of survival, due to increased competition from large, modern supermarkets. The remaining areas of co-operative activity are in the housing sector (with one national co-operative, 5,581 members and a turnover of 72.8 million CYP) and in cottage industries and service co-operatives (this last category is relatively new, and in a stage of progressive development).

# THE CZECH REPUBLIC

The information for the Czech Republic was provided by its five NUOs, co-ordinated by the Co-operative Association of the Czech Republic. The data correspond to the national official statistics and cover all the principal sectors of the economy. The agricultural sector, which includes 1,081 co-operatives, with 85,000 members and 96,000 workers, represents a very high percentage (65%) of agricultural production, with a turnover of 70,000 million CZK. The who-

lesale and retail sectors have 70 consumer co-operatives, with 579,767 members, 26,034 employees and a turnover of 28,700 million CZK, and represent 5% of the market share. The housing sector, with 671,482 members and 2,640 employees, represents 45% of the housing stock. The industrial sector is composed of 428 co-operatives, with 34,834 members and 43,557 employees. Its turnover is 21,000 million CKK, representing 1.5% of the industry's market share. Finally, 27 new and expanding credit unions and an insurance company, owned by institutional co-operative partners, represent the co-operative presence in the financial sector.

## **DENMARK**

The information for Denmark was provided by three NUOs, co-ordinated by the Danske Andelsselskaber (Federation of Danish Co-operatives). The co-operative business and services are particularly relevant in the following sectors: agriculture, with 65 societies, 113,000 members, 27,826 employees and a turnover of over 70,000 million DKK, representing an average of 50 to 80% of market share (with particularly high market share and export figures in dairy, slaughterhouse and fur production); the wholesale and retail sector, with 526 consumer societies, 1,226,244 individual members, 20,558 employees including subsidiaries, has a total turnover of 37,324 million DKK, representing a stable and significant market share. The housing sector (with 695 societies and 7,300 employees); the workers' (with 115 societies and 5,200 employees); the insurance and pensions sector (with 2 companies, 1 mutual society and 3,855 employees); the independent retailers (377 members and 1,800 employees) and the banking sector (with 41 banks, 52,000 members and 1,553 employees) represent the other relevant cooperative presence in the country. No specific legislation for co-operatives exists in Denmark, where co-operatives are subject to the legislation covering commercial enterprises, but its agricultural co-operative by-laws and consumer membership schemes are particularly effective and strongly member-oriented.

The information for Estonia was provided by its single NUO: the Central Society of Estonian Consumers Co-operatives (ETK). The co-operative presence is concentrated in the wholesale and retail sectors, with a turnover of 3,220 million EEK in 1996, corresponding to 13.2% of

A slight decrease in the number of co-operatives societies, a relevant reduction in membership (from 80 to 53 thousand) and a remarkable increase in turnover (1,920 million EEK in 1995) were registered in 1996. As in other CIS countries, the consumer movement includes other manufacturing businesses and services within independent units and subsidiaries, which do not appear in the statistical profile, as well as infant agricultural, industrial and services (housing) co-operative sectors.

### **FINLAND**

The information for Finland was provided by its five NUOs, co-ordinated by the Finnish Consumer Co-operative Association (FCCA). The data come from the 1996 official statistics (National Board of Patents and Registration), including the traditional organised movement (524 societies) as well as the smaller co-operatives (1,140 societies) created in recent years in new sectors (for example workers', service and consultants' co-operatives; health and social care; supply and marketing co-operatives; tourist, cultural and communication; energy and water co-operatives). The co-operative business and services are particularly strong in the sectors listed below. Agriculture and forestry co-operatives, have 64 and 1 societies respectively, 134,800 and 117,800 members, a work force of 16,586 and 13,587 employees and a turnover of 19,000 and 20,000 million FIM, representing an average of 79% of agricultural and 31% of

forestry market share. The co-operative wholesale and retail sector has 46 societies, 1,066,774 individual members, 23,761 employees including those working in subsidiaries, and a total turnover of 33,822 million FIM, and represents 35.5% of market share in the food sector. It also has a significant presence in the hotel and restaurant business. After a period of crisis in the 80s and beginning of 90s and the application of a restructuring programme, which is still being executed, the consumer co-operative sector is now expanding and improving its market share as a result of consumer loyalty promoted by customer rewards. The banking sector, with 298 co-operative banks, 668,000 members and 9,978 employees and an income of 11,300 million FIM, holds 35% of market share. The Insurance sector, with two mutual groups, 115 insurance associations and various subsidiaries, covers 7% of the insurance market (39% if all mutual organisations are included in the figures). No supplementary data on membership, personnel and turnover are available for the afore mentioned new co-operative sectors. The 1901 Finnish Co-operative Law is under revision. A task force of co-operative experts has been formed by the Ministry of Justice to complete the project.

# **FRANCE**

The information for France was provided by 13 NUOs, co-ordinated by the **Groupement National de la Coopération (GNC).** The data correspond to the 1996 official statistics on French co-operatives published by the Conseil Supérieur de la Coopération, February 1998.

The market share of four groups of co-operative banks (with 4,699 primary societies, a membership of more than 12 million and 137,000 employees) continues to progress. They hold the 1st, 10th, 11th and 34th places in the national ranking of banks. The 16,800 agricultural co-operatives - including the 13,000 typical community French co-operatives for the common utilisation of agricultural equipment (CUMA model) - continue to dominate the organisation of agricultural production and services to farmers. About 90% of farmers belong to them, and they represent about 30% of the agro-industry market share, with a turnover of 400 billion FRF (including income from subsidiaries). The fishermen's, artisans', independent retailers' and transport entrepreneurs' co-operatives represent a less relevant market share, but they are growing in numbers, membership and turnover, responding to the need of small entrepreneurs, professionals and workers for a joint-partnership, co-operative form of business operation. In the fishery co-operatives, the members represent 70% of the country's fishing and processing. Independent retailers, with a global turnover of 40,000 million FRF, represent 5.7% of market share. The industrial production and service co-operatives registered a net increase (of 151) in the numbers of small societies, with an average of 5 to 10 workers. 733 enterprises associated in 30 transport co-operatives own a total of 3,000 vehicles and are able to maintain their market share despite strong competition. The consumer co-operative sector is stable in both membership and turnover, with a significant national role played by a specialised mail order group. The housing co-operative sector plays a valuable role, with a rate of growth of 10% in the construction of houses for rent at 10-20% below the market prices. It should be noted that the statistics for the insurance, health and social care sectors are excluded from the statistical profile, because these are covered by mutual societies and non-profit associations in France.

#### **GEORGIA**

The information for Georgia was provided by its NUO: the Georgian National Alliance of Consumer Co-operation, TSEKAVSHIRI. Most co-operatives operate in the wholesale and retail sectors, with 105 co-operatives, 200,000 members, 16,337 employees and a turnover of 32.7 million GEL, corresponding to 5.2% of market share. As in other CIS countries, the consumer movement of Georgia includes a very diverse range of production and service activities, such as: catering, restaurants and inns, processing and canning factories, bakeries (896 units, mainly in rural areas), and import-export activities. A sizeable part of the assets are inadequately exploited due to limited investment, and the necessity to concentrate resources in the core business areas. Subsidiaries have been created for joint-venture business with foreign partners.

#### **GERMANY**

The information for Germany was provided by its four NUOs, co-ordinated by the Deutscher Genossenschafts und Raiffeisenverband e V. (DGRV). The co-operative business and services are particularly relevant in the following sectors, where the economic role of co-operatives has been growing continuously. The agricultural sector has 4,434 co-operatives of 3,100,000 farmers, employs 155,000 and has a turnover of about 75,000 million DEM. The banking sector has 2,421 co-operatives, with more than 16 thousand outlets and 173,000 employees, and a balance sheet of more than 900 billion DEM. The small-scale industries, commodities and service co-operative sector (including independent retailers) has 1,477 co-operatives (decreasing rapidly in number, but increasing in operational size due to mergers) associate 291,000 members and employ 105,500. In the housing sector, 1,940 co-operatives have 3.15 million members, employ 21,612 and are still expanding their role and services. The wholesale and retail sector is composed of independent retailers' and consumer co-operatives: two independent retailers' co-operative groups represent the strongest retail sector within Europe. The consumer sector, formed by 47 co-operatives with 1.5 million members and 26,500 employees, however, has been suffering from a difficult period, with a number of societies having gone into liquidation. Although not yet included in the statistics, recent analysis has confirmed that cooperatives have moved into new sectors, such as environmental protection, education, health care and provisions for the elderly.

#### **GREECE**

The information for Greece was provided by five NUOs, co-ordinated by the **Institute of Cooperation.** The most important sector is that of the agricultural co-operatives (6,800 societies, with 782,000 members and 10,500 employees), with the following market share: 70% of wine, 55% of olive oil, 45% of cereals and 35% of milk and cotton production. For the first time, a statistical breakdown exists for the "urban sector" of co-operatives, composed of the following sectors: artisans (23 co-operatives with 2,000 members and a turnover of 10,000 million GRD); the financial sector (7 banks, with 40,933 members, and 25 credit co-operatives, with 14,498 members); the health-pharmacies sector (30 co-operatives, with 3,950 pharmacists, representing 43% of market share); the wholesale and retail sector (84 consumer co-operatives, 200,000 members and 1,500 employees); and an insurance co-operative organisation, recently created in joint-venture with some EU co-operative partners. A joint survey-research project to obtain a better analysis of all types of urban co-operatives and the social economy was begun in 1998.

### HUNGARY

The information for Hungary was provided by its five NUOs, co-ordinated by the National Federation of Consumer Co-operatives, COOP HUNGARY. The data are in line with those published by the Central Office of Statistics, which had 4,749 co-operatives registered in 1996. However, this includes a sizeable percentage of inactive co-operatives. 1,345 agricultural co-operatives, with 300,000 members and 86,000 workers, maintain a significant percentage of agricultural production, with a turnover of 300,000 million HUF and 40% of cultivated land. In the wholesale and retail sector, 260 consumer co-operatives, with 559,000 members and 32,000 employees, have a turnover of 124,000 million HUF. The housing sector has 1,060 co-opera-

tives, 304,000 members and 2,186 employees. It controls about 270,000 flats, and is responsible for building, reconstruction and renovation works. The industrial co-operative sector, with 606 workers' co-operatives has a significant presence in construction, metal, furniture manufacturing and community services. Finally, 226 savings co-operatives, serving about 1.8 million members and employing about 6,500, represent a dynamic and expanding co-operative presence in the financial sector and are well known throughout the country.

#### **ICELAND**

The information for Iceland was provided by its single NUO: the **Samband Islenskra Samvinnufelaga** (**Samband of Iceland**). The main areas of co-operative activities are within the fisheries sector, with two co-operatives, and other technical and commercial activities undertaken by their subsidiary companies, and by 24 other multipurpose co-operatives. Co-operatives also have a presence in the wholesale and retail, agricultural, cottage industry and insurance sectors.

## **IRELAND**

The information for Ireland was provided by the European Sectoral Associations of Brussels and the World Council of Credit Unions. No remarks on the statistical profile were presented by the NUO: **the Irish Co-operative Organisation Society Ltd - ICOS**, which was asked to integrate and validate the data. The most important co-operative sectors are in finance and agriculture. In agriculture, the 133 societies (with 186,097 members as at 31 December 1995) have 100% of market share in dairy production and the artificial insemination of livestock; 70% of grain and animal feed production; 30% to 70% of red and white meat production. In the financial sector, one co-operative bank (1,374 members, 588 employees and a market share of 2.40%) and, in particular, 532 credit unions (with 1,935,263 members, 1,500 employees, deposits of 2,900 million IEP, and 6% of the market share) represent the largest national credit union network within Europe. The cottage industry (56 co-operatives, 216 members and 256 workers) and insurance sectors (one company owned by credit unions) complete the picture of the country's co-operative presence.

## **ITALY**

The information for Italy was provided by its four NUOs, co-ordinated by the **Confederazione Cooperative Italiane** (**CCI**). The Italian co-operative movement is strong, and expanding, with over 77,000 active societies (6,500 new co-operatives were established in 1995-96), more than 50% of which are voluntarily associated with the four national apex organisations. The co-operative business and services are particularly relevant in the following sectors: agriculture, where 8,500 agriculture and forestry co-operatives with 1,177,703 farmer-members, employ 77,587 and control more than 50% of market share; in the primary sector, another key role is held by the 853 fisheries co-operatives, which have 62,800 members and 7,967 employees. In the sector covering small and medium-sized industries, artisans and service providers, 8,884 co-operatives have

336,217 members and 237,867employees. In the banking sector, 594 co-operative banks have 468,480 members and employ 20,430. The wholesale and retail sector, consisting of consumers' and independent retailers' co-operatives, has 1,500 consumer co-operatives, with 3,610,076 members and 43,824 employees. This is the fastest average rate of growth in the EU, with respect to membership, employees, and turnover (13,221 billion ITL in 1996). The 204 independent retailers' co-operatives, associate more than 5.4 thousand entrepreneurs, and employ 3,000 workers. The housing sector has 11,670 co-operatives, about 1.2 million members and employs 4,842 workers. The social care sector has 2,572 "social co-operatives", and represents the important new reality of Italian co-operation, with 107,410 members and providing 69,957 jobs. Finally, two national insurance companies, owned by co-operatives and trade unions, represent about 3.5% of the market share. Co-operative legislation, based on Article 45 of the Italian Constitution, has been the subject of some innovative co-operative laws in recent years. Examples of this are law 59/92, which created participatory shares and a national promotion fund based on 3% of co-operative profits, and law 266/97, which relates to the so-called "small co-operative societies" and permits the creation of co-operatives between professionals.

### LATVIA

The information for Latvia was provided by its single NUO: the Latvian Central Co-operative Union, TURIBA. Latvian co-operatives are concentrated in the wholesale and retail sector, with 49 consumer co-operatives, 305,400 members (15% less than in 1995), employ 10,150 (40% less than the 17,000 employees of 1995) and had a turnover of 115 million LVL (206.8 million USD) in 1996, a decrease of 4% on 1995. As in other CIS countries, the consumer movement includes other manufacturing businesses and services within independent units and subsidiaries (public catering, wholesale and trade services), which do not appear in the statistical profile. A co-operative presence is beginning to be seen in the industrial (48 co-operatives with 2,600 workers), transport and agricultural (fur farming) sectors.

## LITHUANIA

The information for Lithuania was provided by its single NUO: the **Lithuanian Consumers Co-operative Societies Union.** The co-operative presence is concentrated in the wholesale and

retail sector, where 99 consumer co-operatives have 246,300 members, employ 20,152, and had a turnover of 723 million LTL (208.7 million USD) in 1996, corresponding to 61% of market share. Due to mergers, a considerable decrease in the numbers of co-operative societies (there were 130 societies registered in 1995), and a relevant reduction in membership (from 358,000 to 246,000) were registered in 1996 as a result of the unfavourable macro-economic conditions and stronger competition in the internal market. As in other CIS countries, the consumer movement includes other manufacturing businesses and services within independent units and subsidiaries, which do not appear in the statistical profile, as well as infant agricultural and credit co-operative sectors.

A strong co-operative presence exists in agriculture (25 societies with a turnover of 4.6 million LUF and a market share of 95% of seeds and plants, 80% of milk, 70% of cereals and artificial insemination), in banking (35 co-operatives, with 5,627 members, 323 employees and 114 banking outlets) and in the wholesale and retail sector (3 consumer co-operatives, with 12,000 members and 135 employees).

#### **MOLDOVA**

The information for Moldova was provided by its single NUO: the Union of Consumer Societies of the Republic of Moldova, MOLDCOOP. The co-operative presence is concentrated in the wholesale and retail sector. 149 co-operatives (the same number as in 1995), with a membership of 595,000 (a 2.5% decrease in membership since 1995), had 31,107 employees (a decrease of 14.2%) and a turnover of 397.2 million MDL (a 28.8 million MDL increase over 1995). As in other CIS countries, the consumer movement includes other manufacturing business and services, with independent units and subsidiaries, which do not appear in the statistical profile. New co-operatives are also being established in agriculture, industry and service sectors.

### THE NETHERLANDS

The information for the Netherlands was obtained through the European Sectoral Associations of Co-operatives in Brussels, analysed and validated by Nationale Coöperative Raad voor land – en tuinbouw (NCR). The largest co-operative presence is concentrated in the agricultural and banking sectors. In agriculture, the 223 co-operatives (251 in 1994-95), with 270,664 farmers (273,368 in 1995), 54,456 employees (1,223 more than in 1995, an increase of 2.3%) and a turnover of 46,006 million NLG, represent, with their subsidiaries, the following percentages of market share: 100% of seed potatoes, 93% of cheese, 83% of milk deliveries, more than 70% of fruit and vegetables, and 63% of sugar beet. The co-operative banking group, with 510 primary co-operatives and 585,000 members, 40,275 employees and a turnover of 45,700 million NLG, represents 25% of the financial market share. Also relevant are the wholesale and retail (with co-operatives uniting 782 independent retailers and 4,350 personnel) and insurance sectors (2 groups – one co-operative, and one owned by its trade unions and personnel, with 1,750 employees and more than 2.5 million policies). Other relatively new small co-operatives exist in some non-traditional sectors (energy, medical and social care, forestry and local manufacturing), that do not appear in the national profile.

#### **NORWAY**

Kooperative Landsforening (NKL, COOP NORWAY). The co-operative business and services are particularly strong in the following sectors: agriculture and forestry, with 96 societies, 224,183 members, 17,839 employees and a turnover of over 34,325 million NOK (with a particularly high market share in dairy (99%), slaughterhouse (76%) forestry (70%) and egg production (65%). The wholesale and retail sector, with 331 consumer societies (8% less than in 1995), 815,000 individual members (an increase of 11% over 1995), 15,000 employees, including the personnel of subsidiaries and associated companies, a total turnover of 23,200 million NOK (with an increase of 4% in the food and 11% in the non-food sectors), represent 25% of the market share. The housing sector, which has 3,830 societies, 558,485 members and 1,335 employees, controls 13% of the housing stock. Finally, the insurance and pensions sector (with one company, owned by trade unions and the consumer movement and having cross ownership with the Swedish and Danish insurance co-operative sector, and one mutual) employ 1,018 personnel.

## **POLAND**

The information for Poland was provided by its four NUOs, co-ordinated by the National Co-operative Council (NCC). It is, unfortunately, not possible to compare the NCC figures with those of the National Statistical Office, which include inactive co-operative, excluded from the NCC statistics. Co-operative businesses and services are particularly significant in the following sectors: agriculture, where 4,938 agriculture and forestry co-operatives of 630,000 farmers, employ 25,000 workers and represent, with a turnover of 1,000 million PLZ, about 3% of market share; the small and medium-sized workers', artisans' and service co-operatives, where 2,456 societies have a membership of about 188,000 artisans and workers, including an important percentage of persons with handicap. In the financial sector, 1,481 co-operative banks have about 1,800,000 members and employ 20,766; and 168 credit unions, the fastest-growing co-

operative sector, have 154,638 members and employ 534 personnel. The wholesale and retail sector, composed of 413 consumer co-operatives belonging to one union (other supply and marketing co-operatives are included in the figures for agricultural co-operatives), represents 6% of the total market share. The housing co-operative sector has 3,930 societies, which can be considered as the main private-sector operator in Poland's housing sector, with a considerable amount of work to be done, both in the existing housing stock, and in new construction (77% of new housing construction in Warsaw in 1996 was the responsibility of co-operatives). In the tertiary/services sector a relevant development of health/social care and transport co-operatives has been noted during recent years. The Co-operative Law of 16 April 1993 was amended in 1994, and a new Credit Union Act was adopted on 15 December 1995.

### **PORTUGAL**

The information for Portugal was provided by the **Instituto Antonio Sergio do Sector Co-operativo**, **INSCOOP**, in collaboration with the country's sectoral NUO. The data are in line with the 1996 official statistics. Co-operatives have a significant presence in all three sectors of the

economy. In agriculture, the 980 co-operatives (the number is decreasing because of mergers) with 1,002,170 members, 17,420 workers and a turnover of 364,470 million PTE, control the following percentages of market share: 80% of dairy, 45% of wine, 40% of fruit and vegetables, and 30% of olive oil production. The industrial and artisan sectors are less strong, with 159 cooperatives, 2,700 members, 2,900 workers and a turnover of 17,410 million PTE. In the banking sector, the 198 co-operatives (decreasing in number because of mergers), with 351,000 members and 3,500 employees, control 65% of the credit market for agricultural business and investments. In the wholesale and retail sector, the consumer and independent retail co-operatives (with 249 and 60 societies respectively, 331,600 consumers and 66,000 retailers in membership, 2,700 and 3,900 employees and a turnover of 36,100 and 304,840 million PTE) contribute significantly to the wholesale markets for food and pharmaceutical products. In the housing sector 497 co-operatives, with 144,300 members and 1,500 employees are responsible for about 10% of national housing construction. The final sub-sector of "others" includes 818 co-operatives (with 236,500 members, 12,800 employees and a turnover of 43,600 million PTE) involved in the following activities: social care, transport, the arts and education, with an increasing contribution to job creation and a particularly high rate of growth in educational activities.

#### **ROMANIA**

The information for Romania was provided by two NUOs, co-ordinated by the consumer and credit NUO: the National Union of Consumer and Credit Co-operatives, CENTROCOOP. The data are in line with the overall data of the National Statistical Commission of Romania. The co-operative presence is important in four sectors: wholesale and retail, industry, finance, and agriculture. In this last sector, thousands of "families' associations" were recently established in connection with the land reform and farm restructuring, with an increasing amount of mutual collaboration and exchange of services, which will constitute the basis of a future co-operative movement based on the principle of voluntary and open membership. consumer co-operatives, with 3.5 million members and 49,000 personnel, have a turnover of 1,075 billion ROL, or 7% of market share, realised by 14,000 traditional consumer shops and by agricultural and industrial units and subsidiaries (7,000 bars and restaurants, 850 bakeries and other manufacturing units) which assure the sustainability of the consumer sector. The financial sector is composed of one bank, 758 credit co-operatives with 1.5 million members, and an insurance company (a joint venture with the EU insurance group) and has a total of 11,598 employees. The industrial sector, with 1,100 handicraft and manufacturing co-operatives, has 140,000 members and a work force of 84,000 - including a significant percentage of individuals with handicap, socially and productively involved in the business activities – with a turnover of 908 billion ROL (a 10.4% increase over 1995), constitute the country's biggest producer of authentic folk art and handicrafts. A new law concerning consumer and credit co-operatives was approved in 1996 (law 109 of 10th October 1996); a new law concerning the handicraft and manufacturing co-operatives was still under consideration by Parliament in 1998.

#### **RUSSIA**

The information for Russia was provided by six NUOs, co-ordinated by the consumer NUO: Centrosoyuz of the Russian Federation. It is important to note that the data regarding the number of societies and membership are based on estimates for the agriculture, industry and housing sectors. The co-operative presence is particularly important in the wholesale and retail sector, where 3,874 consumer co-operatives with more than 16.5 million members employ 709,667 personnel and had a turnover of 29,500 million RUR (about 5,300 million USD) in 1996. With their large network of traditional consumer shops, the consumer co-operatives assure the distribution of essential goods to the rural population. As in other CIS countries, the consumer sector traditionally includes agricultural manufacturing and industrial units and subsidiaries (bakeries, restaurants and inns, manufacturing and packaging units, foreign-trade and

tourism activities, etc) which contribute to the survival of the consumer sector (which is decreasing both in number of societies and in membership, personnel and turnover as a result of the adverse macro-economic conditions and increased competition from the private commercial sector). State support and financial assistance (subsidies, tax incentives, etc) is also needed. In recent years, a growth in other co-operative sectors has been noted: in the credit sector, 34 credit unions have been created, with a membership of 13,480; and in the industrial sector, where 10,350 co-operatives (10,000 in industrial and handicraft production, and 350 gold-diggers' co-operatives with a total membership of 90,000 workers) were estimated to exist. In agriculture a total of 40,000 co-operatives (including workers' and farmers' co-operatives) were estimated to exist. Finally, in the housing sector 1,900 co-operatives are associated to the Moscow Union of housing and construction co-operatives. A new Federal Law on consumer co-operation came into force in July 1997.

#### THE SLOVAK REPUBLIC

The information for the Slovak Republic was provided by four NUOs and two national societies, co-ordinated by the Co-operative Union of the Slovak Republic. The data are in line with the official national statistics on co-operatives. The following co-operative sectors are the most significant. The 757 agricultural co-operatives (with 126,000 members, 80,000 employees and a turnover of 29,840 million SKK) represent about 60% of national agricultural production. The 179 industrial co-operatives, with 17,562 members, 21,927 employees (an average of 123 per enterprise) and a turnover of 6,000 million SKK, including 2,300 million in export business, represent about 2% of industrial production. In the wholesale and retail sector, 40 consumer co-operatives, with 220,604 members and 11,825 employees, represent 4.1% of the market share. The housing co-operative sector (130 co-operatives, with 98,387 members and 2,900 employees) is an active participant in the reform of the housing system, and manages about 23% of the country's housing stock. In the insurance and health sector, 2 co-operative-owned companies were created, and they registered a significant growth rate in 1996, controlling over 10% of the market.

#### **SLOVENIA**

The information for Slovenia was produced by its single NUO: **Zadruzna Zveza Slovenije** (The Co-operative Union of Slovenia). The co-operative presence is concentrated in the agriculture and finance sectors: 109 agricultural and forestry co-operatives associate 20,354 producers and employ about 4,000 workers. The finance sector consists of one agricultural co-operative bank (with 270 outlets throughout the country), one insurance company owned by co-operatives and 62 credit co-operatives, with about 200,000 members. The Co-operative Union created a co-operative tourist agency a few years ago.

#### **SPAIN**

The information for Spain was produced by four NUOs and validated and brought into line with the national statistics by the project's national co-ordinator: the **Confederación de Cooperativas de Euskadi**. The most important co-operative contribution concerns the sectors of agriculture and fishing, industry, banking, wholesale and retail trade, health and housing, with the largest co-operative presence of co-operatives in the Autonomous Communities of Andalusia, Catalonia, Valencia and the Basque Country.

In the agriculture and fishing sectors 4,528 co-operatives, with a membership of 962,443 and 20,500 workers, have a turnover of 1,082 billion ESP. In the industrial sector, 13,101 co-operatives with 163,952 members and 19,303 workers, have a turnover of 749.8 billion ESP, representing one of the strongest co-operative industrial groups within Europe. In the banking sector, the 96 co-operatives, with 905,473 members and 9,849 employees, have an income of 358 billion ESP, which is 8% of market share. In the wholesale and retail sector, 381 consumer co-operatives (with 806,387 members and 13,268 employees) and 2,674 independent retailers (with 8,926 employees) have a global turnover of 568 billions of ESP. In the health sector, three national co-operative organisations, with a membership of both professionals and users, represent 21% of the country's private healthcare market share. In the insurance sector a co-operative owners' company has over 20% of the market share in life insurance policies. In the transport sector, 396 co-operatives formed by 4,710 haulier-members and co-ordinated by a sectoral NUO, maintain a strong position despite stiff competition. Finally, 1,597 co-operatives, classified as "Others" (with 47,960 members, 34,900 workers and a turnover of 261 billion ESP) include a very significant group of 613 school and educational societies, with 8,500 workermembers, representing a significant co-operative presence in the country's private education system.

#### **SWEDEN**

The information for Sweden was provided by its ten NUOs, including official statistical data, and validated by the Swedish Co-operative Development and Research Institute (KOOPI) co-ordinated by **Kooperativa Forbundet** (**KF**, **The Swedish Co-operative Union**). Co-operative businesses and services are particularly relevant in the sectors detailed below. In the agricultural sector, 84 agricultural and 26 forestry co-operatives have a membership of 290,000 farmers, employ 34,000 personnel and represent a significant market share (70% in agriculture and 60% in the forestry sector), with a global turnover of 83,000 million SEK. The wholesale and retail sector is composed by 513 consumer co-operatives, with 3,845,000 members and 35,000 employees, has a turnover of 41,336 million SEK, representing about 20% of market share. The housing sector consists of 11,942 co-operatives included in the national statistics, and employ 13,069. 4,780 housing societies belong to two national unions with a turnover of 7,089 million SEK realised thanks to the administration of 150 thousand homes and the construction of 532 apartments in 1996. The banking sector includes 1 co-operative bank, with 82,000 members and a workforce of 100. The insurance sector, organised in a national mutual group, employs

3,300 and has 5 million policyholders, representing about 18% of market share. The following new co-operative sectors have also been developing during the recent years and appear in the national statistics for 1996, with a significant contribution to job creation: in small and medium-sized industrial co-operatives, 152 societies employ 14,360 workers; the social care sector has 877 co-operatives and a labour force of 5,319; the services and utilities sectors have 272 transport co-operatives and 117 utilities co-operatives and a work force of 1,788 and 479 employees respectively. The group of "others" includes 1,121 service co-operatives, undertaking educational, recreational, cultural and ecological activities.

## **SWITZERLAND**

The information for Switzerland was produced by three NUOs, co-ordinated by **Coop Schweiz**. The main areas of co-operative business are detailed below. In agriculture, 656 societies with 120,176 farmer-members, employ 13,650 and have a turnover of 8,880 million CHF (data from 1995), with a particularly high market share of the dairy, animal feed and wine sectors. The wholesale and retail sector has 29 consumer societies belonging to two national groups: together they have 2,882,000 individual members, employ 105,467 personnel and have a turnover of

25,877 million CHF, which represents 29% of market share, one of the highest figures for cooperatives in Europe. In the finance sector, 964 co-operative banks have 654,979 members and 3,693 employees. Finally, there are two insurance societies (one co-operative, and one owned by trade unions and the consumer movement), which employ 329 full-time personnel.

#### **TURKEY**

The information for Turkey was produced by seven NUOs, co-ordinated by the Turkish Co-operative Association. The data concerning the number of societies and individual members, are in line with the official statistics for 1996, published by the Ministry of Agriculture and by the Ministry of Industry, Commerce and Village Affairs, in 1997. It was also possible to categorise the co-operatives in accordance with the proposed classification, despite the diversity of the 24 types of co-operatives recognised by law. However, insufficient data were available for the figures relating to employment and turnover or market share. The largest number of co-operatives is in the agriculture and fishing sector, where the 6,940 co-operatives have 3,017,339 members, representing more than 37% of the national membership and confirming the importance of agriculture in terms of GNP (over 17%) and employment (about 44% of the economically active population belongs to the primary sector of the economy). Sugar beet is the main crop grown by co-operatives, with 28 co-operatives and 1,553,000 farmers involved in its production. After this come cotton, sultanas, raisins, figs, olives and olive oil production. In the area of cottage industry, the 1,887 co-operatives, associating 248,575 artisans, play an important role in the organisation of their supply and marketing activities. In the tertiary/services sector 41,323 co-operatives (82.4% of the total number of societies) are active in four sub-sectors. The most important sector is the 33,376 housing co-operatives, with 1,655,853 members, which are key players in the national and regional plans for the popular housing sector. The scarcity of public funds, and of members' savings, makes it difficult for businesses to operate within the housing sector, which has the largest number of inactive co-operatives. In the banking and credit sector, the 3,319 credit unions provide credit for peasants and artisans. In the wholesale and retail sector 2,077 consumer and 127 co-operatives, associating 8,968 retailers play a particularly important role in rural areas. The fourth largest sector is that of the transport co-operatives, with a membership of 104,070 family enterprises.

#### THE UKRAINE

The information for the Ukraine was provided by the consumer NUO: the General Union of Consumer Societies of The Ukraine (UKOOPSPILKA). The data for agriculture, industry and service co-operatives were taken from the National Statistical Office. The co-operative presence is traditionally established in the wholesale and retail sector, where 1,956 consumer co-operative with 6,172,135 members employ 402,605 personnel and have a turnover of 3,525 million UAK (about 1,870 million USD) in 1996, representing about 15% of market share. With their large network of traditional consumer shops, the consumer co-operatives assure the distribution of essential goods throughout the country, and play a particularly important role in the rural areas. As in other CIS countries, the consumer sector also manages agricultural manufacturing and industrial units and their subsidiaries (bakeries, restaurants and inns, production and packaging units, etc) which has helped the consumer sector to survive in adverse macro-economic conditions. After a period of decreasing business and rentability from 1992 to 1995, the consumer co-operatives' situation began to stabilise in 1996. In addition to the traditional consumer sector, in recent years co-operative development in other sectors has been observed: 52 credit unions, with a membership

of 17,680; 794 industrial co-operatives, with a turnover of 85.5 million UAK; and 1072 housing co-operatives play a considerable role in the administration of housing stock, with a turnover of 115.2 million UAK. In the agriculture and service sectors, 74,150 and 619 co-operatives appear in the official statistics in the sectors of agriculture, transport and other services. A consumer co-operative law was adopted in 1992.

#### THE UNITED KINGDOM

The information for the United Kingdom was produced by seven NUOs and co-ordinated by the Co-operative Union Ltd. Co-operatives are particularly strong in the agricultural sectors, where 552 co-operatives with 271,000 farmers, employ 11,300 personnel and have a turnover of 7,103 million GBP, which represents a relevant market share, particularly for the following products: milk (98% of market share), oil seed rape (45%), pigs (28%). The global statistics also include the agricultural business of a consumer group, which employs a workforce of 200 and has a turnover of 30 million GBP. The wholesale and retail sector is composed of 52 consumer co-operatives, manufacturing and miscellaneous societies, with 9,129,127 members and, including their specialist units and subsidiaries, 69,454 employees, and have a turnover of 7,949 million GBP, representing 6.8% of food, 1.1% of non-food and 3.6% of total retail trade. The finance sector is composed of one national co-operative bank, the subsidiary of a consumer cooperative group, which employs 3,700 personnel, and had an operating income of 286.5 million GBP in 1996; and a network of 384 credit unions, associating 146,180 individual members. The insurance sector, composed of one national co-operative, the subsidiary of a consumer co-operative, employs 11,700 and has a turnover of 1,307 million GBP, with more than 11 million policies in force (between 3% and 9% of market share). The industrial and service sectors is composed of 1,200 co-operatives, or worker-owned enterprises. The housing, health and social care and other new co-operative sectors have been developing during recent years, nevertheless, the data concerning the number of societies, membership and personnel do not appear in the national profile for 1996.
